

Subject in Custody Following Vandalism at Tourist Park; Other Burglaries

On Wednesday, June 21, 2023 at approximately 8:00 A.M., law enforcement was advised by the City of Cumberland Street Department that the bathrooms at the Cumberland City Beach (Tourist Park) located at 1190 Lake Street, had been vandalized. The Street Department advised that both bathrooms had been completely destroyed with broken doors, broken light fixtures, broken mirrors, the sink ripped off the wall and other damage. Throughout an investigation, it was determined that James B Mortensen, 17 years of age, was involved in the vandalism as well as another juvenile male. During the investigation it

was learned that two other buildings were broken into and vandalized as well by the same two individuals. The amount of damage between the three incidents, which all occurred on the same night, was roughly \$25,000. During a search of the juvenile's property a stolen shotgun, stolen crossbow, and a large amount of marijuana was located. The juvenile was referred for criminal charges through juvenile court and James Mortensen was arrested and transported to jail. He is awaiting formal criminal charges and is still incarcerated at this time.

Cumberland Celebrates the 4th of July in 1933

The June 8, 1933 Advocate Headline clearly stated what was coming soon as it read, "Celebrate the 4th of July in Cumberland." Celebrating was tough for Americans in 1933, however, as it was the worst year of the depression. Unemployment was over 25 percent and strong winds had stripped the top soil from farms in the Midwest creating a Dust Bowl.

Two months earlier, Franklin Roosevelt was sworn in as the 33rd President of the United States.

It was during his inauguration speech he declared a "National Bank Holiday" while issuing his famous remarks, "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself." Fear was a reality for many, however, as the average annual salary stood at \$1,550 and concerns ranged from the rise of Fascism in Europe to the difficulty in providing the basic necessities of life for one's family.

Despite the difficulties of the times, Cumberland residents did their best to stay active without spending large amounts of money.

The City Golf Team and Baseball Team competed against area communities, while a newly formed Kittenball League contained eight local teams. One could attend a movie at the Zim Zim Theatre for 10 cents a child or 30 cents an adult.

Saturday evening, the McKinley Town Hall offered free dances for ladies, while men only paid a quarter. Local residents, mean-

while, continued to entertain guests as the June 15 Advocate told of a Bridge luncheon at the Benjamin home and a Sewing Club meeting and luncheon held by Mrs. George Poukey.

For those more adventurous and with access to a little more money, the summer of 1933 also offered a chance to attend the Century of Progress International Exposition, better known as the Chicago World's Fair.

Inside Wisconsin

“Is politics giving way to governing? Encouraging signs in the Capitol”

MADISON, Wis. – Don’t look now, but random acts of bipartisanship are taking place in the state Capitol.

As the Legislature moves closer to piecing together a \$100-billion-plus state budget for the two years beginning July 1, some goals that seemed out of reach even a few months ago have gained approval from Republicans and Democrats alike.

The cooperation bodes well for Wisconsin’s business climate, not just because some initiatives directly benefit businesses of all sizes, but because they stand to create stronger communities and thus foster better economic conditions. Here are some of the achievements:

The personal property tax is fading into history. Long before Wisconsin was a state, the territory levied a tax on personal property – tangible assets such as livestock, wagons, farm equipment and more – to cover the cost of government. Over time, the state enacted income taxes, sales taxes and taxes on other property such as land, homes and business property. The personal property tax became anachronistic, with so many exemptions and car-

veouts that it was more of a nuisance for those who paid it than a legitimate source of revenue for the state.

In fact, the Wisconsin Policy Forum recently calculated “personal property” accounted for roughly 2.5% of the total property tax base since 2005. For many businesses, remarked Evan Umpir of Wisconsin Manufacturers and Commerce, “navigating the red tape and record-keeping for this tax could be more expensive than the tax itself.”

Gov. Tony Evers signed into law a total repeal of the tax effective January 2024, part of a larger compromise on increasing state shared revenues to cities, villages and town across Wisconsin.

Shared revenues are what the name implies – money collected by the state for efficiency purposes but returned, in part, to local governments. Those governments had been on a crash diet for years, meaning either property taxes needed to be raised or services cut. In some places, essential services such as police and fire protection, road maintenance and more were stretched to the limit.



One such city is Milwaukee, which one state senator described as being “on the verge of insolvency.” The legislation gives Milwaukee a larger share of state dollars, much like other governments, and allows the Milwaukee City Council and Milwaukee County Board separate powers to enact a local sales tax by a two-thirds vote of those bodies.

The 20% shared revenue increase comes with strings many in Milwaukee don’t like, but Evers called the deal “a historic day” when he signed it into law.

“We had good support from Republicans and Democrats. ... For far too long, our local communities have been expected to do more with less... to make impossible decisions,” Evers said.

Legislation signed into law also includes about \$1 billion more public K-12 education as well as \$250 million more for private school vouchers tied to individual students. Some public-school advocates were disappointed in Evers, a former state superintendent of public instruction, but he pointed

out the reality of working with a GOP-led Legislature.

“We added a little bit more money in order to get this deal across the finish line,” Evers said.

Even the regulation and taxation of alcohol, long debated but largely untouched for decades, is getting an overhaul. Headed toward bipartisan passage and a likely Evers signature is a bill that seeks to make sense of how Wisconsin brewers, distillers, wineries, retailers, tasting parlors and others who operate in Wisconsin’s three-tiered distribution system are treated. Owners of wedding barns aren’t happy, but the deal clarifies laws and rules in place in some cases since the repeal of Prohibition in 1933.

A couple of major issues remain: Possible income tax reductions and funding higher education over the long haul. There are plenty of reasons for Republicans and Democrats to disagree in the coming weeks, but for now, politics is giving way in favor of governing.

Former teammates fondly remember the contributions 1971 graduate Jerry Elmborg made to the success of their squads. Bert Skinner said, "Jerry was a Sophomore my Senior year and was a very humble person, who let his ability to the talking. He played following a major shoulder injury and I can remember watching him grimace with pain during and after games." Classmate and basketball teammate Mark Nelson simply says, "He was the reason we went to the State Basketball Tournament our Senior season. He always showed up in big games."

Elmberg excelled in track and basketball, but was unfortunately limited to one season of football due to his shoulder injury.

His basketball career included First Team All-Conference honors, a Team Captaincy, and a trip to the 1971 State Basketball Tournament in Madison. "The trip to State was obviously the highlight of my senior

year. Having great coaches like Elmer Beran and Bob Davis and a bunch of great teammates is what made our dream become possible," said Elmborg.

In track, he found success at several events including the high jump, discus, long jump and shot put. He went on to multiple Sectional appearances and was named the team MVP.

Jerry remained active in athletics after graduation. This included an 11th place finish in the 1977, 83-mile Yukon Jack Snow Shoe Race and on area softball fields and basketball courts. Today, he also enjoys spending time watching his grandkids, "In all of their sports activities."

1925: Baseball and the 4th of July

The June 11, 1925 Advocate contained the headline, "Plans Complete for Celebration." It asked people from "Cities, towns, villages and the country" to join in, "One of the biggest celebrations ever held in the northwest." It described Cumberland's plans for the 4th of July, now only two weeks away.

The day was to start with “Early morning salutes by the Legion,” and include sports races, games, concerts by the Cameron and Luck bands, a mammoth street parade, a log rolling contest, a parachute drop, and a fireworks display. There would also be baseball at 2:30 pm, when Cumberland would take on Alma in what the Advocate called, “One of the best games all year with both teams loaded with star players.”

Baseball was a popular event in the “Island City” as far back as records go. One can find records of baseball games going back to the 1890’s and before.

An example of such a

contest could be found in a June, 1896 Advocate which said, "A gathering of people were attracted to the ball grounds in the city last Saturday by the announcement of a game with Crystal Lake. The "Island City" boys won a great game by a score of 22 to 10, while the Crystal Lake boys were perfect gentlemen and very congenial fellows." How you played the game was as important as the results.

The high school organized their first team in 1896. After a couple years of minimal competition, they would join the newly formed Barron County League in 1898 where they won eight, lost three and tied one their first season. With this background of interest, it was no surprise the events of this July 4th would include a baseball game as part of the day's activities.

The 1925 Cumberland team was coached by Pete Sirianni and their top player was Victor Polachek. He was described as, "A baseball player of extraordinary

talent and a clean sportsman." The team's best pitcher, Polachek would soon be leaving the city for Kenosha, where he had accepted a position with the Nash Motor Company.

The week prior to the 4th, the Cumberland nine dropped a 9 to 5 game to Rice Lake during the Barron County Fair. Coach Sirianni was not pleased with the contest saying, "Rice Lake claimed themselves to be home team and refused to let us choose between outs and ins. It seems that at a Fair, no team should have that right."

He was also disappointed that a few players from Superior, who had initially been lined up to play with Cumberland at the Fair, had later refused to come unless, "Paid double the amount stipulated in the first agreement." He was instead forced to call Eau Claire and secure a couple of their players to take their place.

The 4th was a beautiful day. The paper would say of the event, "The attrac-

tions offered by the Legion brought to Cumberland the largest crowd that has ever visited the city in a single day." The activities of the celebration were largely made possible through donations, the largest of which were \$50 gifts from the State Bank, Company Store, S.W. Hines Company, Miller-Olcott Lumber, and the Cumberland Fruit Packaging Company.

The baseball game was called by the Advocate, "One of the best battles ever witnessed here." Tied 3 to 3 in the bottom of the ninth, it ended on a single by Gibson which hit the base umpires' foot. After a brief argument, the contest was declared over. A rematch of the two teams was scheduled for the following Sunday.

The activities of this day ended with the shooting off of fireworks at the beach in front of what the paper called, "An immense crowd." Another 4th was over, but the memories of that day and 4ths to come would certainly last much longer.

T-shirts will be handed out before the race. Medals will be awarded to 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in various age divisions for the running events.

An Outdoorsman's Journal

2023 Early Summer Update!

Hello friends,

This week I, Selina, am taking over the column to fill you all in with recent life updates and new developments in my education/professional development. Today my Dad flew into Schultz Lake in Ontario, Canada meanwhile I am 1400 miles to the Southwest near White River, Arizona sitting outside with a temperature of 79 but UV index of 10. I am here for the summer working for the US Fish and Wildlife Service as a member of the Apache Trout Conservation crew, but I will get into more of those details later on.

Before I get too far ahead of myself I want to update you all on my senior year at UWSP and all of the activities I had going on during the school year. During the last few weeks of summer 2022 the Wildlife Biologist out at the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge, Brad Strobel, reached out to me wondering if I would be interested in helping teach the middle school students at Necedah N-Gage academy about natural resources and specifically stream ecology. This was truly a full circle moment for me as the wildlife refuge has been very impactful to me and had a major influence on my decision to pursue a career in natural resources. I also spent all of my K-12 education in Necedah. Throughout the year I visited Necedah twice a month to deliver lessons and help students create science projects comparing a restored and ditched portion of the Little Yellow River that flows through the refuge. Students were in the Little Yellow River starting in late March, and as you could imagine there were many filled waders, (including mine) and the water was COLD! All of the students were troopers though and there were few complaints, but many memories made by all.

This year I was the Vice President of our student subunit of the American Fisheries Society (AFS). With this role I organized the speakers for our weekly meetings which were made up of many fish biologists from Wisconsin and also the rest of the US. Perhaps most memorable was one from the Grand Canyon who said he grew up in Wisconsin and spent a lot of time in Necedah fishing on Castle Rock Lake. AFS also presents many unique opportunities like helping work up lake sturgeon when they spawn in the spring, broomball, and attending the WI AFS Confer-

ence where we got to hear about fisheries research happening throughout the state.

For the second year in a row I participated in undergraduate research at UWSP. This year my project focused on the influence of riparian habitat (area between fully aquatic and terrestrial habitat) on brook trout prey availability, diet, and body condition. Essentially I was looking to see if land use had any effect on the bugs available for brook trout to eat, what they were actually eating, and in turn the size of brook trout in that stretch of stream. The work associated with this project lasted the duration of the year with field work beginning in the fall, processing samples in the lab throughout the fall and winter, and creating my actual project during the winter and spring. Research was initially something I was very intimidated by and I did not think I would be able to complete it, but it has led to some of my most impactful learning experiences and I am very grateful to have had the opportunities to do it.

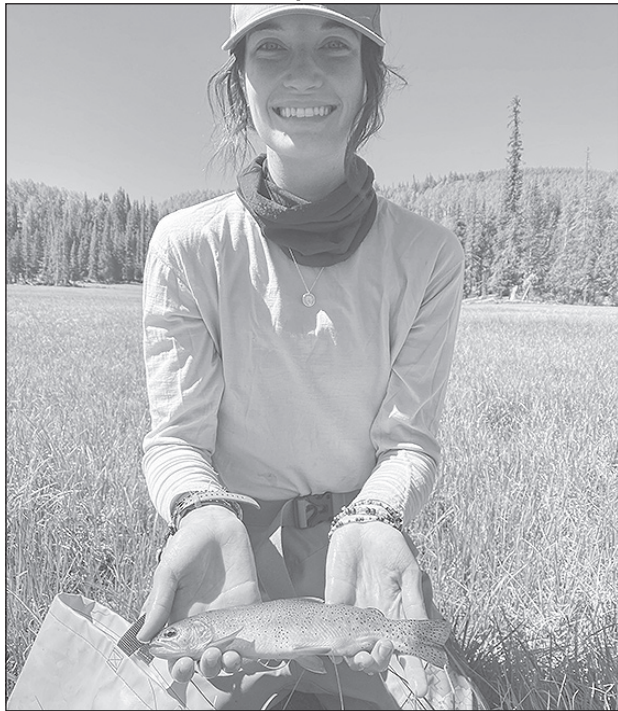
UWSP and the Aquatic Biomonitoring Lab (ABL) have turned me into quite the aquatic bug nerd, and I continued my job at the ABL this last year and was even promoted to Quality Control Officer. Jeff Dimick runs the ABL and has been a huge mentor during my time at UWSP, he may have even turned me into a bit of a “crazy bug lady”, as a dream career for me would involve aquatic macroinvertebrates, though they are not easy to find.

For right now though, I am (mostly) out of the school mindset and enjoying my time working down in Arizona! As I said earlier I am working for the USFWS as a part of the Apache Trout Conservation crew. Apache Trout are native to the White Mountains of Arizona and have a very small range. Non-native brook and brown trout outcompete and prey on Apache Trout, and they are currently listed as threatened on the Endangered Species List. As a part of the crew it is my job to electrofish some of the streams where they are present to perform population surveys and remove non-native species (this means sending the brook and brown trout to their maker).

I’m running low on room, but long story short: this academic year was the most challenging but reward-

ing year yet, and now I am down in Arizona climbing mountains in the snow (it has been cooler here than it has been in WI most of the time I’ve been here) to go and work with a threatened fish species!

I will write again at the end of summer to fill you in with more details about my job!

Heart O’ North Conference-Team Sportsmanship Awards

The Heart O’ North Conference has established a Team Sportsmanship Award that was awarded for the first time at the end of the 2008 fall sports. Conference sportsmanship is a two-part plan. Highway: County P
Location: County A North to 7th Street
Schedule: June 12 to September
Cost: \$2.54 million
Description: Pulverizing and relaying the existing pavement, placing asphalt pavement, completing culvert work and placing pavement markings.
Traffic impacts: County P is closed to through traffic.

Highway: County SS
Location: Chetek River Bridge in Chetek
Schedule: May 3 to July
Cost: \$956,783
Description: Replacing the bridge deck and girders, repairing and patching the abutments and making minor approach improvements.
Traffic impacts: County SS is closed at the bridge, with traffic being detoured via County M, US 53 and County I.

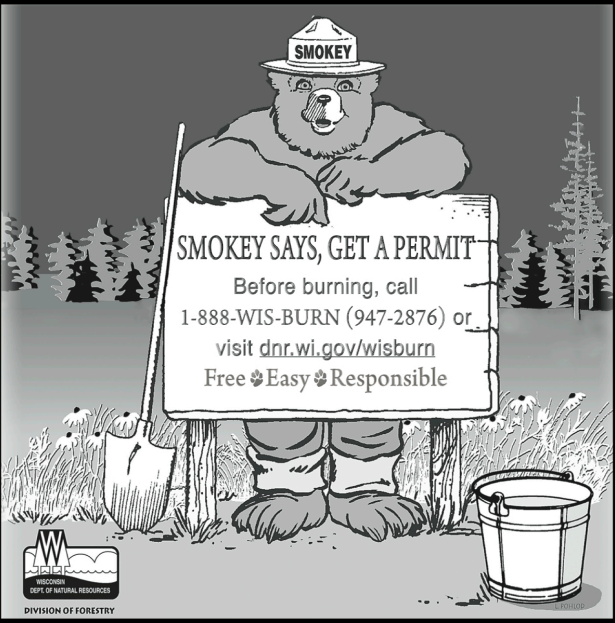

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1. Section 1.011 City Administrator/Utilities Manager is hereby created to read as follows:

1.011 City Administrator/Utilities Manager

(1) OFFICE OF THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR/UTILITIES MANAGER. In order to provide the City of Cumberland with a more efficient, effective, and responsible government under a system of Mayor and Common Council (hereinafter referred to as “Council”) at a time when city government is becoming increasingly complex, there is hereby created the Office of City Administrator/Utilities Manager for the City of Cumberland (hereinafter referred to as “Administrator”). All reference to the Administrator in any other part of the Municipal Code of the City of Cumberland or other City policy documents shall now hereby apply to the position of “City Administrator/Utilities Manager.”

(2) APPOINTMENT, TERM OF OFFICE, AND REMOVAL. The Administrator shall be appointed on the basis of merit with due regard to training, experience, administrative ability, and general fitness for the office by a majority vote of the Council. The Administrator shall hold office for an indefinite term subject to removal at any time by a majority vote of the Council. This section, however, shall not preclude the Council from establishing other employment terms and conditions not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance or the Municipal Code of the City of Cumberland.

(3) FUNCTIONS AND DUTIES OF THE ADMINISTRATOR. The Administrator, subject to the limitations defined in resolutions and ordinances of the City of Cumberland and Wisconsin State Statutes, shall be the chief administrative officer of the City responsible only to the Mayor and the Council for the proper administration of the business affairs of the City, pursuant to the statutes of the State of Wisconsin, the ordinances of the City of Cumberland, and the resolutions and directives of the Council with power and duties as follows:

- (a) Supervise and direct the administration of all departments, divisions, offices, municipal functions, and services under the control of the Council, except as otherwise provided by law.
- (b) Develop and issue administrative policies, rules, regulations, and procedures necessary to ensure the proper management of all departments, divisions, and offices.
- (c) Enforce all laws, city ordinance provisions, and resolutions of the City and, as necessary, make recommendations for revisions or additions.
- (d) Attend and participate in all discussions at all meetings of the Council and other bodies as required. Prepare the agenda for Council meetings with supporting materials and recommend action to be taken. The City Administrator/Utilities Manager shall represent the City at all functions as appropriate and not in conflict with the prerogatives of the Mayor and the Council.
- (e) Prepare and submit an annual budget to the Council and administer it after receiving Council approval.
- (f) Administer and manage the finances of the City subject to Council approval.
- (g) Advise the Council as to the financial condition of the City.
- (h) Supervise the City employees and direct all personnel matters as provided for by the personnel policies established by the Council. Oversee planning and zoning issues.
- (i) Recommend and submit to the Council for consideration of:
 - i. Approval or disapproval of employment promotions, transfers, suspensions, discipline, or removal of City employees.
 - ii. Wages, salaries, and other benefits.
 - iii. Hiring of new employees including recruitment, screening, and interviewing of prospective employees.
- (j) Supervise purchasing, including the making or letting of purchases and contracts in accordance with policies established by the Council and applicable laws; provide for the receipt of estimates, quotations, and sealed bids and submit to the Council as appropriate.
- (k) Monitor all consultant and contract work performed for the City.
- (l) Coordinate the City Attorney's activities for the City.
- (m) Prepare and/or provide periodic reports, summaries, information, and recommendations relating to municipal services, projects, and issues for submittal to the Council.
- (n) Perform such other duties as may be placed under the City Administrator/Utilities

Manager's jurisdiction by Council action, job description, or as required by law.

(4) GENERAL SUPERVISION. No member of the Council or the Mayor shall interfere with, or prevent the City Administrator/Utilities Manager from exercising the City Administrator/Utilities Manager's own good faith judgment in the administration of the City. Except for the purpose of inquiry, no member of the Council or the Mayor shall individually dictate to or exercise control over the administration of the City, and no member shall give orders to any department head or employee except through a majority vote of the Council.

Section 2. Section 1.012 Office of City Clerk and Office of City Treasurer is hereby created to read as follows:

1.012 Office of City Clerk and Office of City Treasurer.

(1) APPOINTMENT NOT TO BE GOVERNED BY STATUTES. The City of Cumberland, pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§62.09 and 66.0101 hereby elects not to be governed by those portions of Wis. Stat. Ch. 62 which are in conflict of this Section.

(2) OPTION TO COMBINE OFFICES. The offices of City Clerk and City Treasurer may be consolidated and the duties of both offices performed by the person appointed as City Clerk-Treasurer.

(3) DUTIES OF CITY CLERK. The City Clerk shall be responsible for performing those duties required by Wis. Stat. § 62.09(11) and for duties identified in the job description of the position to include but not be limited to:

- (a) Perform all election duties as required by Wisconsin Statute and keep and maintain all election records and all property used in conjunction with holding of elections;
- (b) Publish all legal notices unless otherwise provided, file, and preserve all contracts, bonds, oaths of office, and other documents not required to be filed elsewhere;
- (c) Issue all licenses required by ordinance or statute except as otherwise provided;
- (d) Prepare the tax roll and tax notices required by the State of Wisconsin;
- (e) Attend meetings, take minutes, and maintain files for the Common Council

and such other official boards and commissions as may be directed;

- (f) Maintain a file on all City records, ordinances, resolutions, and vouchers;
 - (g) Administer oaths and affirmations including serving as a Public Notary; and
 - (h) Perform other such duties as may be required of the office.
- (4) DUTIES OF CITY TREASURER. The City Treasurer shall be responsible for performing those duties required by Wis. Stat. § 62.09(9) and for duties identified in the job description of the position to include but not be limited to:
- (a) Maintain fiscal records for the City;
 - (b) Assist the City Assessor and Building Inspector in maintaining property assessment records;
 - (c) Make reports to the State on assessments;
 - (d) Perform recordkeeping, billing, collections, banking, investments, accounting, and financial reporting of all municipal operations;
 - (e) Develop and implement improved internal control and financial reporting procedures as necessary or as requested;
 - (f) Collect all taxes for the City and other taxing bodies;
 - (g) Invest idle funds for maximum interest earnings;
 - (h) Prepare or coordinate monthly financial reports;
 - (i) Prepare or coordinate check vouchers for payment of approved claims for signature;

(j) Assist the City Administrator/Utilities Manager with the preparation and compilation of the annual budget with approval of the Common Council;

(k) File financial and other reports with various state or federal agencies;

(l) Make property tax settlement with the County Treasurer and turn over to other taxing jurisdictions their proportionate share of property tax collections; and

(m) Perform such other duties as may be required of the office.

Section 3. Section 1.05 Appointed Officers is hereby amended to read as follows:
1.05 Appointed Officers

(1) ENUMERATED. The appointed officers of the City shall consist of the following:
...
(g) City Administrator/Utilities Manager
...

Section 4. Section 1.11 Utility Commission is hereby repealed and recreated in its entirety to read as follows:

Section 1.11 Utility Committee

(1) REFERENCE. Any reference to a Utility Commission in this Code, except as provided in Section 1.11(3), is to be construed as the Utility Committee created and authorized pursuant to this Section.

(2) MEMBERSHIP; TERMS. The Utility Committee shall consist of 5 members. One of the 5 members shall be a council member, who shall serve on the Committee without additional compensation and whose term shall be for one year. The council member will be subject to reappointment annually at the organizational meeting. The remaining 4 members shall be citizens of the City who are people of recognized experience and qualifications having a professional interest in the area of utilities, each of whom shall serve a 4-year term and whose terms shall be staggered so that no more than one member's term shall expire each year. The Mayor and City Administrator/Utilities Manager shall be ex-officio members of the Committee without the authority to vote. Each appointed citizen member shall serve on the Committee without compensation.

(3) INITIAL APPOINTMENTS: The current Utility Commission members will transfer their membership to the newly created Utility Committee. The members' terms will be converted to maintain the staggered term setup. All members with two or more years remaining in their term, will have their term reduced by one year.

- (4) APPOINTMENTS. The Mayor shall nominate and the City Council shall elect the members at its organizational meeting in April for terms to commence on May 1 following appointment. In the case of a vacancy on the Committee, the City Council, at a regular meeting, may appoint a member to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term.
- (5) CHAIRPERSON. At the initial meeting and at the first meeting following the organizational meeting, the Committee shall elect a Chairperson.
- (6) QUORUM. A majority of the members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum. If there is not a quorum present, the fact shall be entered in the minutes, and the meeting shall be adjourned. If the Chair is absent, the City Administrator/Utilities Manager or their designee shall call the meeting to order, and the Committee shall elect a Chair for that meeting.
- (7) POWERS OF COMMITTEE
- (a) Provide policy direction to the Common Council for the expansion, repair, and maintenance of the City’s utilities under City of Cumberland jurisdiction contained in the budget and coordinated with the City Administrator/Utilities Manager.
- (b) Ensure all projects reviewed under its jurisdiction have an identified funding source in compliance with the adopted budget policy. Monitor the budget during the fiscal year and recommend the budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The Committee shall have the authority to authorize projects to give immediate relief to special projects not anticipated with funding using the sanitary sewer contingency/reserve fund. Any such expenditure shall be immediately reported to the City Administrator/Utilities Manager.
- (c) Oversee the management of the City’s utilities, under City control, coordinated with the City Administrator/Utilities Manager.
- (d) To encourage quality standards for the utility systems of Cumberland and develop procedures to ensure those standards.
- (e) To foster and promote the development and utilization of improved methods affecting the utility systems.
- (f) To respond, when requested, to citizen interests or inquiries associated with the utility systems of the City of Cumberland. This shall include the right and responsibility to hear and investigate any complaints formally received pertaining to the quality of service under the jurisdiction of the Committee.
- (g) Review and propose appropriate action on all aspects of a community interest pertaining to the operation of the utility systems to the Common Council as may be required.
- (h) To promote area-wide coordination and liaison with the adjacent counties, cities, villages, townships, state and federal government on matters of mutual concern under the jurisdiction of the Committee.
- (i) To understand the interface and working relationship between the City’s utility systems with other agencies as appropriate for the purposes of utilizing resources in an optimum manner.
- (j) To work with the City Administrator/Utilities Manager and review annually the rate/fee structure and recommend and appropriate rate/fee(s) to the Common Council to maintain the fiscal integrity of the systems.
- (k) To make rules for its proceedings so long as they do not conflict with other City procedures. Rules and regulations as may be required under which the customers of the systems shall be served are subject to the approval of the Common Council.
- (l) To propose rules, regulations, resolutions, or ordinances for the operation of the utility systems as may be appropriate or provided by law.
- (m) The Committee shall utilize staff in the handling of all utility issues in the City.
- In the event the work involved causes conflicts with other staff priorities, it shall be the responsibility of the City Administrator/Utilities Manager to determine the priorities.
- (n) Work with the City Administrator/Utilities Manager in scheduling projects related to capital improvements adhering to the adopted capital improvement plan for the City.
- (o) The Committee shall follow all directives of the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin, as provided by law.

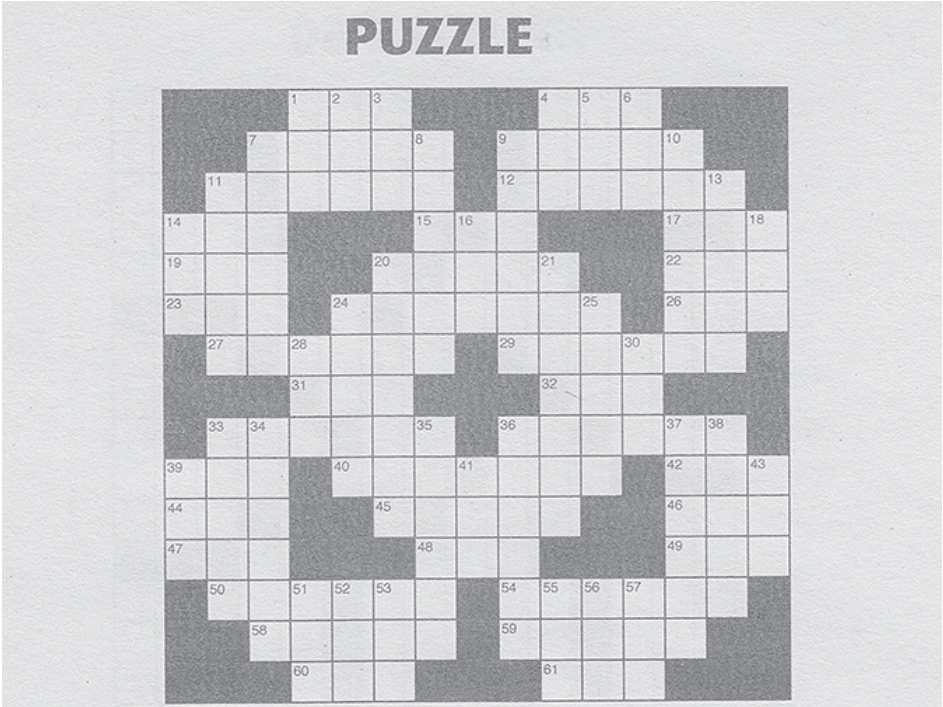
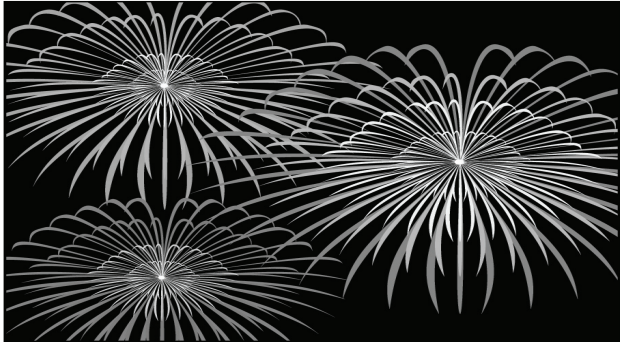

The male was later identified as Jesse Stelton.

When officers arrived, they made contact with the female in the city of Cameron. The female was transported to a hospital in Rice Lake.

The female’s face was swollen to the point that her left eye was completely swollen shut, and it was determined that the female had sustained a fractured jaw.

Officers learned that the assault had occurred after the female had left Aquafest. The criminal complaint states that Stelton was calling the female degrading names and she attempted to leave the area Stelton was in.

The criminal complaint goes on to state that Stelton allegedly pursued her, attacked her with a glass beer bottle striking her on her head. Stelton grabbed her around the throat

with both hands, telling her to “get in the vehicle.” The female lost consciousness.

While they were in the vehicle, the female tried to talk to Stelton calmly, however he punched her approximately four times with a closed fist, causing her to lose consciousness.

The criminal complaint also states that Stelton drove to Cameron, in an attempt to reach a residence there. During the drive, Stelton told the female that he wanted to take her where “no one would know where they were, and no one would know where to find her body.”

Once they were in Cameron, the female was able to exit the vehicle and run into a local business, where law enforcement were called for assistance and made contact with the female.

Law enforcement then located Stelton in a residence in Cameron, and Stelton told law enforcement that he had a knife and that he would stab himself if they entered the room he was in.

A K9 Unit also responded to the scene, and Stelton elected to leave the room he was in after the K9 Officer gave the K9 two or three commands. Stelton eventually dropped a large knife before he surrendered to officers.

On June 11, 2023, officers received information that Stelton had attempted to contact the female following his arrest. The criminal complaint states that the officer reviewed the cell phone information and he had placed 16 phone calls to the female from the Barron County Jail.

On June 12, 2023, Stelton appeared for a court hearing and the Honorable Maureen Boyle ordered a \$25,000 cash bond for Stelton. Stelton is prohibited from having contact with the victim in this case and is also prohibited from possession or consuming alcoholic beverages or entering establishments that sells alcohol.

A bail bond hearing was held on June 19, 2023, regarding Stelton’s bond, and Judge Boyle heard a motion from defense council for Stelton to modify his bond. Judge Boyle denied that motion.

Stelton is charged with Class I Felony Substantial Battery, Domestic Abuse, Class H Felony Strangulation and Suffocation, Class I Felony Failure to Comply with Officer’s Attempt to Take Person into Custody, and Misdemeanor Contact after Domestic Abuse Arrest.

If convicted, Stelton faces a potential sentence of over 13 years confinement is State Prison.

Northwoods Notebook: Bona’s new owners: From busy Dallas to quiet Stanfold

When Andrea Just was in high school, she worked at Bona Casa, the Italian restaurant her great grandparents, Anna and Tom Ricci, had founded. A few decades later, she and her husband, James, decided to leave the hectic city life in Dallas, Texas, for a quiet life in Stanfold Township, Wisconsin.

Last August, Andrea and James Manning bought the restaurant famous for its homemade cavatelli, ravioli, sausage and sauces. It sits, as it always has, southeast of Cumberland among farm fields — a setting about as different from where they had lived as you can get.

“I like the small town,” James said one day last week. “I like the quiet. I like being out of the city.”

And Andrea likes being back home, where she graduated from high school in 1997, and is glad she and her husband were able to buy the iconic restaurant she says is “meaningful to my family.” While her great grandparents sold Bona Casa to the Church family in the 1970s, many family members worked there over the years because “my great grandma, when she sold the place, had it in the paperwork that they had to hire any grandchildren who wanted to work here. We all kind of worked here.”

Andrea also worked at the Corner Bar when she was in high school, then left to attend college in the

Twin Cities, where she met James. They took jobs in Texas but decided a couple years ago they wanted to get back to the Midwest. While visiting St. Paul — where James was raised — in January of 2022, someone in Andrea’s family told them Bona Casa was for sale.

They drove to Cumberland in the snow and began negotiations that dragged into the summer. Armed with a small-business loan from a bank in Hudson, they closed on the deal in August and, in September, reopened the restaurant that the Churches had closed during the pandemic.

While Andrea had worked in restaurants, James was an IT guy whose hospitality-industry experience consisted of two weeks as a host at an Olive Garden. But wanting to get back to the Midwest and out of the big city, he agreed to buy the place that was started in 1957 by the Riccis.

“My mother was a Ricci,” Andrea said, and many members of that Cumberland family helped out once the Mannings took over. They needed help making pasta, sausage and sauce, and they got that help from relatives of hers who have the time to work there because they’re retired.

“It helps having a large family, and that’s what we benefited from,” James said. “I have no relatives in Wisconsin. My mother’s in St. Paul. A brother in Chicago. Her side of the family,

there’s dozens of them.”

And when the new owners were working seven long days making and selling, Andrea’s relatives “showed up,” she said.

“We were so touched,” she said. “They’re all retired. So they work a couple days a week. The hardest thing is hiring sausage makers and ravioli makers. My dad makes all the sausage. My mom and my aunts make cavatellis and ravioli.”

One of those aunts, Alison Just, joined them as manager, allowing them to leave, trusting “Aunt Al” to run the night operation and close up. She worked for 26 years as the cook at the Corner Bar.

Andrea and James live on four acres in Stanfold Township. James had to buy a riding lawnmower and snowblower, but his commute was shortened considerably from more than an hour on the freeways and weekly tolls of \$80 in Dallas, a city of 1.3 million.

“I was burned out with city traffic,” he said. “Now our only neighbors are cornfields, trees and an occasional bear.”

Two years ago, they began looking for two jobs in the Midwest. They found them in Stanfold Township.

“We both have jobs,” he said. “In a business we own.”

Running from May 27 to November 12, over 22 million people paid 50 cents a day to attend the event, which ran six miles along Lake Michigan.

To get there, all one had to do was buy a round-trip ticket from the Chicago and North Western Line, which left Cumberland on Friday, Saturday and Sundays. The cost for the trip, three nights of lodging at the New Palmer House in Chicago, breakfasts, admission to the exposition and sightseeing tours cost \$18.75, while a simple round trip coach ticket sold for \$8.30.

The cost of living in 1933 reflected the times. The cost of gas was 10 cents a gallon, bread was seven cents a loaf, hamburger 11 cents a pound, while one could purchase a car for less than \$500. A June 8 Advocate advertisement from the Johnson-Ecklie Company offered customers three pounds of bananas for 21 cents, three pounds of coffee for 59 cents, and five pounds of apples for 25 cents.

As July 4th neared, the June 29 paper contained the schedule for the following week’s activities. Sponsored by members of the Homer Anderson Legion Post, the day would be complete with a street parade, pony races, a merry-go-round for kids, baseball games, fireworks on the lake front, free vaudeville and circus acts, and two dances, either old time music at the Legion or modern time music at the Sherman garage. The Zim Zim Theatre, meanwhile, would be offering day long movies and food stands would be common throughout the city.

A gorgeous sunny day greeted those in attendance on the 4th. The paper called the Legion, “Masters of the art of a celebration,” saying “Everything moved like clockwork.” The parade that began the day drew a large crowd which lined the streets for several blocks. The parade winners included S.W. Hines Mercantile Company for most beautifully decorated float, the Roosevelt float for comedy, and the Kellerman float for their Cowboy presentation. Meanwhile, Mary Talbot took first place, Nancy Hopkins second and Authlee Markgren third in the buggy parade.

Although the celebration gave those in attendance a short break from the hardships of the depression, the ensuing week reminded the residents of what still need-

ed to be done. Five Cumberland boys, Arnold Flottum, Cecil Christensen, Morris Legacy, Bill Hopkins, and Edward Renslow, left for one of the work camps under the Federal Conservation Program. Established by President Roosevelt, the camps recruited unemployed young men from urban areas to perform conservation work throughout the nation’s forests, parks, and fields, as their parents received \$27 a month from their salary.

Considered by many to be one of the most successful of Roosevelt’s New Deal programs, the CCC planted more than three billion trees and constructed trails and shelters in more than 800 parks nationwide during its nine years of existence. The CCC helped to shape the modern national and state park systems we enjoy today.

There would be many more challenges ahead as the “Island City” moved from July to August that summer. But the 4th remained an opportunity to stop and enjoy the blessings we had despite the demands the depression and an eventual war had to offer.

- January 5 Construction of the Golden Gate Bridge begins in San Francisco Bay.
- Calvin Coolidge, 30th President of the U.S (1923–1929) dies of coronary thrombosis in Northampton, Massachusetts.
- January 17 – The U.S. Congress votes favorably for Philippines independence, against the view of President Herbert Hoover.
- January 23 – The Twentieth Amendment to the United States Constitution is ratified, changing Inauguration Day from March 4 to January 20.
- January 30 – The Lone Ranger debuts on American radio.
- March 4 Franklin D. Roosevelt is sworn in as the 32nd President of the United States, who in reference to the Great Depression, proclaims “The only thing we have to fear, is fear itself” in his inauguration speech. He is sworn in by Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, beginning the first 100 days of Franklin D. Roosevelt’s presidency. Roosevelt’s paralytic illness is never publicly acknowledged during what will be the four terms of his Presidency. This is the last time Inauguration Day in the U.S. occurs on this date.

John Nance Garner is sworn in as Vice President of the United States.

- March 5 – Great Depression: President Franklin D. Roosevelt declares a “bank holiday”, closing all United States banks and freezing all financial transactions (the ‘holiday’ ends on March 13).
- March 6 – Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago dies of the wound he received on February 15.
- March 9 – Great Depression: The U.S. Congress begins its first 100 days of enacting New Deal legislation.
- March 10 – The 6.4 Mw Long Beach earthquake affects the Greater Los Angeles Area with a maximum Mercalli intensity of VIII (Severe), leaving 115–120 people dead, and causing an estimated \$40 million in damage.
- March 12 – Great Depression: Franklin D. Roosevelt addresses the nation for the first time as President of the United States, in the first of his “Fireside Chats”.
- June 5 – The U.S. Congress abrogates the United States’ use of the gold standard by enacting a joint resolution (48 Stat. 112) nullifying the right of creditors to demand payment in gold.
- June 6 – The first drive-in theater opens in Camden, New Jersey.
- June 15 – National Guard Bureau founded.
- June 17 – Union Station Massacre: In Kansas City, Missouri, Pretty Boy Floyd kills four unarmed FBI agents and accidentally kills fugitive Frank Nash in an attempt to free Nash.
- June 26 – The American Totalisator Company unveils its first electronic pari-mutuel betting machine at the Arlington Park Racetrack near Chicago.
- July–September[edit]
- July 1 – Business Plot: Smedley Butler becomes involved in a secret coup attempt led by Gerald MacGuire against President of the United States Franklin Delano Roosevelt which fails (according to his own testimony in 1934).
- July 6 – The first Major League Baseball All-Star Game is played at Comiskey Park in Chicago.
- July 22 – “Machine-Gun” Kelly and Al-bert Bates kidnap Charles Urschel, an Oklahoma oilman, and demand \$200,000 ransom.
