Northwest Region Construction Update

Barron County
Highway: US 53
Location: Bridges over 22½ Avenue north of Rice Lake
Schedule: May 14 to early August
Cost: \$770,405
Description: Replacing the concrete deck overlays, replacing the bridge approach slabs, repairing bridge wing walls, repairing cracks on girders and parapet as necessary and replacing guardrail as necessary.

Traffic impacts: US 53 remains open to traffic, but:
The highway is reduced to a single lane in both directions.

Traffic control could be pulled from both structures by the end of next week.

Highway: US 53 South
Location: Bridges over US 8, 20th Street, Knapp Street, County I, Chetek River, County A, County AA and Carlson School Road between Cameron and New Auburn
Schedule: May 5 to mid-November, 2025 construction; March 1 to late September, total project completion.
Cost: \$10.91 million
Description of 2025 work: Replacing the decks on the bridges over County AA and County A; overlaying the decks with concrete on structures over Carlson School Road, Knapp Street and US 8; making miscella-

neous repairs to bridges; completing prep work for 2026 construction on the bridges over the Chetek River, County I and 20th Street; and replacing guardrail at the structures.

Traffic impacts: US 53 South remains open to traffic, but:
Motorists will encounter lane closures and a reduced speed limit of 60 mph in work zones.

- o US 53 South reopens to two lanes of traffic, with a 70-mph speed limit between closures.
- There is a maximum width of 15 feet 3 inches on the open lane on most bridges.
- Motorists also will encounter intermittent daytime closures of the roads below the bridges during the work week.

Highway: US 63
Location: Just west of WIS 48 West to Charrie Lane in Cumberland
Schedule: April 28 to mid-September
Cost: \$3.68 million
Description: Removing 3.25 inches of the existing pavement and placing 3.25 inches of new asphalt pavement; closing access to the roadway at various locations to improve safety; upgrading pedestrian curb ramps to current Americans With Disabilities Act standards; repairing or replacing curb, gutter and sidewalk; repairing sanitary sewer manholes and storm water inlets as needed; extending the two-

way left-turn lane pavement markings between 3rd and 5th avenues; and replacing pavement markings and signage.

Traffic impacts: US 63 remains open to traffic, but:
North- and southbound traffic has 12-foot travel lanes through the entire project.

- The parking lane and shoulder are closed along the northbound lane.
- Motorists will encounter lane closures controlled by flagging for paving operations.

Washburn County
Highway: County K
Location: US 63 in the city of Spooner to Sunset Lane
Schedule: June 2 to late August
Cost: \$2.01 million
Description: From US 63 to Division Street: Removing and replacing the existing pavement and base course, replacing curb and gutter, making spot sanitary sewer improvements, completing storm sewer repairs and placing new pavement markings and signage. From Division Street to Sunset Lane: Pulverizing the existing pavement and repaving it.

Traffic impacts: County K is:
Closed to through traffic from US 63 to Division Street.

Open from Division Street to Sunset Lane, but motorists will encounter lane closures controlled by flagging during paving operations.

ATV And UTV Safety Is A Must For Children This Summer

MADISON, Wis. – With thousands of children and teens across Wisconsin gearing up for outdoor adventures this summer, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) urges families to take ATV and UTV safety seriously.

Each year, the number of youths on ATVs and UTVs continues to grow, and so does the importance of proper training, supervision and gear.

“We want every ride to be a safe one,” said Lt. Jacob Holsclaw, Wisconsin DNR off-highway vehicle administrator. “Most ATV and UTV crashes involving youth are preventable with

basic safety steps and education.”

So far this year, 21 people have been killed in ATV/UTV crashes. Most of them were not wearing seatbelts or helmets, and alcohol and speed were also contributing factors.

Key safety reminders for families:
Helmets are required by law for all riders under age 18.
Parents and mentors are encouraged to set a positive example by modeling proper helmet and seatbelt use.
Youth under 16 must operate age-appropriate vehicles and follow all manu-

facturer restrictions.

ATVs are typically designed for one rider only. UTVs may carry passengers only if seatbelts are available and used.

Wisconsin law requires anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, and at least 12 years old, to complete an ATV safety certification course before operating alone on public trails.

Parental supervision is strongly encouraged, even for certified riders.

Safety certification courses are available online and in person. Visit the Wisconsin DNR website for more information or to enroll in a course.

DNR Urges UTV Riders To Buckle Up As Fatal Crashes Climb

MADISON, Wis. – As residents and summer visitors alike enjoy Wisconsin’s trails and backroads, state officials remind utility terrain vehicle (UTV) riders to focus on safe operation – starting with the simple step of wearing a seatbelt.

So far in 2025, there have been 23 fatal UTV/ATV crashes in Wisconsin. Only five of those individuals were wearing seatbelts at the time of the crash. UTVs have also been involved in the majority of fatal ATV/UTV incidents this year – accounting for 86% of all fatalities.

“UTVs are designed with key safety features, like roll cages and seatbelts, that are

there to protect riders in the event of a crash or rollover,” said Lt. Jacob Holsclaw, Wisconsin DNR off-highway vehicle administrator. “But those features can only help if they’re used.”

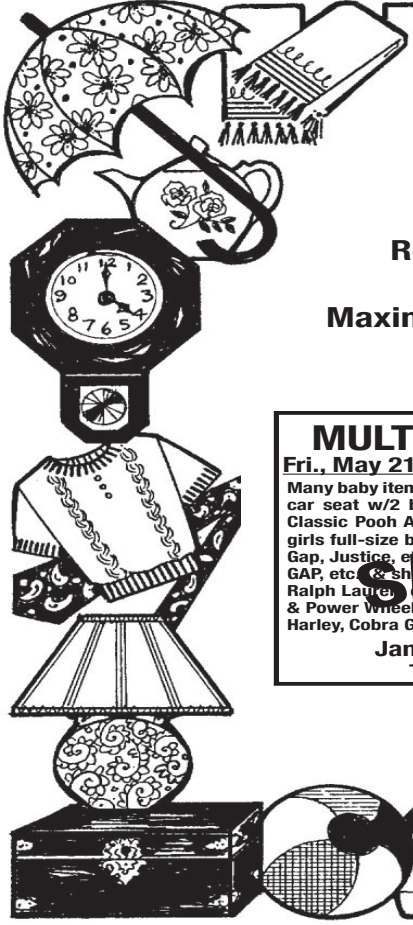
Unlike traditional ATVs, UTVs are equipped with seatbelts for all passengers. Proper use of seatbelts significantly reduces the risk of being ejected during a crash, a leading cause of serious injury or death in off-road vehicle accidents. But that’s not all – it’s the law. In Wisconsin, all UTV passengers are required to wear a seatbelt.

“While these numbers are concerning, they also highlight a clear opportunity for

prevention,” said Holsclaw. “Wearing a seatbelt is one of the simplest and most effective ways to stay safe while riding.”

Officials also remind parents and guardians that Wisconsin law restricts youth UTV use. Operators must be at least 16 to operate a full-size UTV in public areas. ATV/UTV operators born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, and at least 12 years of age must complete a DNR-approved safety course.
