Minnesota man sets signal fire in Lundmark Camper lot

Cory B. Ackland, 20, of Farmington, MN., has been charged with misdemeanor theft and criminal damage to property. The criminal complaint states that on Monday, May 8, 2017, at approximately 11:28 p.m. Barron County Dispatch received a call from a subject who said he was dropping off a camper at Lundmark Campers on Highway 63 in Cumberland, when he observed a suspicious vehicle and subjects near a dumpster. He said that one of the subjects was next to a large fire in the parking lot and the subject appeared to be playing with the fire. He stated he made contact with the subject who said the radiator went out in his vehicle and he created a fire as an SOS signal.

Cumberland Police Officer Smith arrived on scene first. Deputy Pressley of the Barron County Sheriff's Department arrived at approximately 11:50 p.m. and made contact with Officer Smith, who had one subject identified as Corey Ackland, in the rear seat of his squad car. Officer Smith said the subjects stated they were having car trouble and the fire was allegedly set as a signal fire for help. Officer Smith said that the other

man was still in the driver's seat of the vehicle and did not know what had happened in the parking lot.

Deputy Pressley made contact with the subject in the driver's seat, who said he had picked Ackland up from a residence in Spooner and they were heading to the Turtle Lake Casino Hotel. He said that when he picked up Ackland at a residence, he noticed that Ackland had a book in his hand and brought the book with him. He said his car had overheated, causing him to pull over into the parking lot of Lundmark Camper Sales. He said he fell asleep in the car waiting for help to arrive and didn't wake up until law enforcement arrived.

Deputy Pressley then made contact with Ackland, who stated he did build a small controlled fire near the roadway to signal for help as he did not have a cell phone and could not use the other subject's cell phone because he was sleeping. Later in the contact, Ackland explained that the other subject's cell phone had been used to contact people for help. Deputy Pressley observed that Ackland was holding a book in his hand. He asked Ackland if any of



xie's on Grand. But Dixie's isn't in Cumberland. So she made a proposal to the golf-course board that she lease the kitchen and dining room and open her own place. She'll pay a percentage of her sales to the golf course as rent. In recent years, the golf course has had very limited food service - a fish fry on Fridays, burgers and hot dogs on a grill outside.

She presented the idea of leasing the kitchen and dining room to Tony Diehl, the golf course manager who left for another job a few weeks ago. Tony and Abby agreed there is "so much potential in this kitchen."

She said: "I just knew with my background I could make something work out of that kitchen, and offer something to eat for the golfers."

The menu is sandwiches, soup and salads, and there will be dinner specials. She brought a chef with her from St. Paul. Erin Lege, a Louisiana native who worked with Abby at Dixie's for several years, is helping her get things going. But he'll probably stay for the summer, having been bitten by the Cumberland bug.

"I'm from a community of 500 people," Erin said. "Cumberland reminded me of where I was from - small town, very intertwined, very

souful."

He left the St. Paul restaurant to do something else. And, for now, the something else is helping his friend, Abby, get her restaurant up and running. He'll continue the Friday fish, but with his special batter, and Saturday will be rib night. Erin might share his southern culture with us by offering catfish and jambalaya occasionally.

Abby's sister, Cheryl Ortuist, will work with her. In fact, Abby has named the business "Two Sisters Catering." The restaurant will be called "The Turn" because it's at the turn from the ninth hole to the tenth.

She knows the restaurant business is risky. But she feels good about doing it.

"I'm very much at peace with this decision," she said while taking a break from prepping for the May 16 opening. "I love it here because I have a lot of family history here, and it's a beautiful area that's fairly undiscovered. My sister and I are very close. My kids are grown and onto their own lives, and it just feels like home to me."

And she'll be able to take a boat to work from her cabin on the other side of the lake. You can't do that in St. Paul.

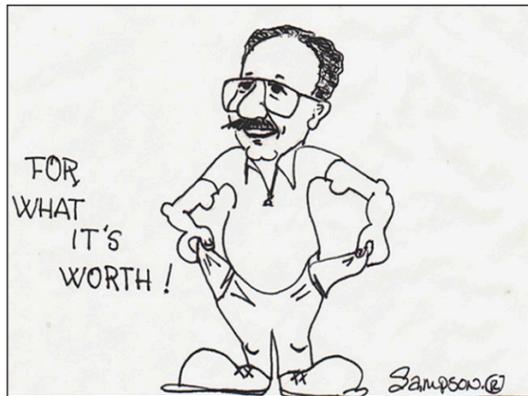

Inside Wisconsin

Controlling health care costs appears lost in latest debate over insurance plans

MADISON – Just across Wisconsin's southwest border in the Iowa city of Dubuque, about 1,000 people showed up Tuesday night for a town hall meeting with U.S. Rep. Rod Blum, a Republican software company owner who represents northeast Iowa in the House of Representatives.

By all reports, it wasn't a lovefest.

People upset with Blum's May 4 vote in favor of repealing the Affordable Care Act shouted him down as he tried to explain why he believed the repeal of "Obamacare" would help far more Iowans than it would hurt. Many in the crowd weren't buying it, however, and loudly expressed their frustrations over the GOP's repeal of Obamacare's insurance rules.

It's a scenario being repeated across the United States as the debate over health-care reform has reverted to a fixation on reforming health insurance – at best, only part of the problem – versus health care itself.

The real problem with health care in the United States is that it costs more than what the nation's economy gets in return. Health-care costs in the United States stand at 17.1 percent of gross domestic product,

compared with 13.1 percent of GDP in 1995. Those figures are far higher than comparable GDP shares in other industrial nations, including Germany (11.3 percent today versus 9.4 percent in 1995); Japan (10.2 percent and 6.6 percent); Great Britain (9.1 percent and 6.7 percent); and China (5.5 percent and 3.5 percent).

While health-care costs are rising around the world, too, the threat to sustainable prosperity in the United States is larger because of the GDP share devoted to health care is much bigger.

Businesses bear much of the burden under the U.S. system, which means they must struggle to compete in the face of rising costs. Corporations spend about \$12,600 annually to cover a family of four, concluded a study by the Kaiser Family Foundation. That has increased 54 percent since 2005.

Which is a bigger drag on companies trying to compete in a global economy: Health care costs at 17 percent of GDP or corporate taxes at 2 percent of GDP? For most companies, the answer is health care costs.

That's a nuanced and somewhat qualified answer, of course. Most companies will pay what it takes to cover their workers if higher

quality care leads to better employee recruitment, attendance, morale and retention. Fortunately, Wisconsin fares much better than most states on the health-care quality scale.

Health-care costs will remain high nationally, however, so long as the debate continues to focus on health insurance reform versus health care reform.

Insurance companies are basically "middle men" in the debate while companies are generally on the front lines of holding down costs. And why not? American companies, large and small, are responsible for covering 150 million people.

Some companies have saved money by aggressively pushing primary and preventive care versus waiting until workers are sick and even hospitalized. Costs can decline by 25 percent or so through proactive primary care, many Wisconsin companies have discovered.

Others have gone to the "medical home" approach, an enhanced primary-care model that provides comprehensive and timely care with appropriate reimbursement, emphasizing the central role of teamwork and engagement by those receiving care.

Companies also put pressure on the health-care sys-



tem for cost transparency, which can vary wildly from plan to plan and location to location.

Higher drug costs are also a major contributor to the problem. John Torinus, the chief executive officer for Serigraph Inc. in West Bend, wrote recently about his company's otherwise successful efforts to control health-care costs. The company and its workers drove down costs by \$295,000 on a \$6-million total bill in 2016, Torinus wrote, but those savings were reduced by a \$228,000 increase in prescription drug costs.

"Ten years ago, we spent 10 percent of our health bill on pharmaceuticals," Torinus wrote. "In the fourth quarter of 2016, drugs cost us 22.5 percent."

As the U.S. Senate prepares to take up the House-passed bill, it should turn to the private sector for advice on what works to control health costs without sacrificing – and even improving – health care quality. There are ample examples of best practices that could inform the larger debate.

the property inside the vehicle was his and Ackland said no, “just my book.” Deputy Fick asked Ackland if he could see his book, which Ackland agreed to. Deputy Fick opened the book and located five checks belonging to the bank account of Lundmark Camper Sales. The checks were written out to various businesses and signed by Peggy Lundmark.

Ackland gave multiple explanations regarding the book and the checks, including that the book was from the library and he did not know anything about the checks. He later stated that he found the book in the ditch near the camper sales property and the checks were located inside of the book. Deputy Fick observed that the book had a Spooner Library sticker. Ackland had admitted that the subject picked him up at a residence in Spooner. The other subject also identified the book that contained the checks as the same book Ackland had when he picked him up earlier.

Sgt. Hulback made contact with Terry Lundmark, the property owner of Lundmark Camper Sales. Terry Lundmark made contact with Peggy, who stated that she placed the checks in envelopes and put them into their mailbox out in front of the business on May 8th, prior to her leaving for the evening. The envelopes in which the checks had been placed were not located by law enforcement and could have been burned in the fires started by Ackland.

Sgt. Hulback observed that there had been two fires set in the parking lot. He observed one of the fires was set behind the dumpster next to the vehicle the men had arrived in. He also observed the paperwork that had been burned in the fire and was able to identify one piece of paper as a Charter Communications bill for Lundmark Campers. One of the checks located in the book possessed by Ackland was a check written to Charter Communications on the Lundmark Campers account.

If convicted Ackland may be fined not more than \$20,000 or imprisoned for not more than one year and six months, or both. His hearing is scheduled for June 14, 2017.

Deputy Weise conducted a pat-down for officer safety before he placed Elich in his squad car, and he located a small clear plastic jar with a screw top containing green leafy substance inside the jar. Based on his training and experience he believed the substance was marijuana.

At the Barron County Sheriff's Department Deputy Weise asked Elich to perform some field sobriety tests, which he agreed to do, but which he failed to perform satisfactorily. Deputy Weise observed Elich was swaying and unsteady on his balance. Elich advised he could not believe he had caused an accident. He admitted he had consumed synthetic marijuana approximately 30 minutes prior to the accident.

Deputy Weise formed the opinion that Elich was under the influence of a controlled substance and placed him under arrest for operating while intoxicated. A sample of Elich's blood was taken and later mailed to the State Hygiene Lab.

Deputy Weise further reports the female driver of the Ford, was identified as Monica Waite. Sgt. Beranek reports she was transported to the Barron Hospital as a result of injuries she sustained in the accident. Her injuries included a broken arm and an injury to her back.

The male driver of the

Toyota, was identified as Eugene Koci. The passenger was identified as Mary Koci. Sgt. Beranek reported Eugene suffered a bruised chest and Mary suffered a broken left arm and bruised chest during the accident.

Deputy Weise read the pre-interrogation warning form to Elich, and he agreed to answer questions. Elich admitted there was a one-hitter pipe in the vehicle and more synthetic marijuana in his backpack. Elich admitted the stuff that was found in his pocket was synthetic marijuana. He also admitted to consuming synthetic marijuana prior to leaving Barron just before the crash. He admitted that the effects of synthetic marijuana are just like being stoned.

Deputy Weise conducted an inventory search of the Chevy and located a black backpack which contained a black foil package containing a green leafy substance which he believed to be synthetic marijuana. Also located was a bag with a long wire which appeared to be a cleaning rod for the one hitter pipe that was located by other deputies in the vehicle.

If convicted Elich may be fined not more than \$5,000 or imprisoned for not more than two years and six months, or both. His driver's license may also be revoked for not more than four years and he will be required to undertake an alcohol and drug abuse assessment and follow through with treatment recommendations as a condition on reinstatement. His hearing will be held June 7, 2017.

An Outdoorsman's Journal

Forty-Eight Hours to Catch or Shoot Dinner

Hello friends,

My home in northern Juneau County is very close to the Petenwell Flowage, Castle Rock Lake and a couple of hundred thousand acres of land open to the public for hunting.

I live about a mile from the Petenwell and even closer to what is called the "trout ditch" which is kind of a back flow stream for the Petenwell, which has trout in it.

I am kind of embarrassed to say that even though I have lived right next to it for 17-years, I have never fished this beautiful stream, so this week I came up with a rather unique plan.

My plan was to vanish into a large forest with two fishing rods, a very small tent and my 12-gauge, as it was the 3rd turkey season and I had a tag.

I was not allowing myself to bring any food, other than salt, pepper and olive oil. If I caught some trout or was lucky enough to harvest a turkey, I would cook my dinner wrapped in aluminum foil over a small fire.

This would be a 48-hour feast or famine experience.

Saturday, May 6th

High 63, low 41

I actually turned around and went home and ate a tube of Ritz crackers and peanut butter after heading out today, when I remembered my next meal might not be for a full two days.

So I am a nut job and I like pushing things to the edge and really enjoy hunting, fishing and camping. Plan one, after a short hike with a backpack and pulling an Otter Sled loaded with gear, was to build a quick camp which meant a tent, bedroll and creating my refrigerator to keep my trout and turkey.

The following is a simple 72-hour wilderness refrigerator. Dig a hole about 20-inches deep and 16-inches wide. Put a frozen milk jug of water in it and cover the hole with a jacket or moss.

So late this afternoon, I fish trout for the first time on this beautiful stream and I have to admit, I love trout fishing. At first the action was no action, then

I caught an 8- inch brook trout. I let it go and though things were kind of slow, I caught two more that were just about ten-inches. Just before dark I headed back to camp, put my brookies in the fridge and headed to my beautiful wilderness bedroom.

Sunday, May 7th
High 65, low 39

I was up a 4:45 and fishing by 5:15. I was using the typical split shot and a small hook with a night crawler for bait. I fished where I did last night and had nothing happen for a half hour and then I relocated to a downed oak tree in the creek and caught four brookies of which 3 came back to camp with me.

I thought sure I would hear turkey gobbling and like yesterday had my 12-gauge, and every once in a while let out a yelp with my box call, no action in that area.

Twenty four hours after eating the Ritz and peanut butter the five trout I had kept were cooked over a very small fire and then I ate everyone of them, that my friends was an awesome meal.

I spent the last five hours of daylight running and gunning for turkey and did not come close to hearing or seeing one.

When I made it back to camp at dark, I was very hungry and kept thinking about my grammas cooking and instead went to bed where I pulled 9 wood ticks off from me. Only one was embedded.

The following morning I was fishing at 5:10 and caught my limit of three brook trout. Exactly 24-hours after yesterday's meal of brook trout I ate again and holy moly, brook trout makes for some fine eating.

Twice on this adventure I had the affects of low blood sugar, which can happen pretty easy on a 6-foot body that only weighs 160-pounds, but all in all I held up well and had a blast.

It would probably do our country well if every kid did this from the age of 14 to 18, but that's a whole different story.

WisDOT: Hot weather means more chances of pavement buckling

Drivers asked to be alert for potential pavement problems, traffic slow-downs, and to Move Over for roadside workers including highway repair crews

Unusually hot weather in the forecast, could create conditions for pavement buckling. Motorists are asked to take extra caution.

Pavement buckles are most common when the weather quickly goes from cool to very hot, causing pavement to expand. Where there are expansion joints, slabs of pavement push against each other and if the pressure becomes great enough the pavement can buckle. While it's difficult to predict if or where buckling may occur, WisDOT offers the following tips for motorists:

- Slow down, buckle up and eliminate distractions to focus your full attention on the roadway. Along with pavement issues, other concerns this time of year can include deer or debris on the roadway.
- Watch for slowing traffic and be ready to move over for all roadside workers including highway crews as they repair damaged pavement.
- Before your trip, check the 511 Travel Information system (www.511wi.gov) for the latest on any incidents or delays.
- If necessary, report serious pavement issues by calling 911. Be ready to provide specific location information.

Have a plan; Severe weather season is upon us

As we approach tornado and severe weather season, it is important to be aware of emergency notification devices in your area.

Within Barron County, outdoor tornado/severe weather warning sirens are activated to alert those working or playing outside of severe weather approaching and to go indoors to monitor the television and/or radio station for further weather details. Cities and Villages within Barron County have been notified and encouraged to begin their monthly test of the severe weather warning system beginning the first Monday of April at 11:00 AM. This test will continue monthly on the first Monday of each month at 11:00 AM unless threatening weather is present at that hour. The test will continue through the summer months, with sirens sounding for approximately 1½ minutes on each test. Residents of Bar-

ron County should realize during a severe thunderstorm warning, tornado warning or an actual tornado, the sirens will sound for three minutes.

The primary purpose of the monthly test is to check the working condition of all equipment throughout Barron County. It also reminds the public we are now in the season for severe weather and they should be aware severe storms are possible.

We encourage each person within Barron County to form some kind of plan regarding what they will do should a severe storm or tornado approach their location. This planning should include schools, hospitals, nursing homes, campgrounds and business establishments who have employees or who may be open to the general public.

When a tornado or severe thunderstorm approaches, immediate action must be taken to avoid severe injury

or possible death. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado shelter, underground excavation, steel-framed or reinforced cement building or substantial construction. Stay away from windows.

In a home and small buildings, go to the basement or interior portion of the lowest level, closets, bathrooms or interior halls. Get under something sturdy. Leave mobile homes or vehicles to go to a substantial structure. If there is no shelter nearby, lay flat in a ditch or a ravine with your hands shielding your head. Again, stay away from windows. Do not call your local fire or police department to inquire what is happening. Monitor a local TV or radio station.

Washburn County Wants You to Register for CodeRED Alerts!

Emergency Management urges all residents and second home owners in Washburn County to register their contact information with the County mass notification system called - CodeRED. This free system will help to notify residents of emergency information through calls, text messages and emails and will be used to keep you informed on issues that impact your safety!

Washburn County has identified a number of potential natural (and man-made) hazards, (i.e. Wildland Fire, Tornado, Floods, etc.) and CodeRED is a great tool in our toolbox for making emergency notifications - when needed.

However, the system is only as good as the database it is built upon. If you have a landline and are

listed in the phone book, your phone number has been loaded in the CodeRED system. However, more people though are choosing to have cell phones only and that becomes challenging for us to collect the necessary information to build the database. To address this problem, all residents are being URGED to go to the CodeRED site located on the County Webpage at www.co.washburn.wi.us to register their home landlines, cell phones, emails and verify your home address location during the enrollment process so we may target notifications that directly impact your home or business!

The name "ECN" (Emergency Communications Network - aka CodeRED) may appear on your phone or answering machine when a

call is sent from CodeRED. If you have call blocker, please contact your particular phone company/provider and have the CodeRED telephone numbers added to your "approved" or "white list". It is also suggested that you program CodeRED as a contact on all of your cell phones so you know it is an important call when these numbers appear -- (866)419-5000 / (855)939-4636.
