

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



WisDOT: April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month

Last year in Wisconsin, 113 people were killed in distracted driving crashes.

Kaitlyn Vegter was driving to Janesville in January 2016 on a clear straight highway. She reached down to change the music on her smart phone and took her eyes off the road just for a few seconds when her life suddenly changed forever. Traveling at highway speed, her car slammed into the back of a pay loader that was turning into a farm driveway. Defying the odds, she survived the crash but suffered extensive injuries that required her to learn how to walk, talk and even eat. "At age 20, I was like a child who had to learn everything over," she said.

To warn others of the dangers of distracted driving, Kaitlyn told her story in a video available on the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's (WisDOT) YouTube channel <https://youtu.be/PmD9ynQnU4>. "Everyone needs to realize that the catastrophic consequences of distracted driving, also known as inattentive driving, are not exaggerated and are a growing threat to everyone on the road. That's why April has been designated as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month," says David Pabst, director of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

In addition, WisDOT will continue to display messages warning about the dangers of distracted driving on electronic signs on major highways.

Pabst says, "Even though you may have a busy life and routinely try to multi-task, it's time to put a stop to distracted driving habits, which put your life and the lives of others in grave danger."

An Outdoorsman's Journal

Thirty one hours on the mighty Mississippi

Hello friends.

This week I spent all but ten minutes of a 31-hour adventure living in my boat, on pool 9 on the Mississippi River near Genoa. I had not fished near this dam on open water before and spent the majority of my experience fishing for perch and walleye very close to Clement's Fishing Float.

Tuesday, March 28th

High 47, low 33

I had planned on doing this adventure by myself but yesterday my 23-year-old stepson, Joey Dushek, asked me if I would like to spend a day fishing on the Mississippi River near Genoa, so Joey ad I drove separate and met near Tomah at 5:00 this morning and that is how our adventure began.

So we launch my 18.6 War Eagle and we are headed to what we hope is perch paradise and let me tell you by all the folks waiting on the beach to fish the float and the busy boat landing, we are not the only ones with high hopes.

Joey had a buddy that fished here two days before so we had some inside info. Here is the reality of fishing here in late March. It looked like there was probably a 150 people on the float and for maybe 10-acres of water there was probably 70-boats and let me tell you, you see some really good fishermen, some really good boat handlers and some quite poor and rude boat handlers.

The fishing is off the bottom with sliding sinkers or three way harnesses tipped with a red worm, crawler or a minnow and the walleye fishermen use jigs. The action on the float was pretty steady with 8-11 inch fish with some much larger perch and lots of red horse. For those of us in boats it seemed to be red horse and very few perch. It was very few perch until Joe and I made a move closer to the float and set up shop for the next ten-hours. We could see most fishermen on the float and they could see us

and what a world that is with so many people catching perch and trying to have a good time, I was really impressed.

So Joey and I had limited success landing/keeping 15-perch in the 9-11 inch range and a great many red horse. Close to dark, I took Joey to shore and on the ride back had some pretty bad luck when I hit something that did some fairly serious damage to my prop and hopefully not my lower unit on my 90-hp ETEC!

I try not to get caught up in things that I can't do anything about and the next phase of this 31-hour adventure would have me walleye fishing and spending the night sleeping on the floor of my boat.

I had some good luck when I caught a 15.25-inch walleye about one minute after starting to fish again and I was really excited for my evening. As luck would have it, I caught six more walleye but that was my only legal fish.

Later in the evening, I put a sleeping pad on the floor of my boat, unrolled my sleeping bag and slept like a baby until an hour before daylight.

Wednesday, March 29th

High 46, low 35

I knew exactly where I wanted to position the War Eagle for having my best chance at some top-notch perch fishing and as I was making my move in the dark, I literally beat a boat coming in from the landing by ten seconds.

So it dark, I have my Coleman lantern running and I am killing time. At daybreak, a steady bite of perch began and by steady, I mean you might get one chance every five minutes and only half of the perch were keepers "I like them to be at least 9-inches."

There were a lot of fishermen near me and everyone kind of talks to each other and you can see who knows how to fish and does not and the same with boat handling, you can also see a lot about people's

character and as much as I hate to admit it, not everyone on the water is considerate of their neighbors.

I seemed to have a hot pole today, and loved my perch fishing experience and even lied my neighbors a bit by cooking venison back strap in front of them.

I had to head home one way or another at 1:00 pm. and had 24 perch in the livewell at the time. I decided to work a little overtime and caught number 25 at 1:20 and really have to say I enjoyed this section of river and watching the folks both on the float and in their boats enjoying life on the mighty Mississippi River.

For approximately 15 of the 18 years Cumberland has been sending students to Wolf Ridge, former science teacher David Frye was the lead on the Wolf Ridge project. He led the trips each year until his death in 2015. His love of nature, boundless energy and excitement over the students growth and learning helped make each year a special memory for the kids.

That gave Cumberland School Board Vice President, Jennifer Hyatt an idea. She thought that the Cumberland schools should place some kind of permanent memorial to Dave at Wolf Ridge. What better to remember Cumberland by than a Beaver! She enlisted the aid of Justin Peterson, who went looking for a taxidermist who just might have one to donate. He didn't have any luck.

Then Greg and Gina Simon came to the rescue. The Simons donated a beaver carcass to the Island City Academy and teacher Sheri Johnson. Sheri's Father-in-law, Jeff Johnson and a friend who is a licensed taxidermist, stuffed the beaver and the ICA kids made a display mount for it and a plaque in memory of David Frye. It will be presented during the year's trip the week of April 3-7.

The total cost for all sixth graders and their chaperones

to attend Wolf Ridge for five days is \$17,360. In order to defray the cost, each student is asked to pay \$65. They can off-set the cost to their families by working various events (brat and concession stands, selling Louie's gift cards, etc.). The rest of the cost is covered by community donations and the school district includes \$7,000 in the budget annually for this event.

During their time at Wolf Ridge the students are totally "off the grid," - no electronics allowed, including cell phones. Digital cameras are the only technology acceptable.

From my three daughters' experiences at Wolf Ridge, I know what a valuable learning experience this is. Every one of them came back with more confidence and self-assurance than when they left. They couldn't wait to share their experiences and what they learned.

The kids will be back on Friday. Find yourself a sixth grader and ask them what they learned at Wolf Ridge. You will love the stories they will tell.

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

CUMBERLAND EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION LEGACY GRANT RECIPIENTS

The Cumberland Educational Foundation was established in 2003 with the purpose of strengthening community participation in Cumberland schools and providing support for creative educational programs. Each year, school staff members are invited to submit proposals for innovative projects that will enrich and inspire students. This year, two proposals were selected.

Cumberland Rural Arts Project (RAP)

The Cumberland Rural Arts Project (RAP) is designed to facilitate high quality musical enrichment and instruction to students in the Cumberland School District.

The Cumberland RAP has three main components that will take place over a two-year period. The Commissioned Composer/Artist in Residence portion of the Rural Arts Project will bring a nationally known composer to Cumberland. This composer will write a piece of literature specifically for the Cumberland High School Band. By commissioning a new piece of literature for a specific purpose or event, students become active participants in the creation of a legacy for the future. Commissioning is a process. From the moment of inspiration and conception to the exciting night of the premiere performance, there are important decisions to be made; creative ideas to be explored, and memorable moments when the commissioner, composer, and students collaborate in their own ways to give birth to a new work of art. That piece of music will become a lasting legacy in the Wind Band Literature, available for performance throughout the world for many years to come.

The second component is a guitar lab of 20 guitars. This lab is yet another way of reaching students through music; especially students who are not conventional choir or band members. The intent is to add a guitar curriculum to 6th grade music classes, which would offer another form of self-expression, improve basic music literacy, coordination, perseverance, personal responsibility, and knowledge of music history. A successful guitar lab could easily be extended to 7-12 grade students in the future.

The third component is designed to help students who wish to propel their musical, dance, artistic, or acting instruction to the next level. The location of our school community is an obstacle for many students studying the arts. This part of the grant would focus on joining qualified students with professional musicians, artists, and university professors. All students in the Cumberland School District are eligible to apply for private lessons. Details about applications, restrictions, and qualifications will be released in the Spring. Those selected would receive one year of free lessons.

The B.e.s.t. Screener

The Elementary and early Middle School students from Cumberland School District will participate in the B.e.s.t. Screener for the 2017-2018 school year. The B.e.s.t. Screener was created by Dr. Eric Hartwig, a former school psychologist and administrator from the Wausau area. The Cumberland Elementary Staff have had the opportunity to work face-to-face with Dr. Hartwig twice during the 2016-2017 school year, thanks to a one time grant through Security Health that Kristin Olson, Cumberland School District Nurse, helped to secure.

The purpose of the B.e.s.t. Screener is to determine if there are social emotional or behavioral concerns with students that are interfering with their growth both emotionally and educationally. The screener will go on to help our teachers and professional staff provide a path for individual students to get the support that they need.

Universally screening all students in the area of mental health is a relatively new idea in the education community and Cumberland School District is on the cutting edge of helping to provide our students with mental health support. Our district is also working towards a consortium with other Barron County schools to provide a day treatment type of support to our students. Teachers will use the B.e.s.t. Screener to screen the students in their classrooms and to provide insight on what will help each individual student succeed in the classroom and community.
