## One teen dead, another seriously injured in plane crash

On Wednesday, May 24, 2017 at 6:34 p.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department received several calls of a plane crash south of Chetek.

Deputies from the Barron County Sheriff's Department, along with the Chetek Police Department, Wisconsin DNR, Chetek Ambulance, Bloomer Ambulance, Chetek Fire Department, Sand Creek Fire Department, Wisconsin State Patrol and Life Link Helicopter responded to the scene.

The plane wreckage was located in the Red Cedar River south of Chetek about three miles. Two subjects were pulled from the water. Hunter Gilbert, 18, of Cameron, was taken by Bloomer

Ambulance to an Eau Claire Hospital and later flown to Rochester, where he is in serious condition. Owen Knutson, 17, of Chetek, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Kuntson was the pilot of the two-seater Piper fixed Wing single engine plane and took off from a private air strip on the Knutson property south of Chetek.

The Barron County Sheriff's Department, along with the Barron County Medical Examiner's Office, the FAA and the NTSB were all on scene handling the investigation.

Please keep these families and the students of the Chetek and Cameron School Districts in your prayers.

## Rice Lake native donates \$1 Million for Tornado Relief Fund

Rice Lake native Foster Friess has donated \$1 million for a "Challenge Grant" with Red Cedar Church in Rice Lake for a relief fund in the wake of last week's tornadoes and severe weather which claimed one life, injured multiple people, and caused an estimated \$10 million in damage in Northwestern Wisconsin. Friess says his family will double every amount sent to Red Cedar Church.

"Please dig deeply to help these people, who in less than an hour's time, life was changed so dramatically for them," Foster Friess said. "Many of them have nothing but the clothes on their back. Their car is damaged, their home gone, including all

the contents blown into the next county. My eagerness to issue the challenge grant to you was inspired when I saw how touched Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker was as he met the people, hugged them, and encouraged them."

## Something You Should Know About Derrick Gideo

Over the past month or so I have been constantly reminded of what amazing children our community has produced. Their intelligence, shown by the Senior Awards Banquet and graduation ceremonies; their talent, as seen in the school play and upcoming production of *Charlotte's Web* at the ETC, as well as all the concerts and achievements by both teams and individuals in sporting events; and their generosity of spirit exemplified by Island City Academy's service projects including the planting of trees at St. Anthony's cemetery and the district's rallying to raise funds to help the victims of severe weather in Barron County, all show the quality of individuals we are raising here in Cumberland.

However, it is the act of a single child that really touched my heart and truly demonstrates that generosity of spirit. Derrick Gideo, the son of Spike and Jonelle Gideo of Cumberland, is finishing his fourth grade year at Cumberland Elementary School. As part of the third and fourth grade music classes, teacher Phil Warner instructs the students in learning how to play the recorder. This basic instrument is a great way to teach children how to read music and prepares them for being a part of the band and/or choir in their middle and high school careers. There are various levels to the learning process, each new song earning a ribbon and beads as they progress. According to Warner, Derrick has gone above and beyond any other student that he has ever had. Derrick has passed all 22 levels and keeps coming

back for more! Phil said that Derrick is "Highly motivated, plays beautifully with a great touch and tonal quality and is highly self-motivated." Derrick practices at home, and is always asking for the next piece as soon as he masters a song.

Derrick also loves to share his talent. He volunteered to help accompany the *Star Spangled Banner* at last November's Veterans Day observances at the Elementary School, and has performed at his Church, First Lutheran in Cumberland. But it is his latest performance that simply blew me away. Derrick, who is only 10 years old, was touched by a story the family had heard on the news about a gentleman who goes to the local cemeteries each Memorial Day Weekend to honor fallen Veterans, by playing *Taps*

for each one. According to mom Jonelle, out of the blue Derrick stated: "Hey Mom, I could do that with my recorder, you know." So yesterday, he began. Derrick and his parents toured Lakeside and St. Anthony's cemeteries and played at every grave site bearing an American flag. Proud mom Jonelle posted his act of service on Facebook and the story was picked up on WEAU Channel 13 news. Accompanying the Facebook post was this statement from the Gideo family: "God Bless and thank you to all the Veterans who have served and who are serving."

I would also like to add "God Bless you, Derrick." Your act of service honoring the Veterans is a lesson and shining example to all of us. Keep up the good work.

During that interview, Jeanine, who works online for a company in Georgia, told me how grateful she is for ETC, on whose board I sit.

As you know, ETC – Enrichment Through Culture – is our arts organization that provides cultural events, including plays, in our community. The next production, Charlotte's Web, is our annual children's play that opens on June 8.

Onstage during the run of Charlotte's Web will be Jaidan Nugent, Jeanine's daughter, who suffered brain damage years ago when her temperature mysteriously spiked to 107.

Jeanine is grateful that Jaidan has been able to perform in plays at ETC's fine arts center, including last year's Alice in Wonderland and Jesus Christ Superstar the year before. Acting is a wonderful activity for a young woman with special needs.

I understand. My younger son, Zack, struggled when he was

younger with high-function autism and ADHD. He couldn't do sports or participate in other activities because of sensory issues that are part of his condition. But he was able to participate in a children's theater program in Lakeville, Minn., where we lived at the time.

Ann and I will be forever grateful to Pete Martin, the community education director who ran Giant Step Theatre. He gave Zack a chance to belong to a group of young actors who accepted him and gave him a chance to excel.

When he got older, he attended an arts charter school, and today he is a welder and metal artist.

Many young people who can't participate in sports find a place in the arts. And Jeanine Nugent is correct when she says we are fortunate in Cumberland to have an organization that gives people like Jaidan and Zack the chance to enrich their lives – and ours -- through culture.

And we're grateful to special people like Phil Warner, director of the play coming up next week, for giving their time and talent to producing plays in which our special kids can have the special experience of being onstage.

**Home Improvement Projects:  
Know Your Financing Options**

Have you been considering a home improvement project? Whether you are looking to add on, remodel, or just looking for a way to increase the value of your home, a home-improvement loan can be a big help.

A home improvement loan leverages the equity (the difference between the market value of your home and your current loan amount) in order to secure financing. This type of financing is available in several different forms, each with its own benefits and challenges. Let's take a closer look at three of these options.

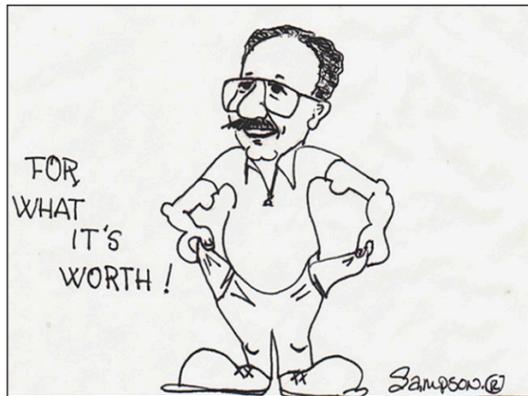
A Cash-out Refinance re-writes the mortgage for your current home while making additional cash available above the current loan amount. This provides the advantage of fixing the new funds at a lower rate for a longer period of time (15, 20, or 30 years). However, this option also comes with higher closing costs associated with refinancing.

The higher closing costs of a cash out refinance can be avoided with a home equity loan. Rather than refinancing, this loan option uses the equity in your home and establishes a 2nd mortgage. It has the added advantage of being able to use the value added by the improvement project to increase the available equity in the home. ### Wisconsin gives autonomous vehicle innovation a lane to drive itself

MADISON, Wis. – Technology often marches ahead of the ability of government regulators to keep up. A prime example is the internet, which surged ahead in its formative days in part because there was an absence of red tape to hold back its pioneers.

Autonomous vehicles are another example. Researchers and industry are racing to develop, test and eventually market self-driving vehicles, from cars to trucks to small sidewalk delivery robots. The trick for government is how to monitor public safety without forcing unnecessary detours to innovation.

The release of the Federal Automated Vehicles Policy in late 2016 signaled Washington will keep a "hands-off" attitude, at least for now, when it comes to telling automakers and others how to proceed with the development of autonomous vehicles.

However, some state governments have taken the federal approach as an invitation to regulate a burgeoning young industry and to "fence out" innovation. The result could lead to contradictory state laws that lack national cohesiveness and which impede interstate commerce.

Fortunately, those "regulate-first, ask-questions-later" states may not include Wisconsin.

Gov. Scott Walker has signed an executive order that removes roadblocks to testing autonomous vehicle

technologies in Wisconsin and which builds upon the UW-Madison College of Engineering's recent designation by the U.S. Department of Transportation as one of 10 national proving grounds.

The Governor's Steering Committee on Autonomous and Connected Vehicle Testing and Deployment will advise Walker on how best to advance the testing and operation of self-driving vehicles in Wisconsin. It will include a mix of industry, technology, regulatory and academic members, and build upon the selection of the UW's Traffic Operations and Safety Laboratory as a test bed.

"The removal of barriers to the testing and deployment of automated and connected vehicle technology in Wisconsin may produce significant social, economic, environmental, and innovative benefits including enhancing mobility, creating jobs, and improving transportation efficiency," reads Executive Order 245, signed by Walker in mid-May.

Walker's move is attracting national attention. The bipartisan Council of State Governments will convene a diverse group of policymakers next month in Detroit to talk about trends in state laws related to self-driving vehicles, and Wisconsin's approach will be cited.

The TOPS lab at UW-Madison will partner with MGA Research, a New York-based company, to

make use of 400 acres of existing roadways and crash-testing facilities in Burlington, Wis., as well as the Road America track between Plymouth and Elkhart Lake. Wisconsin's testing mix will also include portions of the Epic headquarters campus in Verona and the UW-Madison campus itself.

Self-driving vehicles have been under development for years. They're essentially "smart" vehicles that sense the environment around them and navigate without human input through use of radar, laser technology (Lidar), global positioning systems and other computer visioning.

Benefits include lower accident and injury rates, greater energy efficiency, reduced infrastructure investment and improved mobility for people who otherwise can't—or shouldn't—drive.

Autonomous vehicles won't be commonplace for years, but the opportunity for Wisconsin to lead is now:

• Despite the loss of major auto assembly plants, the state is home to automotive suppliers and more specialized manufacturers, such as Harley-Davidson, Johnson Controls, Rockwell Automation, ABB, Oshkosh Corp. and Pierce Manufacturing.

• It's a state with weather extremes that will provide real-world testing conditions.

• The insurance industry in Wisconsin is already closely monitoring and even

investing in the future of connected or autonomous vehicles.

• Wisconsin is a state heavily engaged in trucking, both to move goods and as a home for major carriers. With the trucking industry scrambling to find enough drivers, it may make the move to autonomous vehicles sooner than most.

The potential for self-driving vehicles has been hailed by advocates for the elderly and disabled, by Mothers Against Drunk Driving and by many highway safety groups. Legislators such as Reps Adam Neylon, R-Pewaukee, and Mike Kuglitsch, R-New Berlin, and Sen. Fred Risser, D-Madison, have spoken out on the potential for such vehicles.

The president of Global Automakers, an industry trade group, wrote May 24 that Wisconsin has joined Ohio, Virginia, and Arizona "on the road best traveled" by striving to be a state "where innovation is possible and life-saving technology can move forward."

Perhaps the first order of business for Wisconsin's autonomous vehicle steering committee is to share the wheel and let innovation drive itself.

## Clark County Turkey Hunt

**Hello friends,**  
Forty-six years ago this November, I met Lynn Halboth, Tony Wagner, and Larry Sowle for the first time when I went on my first deer hunt and camping trip in the Meadow Valley Wildlife Area in northern Juneau County.

These guys are all from the Delafield area and each fall we would camp next to each other and laugh a lot around the campfire.

About ten years ago (maybe more) all three of them bought homes in Clark County near Willard and Tony Wagner and Lynn Halboth both purchased hunting land as well.

A year ago, Larry Sowle passed away and this past February 11th I received a call from Lynn that his wife, Linda, who was his beauty queen since they were 12-years-old had passed away.

Lynn and I spoke several times since Linda passed and decided to do some fun things together and that is what this week's column is all about.

**Friday, May 19th**  
**High 48, low 33**

If you have anything to do with the environment outside of your home since September of 2015, you are probably aware that Wisconsin has been receiving a lot of rain and our water table is rising throughout the state.

This weekend Lynn and I would hunt turkey on Lynn's property, which is made up of hardwood forests and croplands that are currently in wheat and alfalfa. Rain and below normal temperatures would be the theme of the weekend.

Lynn and his sons, Vince and Justin, have permanent tree stands, food plots and trails throughout the property. They have a mobile home and a large shed, with a bunkhouse, for the many friends and relatives that call this place home throughout the fall.

This afternoon would be the first of six hunts and we would be hunting in a ground blind on the wheat field. It was cold and windy; we saw a hen and a tom and neither were interested in our setup. At dark, a

rain began that would fall much of the next 48-hours.

**Saturday, May 20th**  
**High 49, low 35**

Lynn Halboth is quite possibly the best cook, the best provider and most organized person that I have ever known. Lynn is also a lot of fun to smoke a cigar and enjoy a couple of beers with. The theme of this four-day trip would be eat well, hunt hard and stay up late!

We spent ten hours in the blind together, by dark the almost constant rain had chilled us to the bone and we did not see a turkey or a deer from the blind all day, but we sure did have fun!

**Sunday, May 21st**  
**High 54, low 40**

A steady downpour, thunder and lightning was the outside environment last night.

The hay field that we were hunting is literally flooded and I have no idea how you could cut or bale hay on it. We were in the blind at five, took time off for lunch and other than a lone hen we did not see another turkey all day, but we sure did have fun!

**Monday, May 22nd**  
**High 70, low 42**

I remember when I was kid I read a story about how, as a man matures, it is not so much about what you harvest when you are hunting as the experience. I thought that would never be me, I figured that I would always want to be filling tags.

This morning we had three toms gobbling in the forest from 200-400 yards away.

We had agreed to hunt until 10:30 then I had to head home for a track meet at Elroy. At 10:00, I was dozing off when Lynn said, "Mark there are two turkeys coming out of the woods and they have red heads."

For the next 30-minutes, we watched two "super toms" and much of the time they were only 10-yards out of shooting range. It was not meant to be for these birds to go to heaven on this day and in reality, we were ok with that and two old buddies ended a

Cumberland struggled again defensively in the contest, something they hope to correct by next week. The Beavers committed five errors in the game, including one on the Panthers game-winning run.


Offensively, Miles Erb, Jerrad Lindfors, and Payton Rose had two hits each for the Beavers, with Rose

## USDA Home Repair Loans and Grants Available for Seniors

Older Americans have provided a lifetime of contributions to their communities. To ensure decent, safe and affordable housing remains available, USDA Rural Development can provide assistance through home repair loans and grants to remove health and safety hazards or make a home accessible for household members.

"Older adults are a growing and vital part of our country," stated Dave Schwobe, USDA Rural Development Housing Program Director. "The baby boomer generation is now between the ages of 53 and 71. As they grow older, they may need services to allow them to retire, live with dignity and enjoy new opportunities.

Funds can be used to repair or replace furnaces, appliances, electrical, foundations, siding, roofing windows, plumbing, wells, septic systems and other health and safety hazards. Loans are available up to \$20,000 at a one percent fixed interest rate for up to 20 years. Seniors age 62 and older,

who do not have repayment ability for a loan, may be eligible for a loan and grant combination to make needed repairs and improvements. The maximum lifetime grant amount is \$7,500.

Program eligibility is based on household income that cannot exceed 50% of the area median income and the property must be located in a rural community. For example, the two person household income limit in Portage County is \$27,950. Portions of all counties in Wisconsin are eligible for housing programs with the exception of Milwaukee County. 

**Ralph Koser**

Ralph Koser, 91, passed away early Saturday morning, May 27, 2017 at his home in Almena with his family at his side. Ralph was born November 6, 1925 in Almena to Herman and Millie Koser. He graduated from Turtle Lake High School in 1943 and shortly thereafter served in World War II as a Master Sergeant in the Engineering Corps in both the European and Pacific theatres. He participated in the 'Honor Flights' to Washington, D.C., honoring the 'Greatest Generation' who fought in that war.

Upon returning to Almena, Ralph married Lillian Haase of Turtle Lake on June 22, 1946 and the two

were married for 57 years until her passing on December 6, 2002. Ralph is perhaps best known as the Owner and Operator, along with his brother Bob, of Koser Silo Works in Almena. Founded by his father, Herman, in the early 1930s, Koser Silo operated as a nationally recognized leader in the concrete silo industry until the early 1980s. Ralph worked alongside his father after the war until his brother Bob joined him in the business in 1954. The two brothers operated Koser Silo as partners, building up to 200 silos a year, along with liquid manure storage facilities for over 30 years, employing over 50 people in Almena. As a General Contractor, the Kosers constructed many of the Jerome Foods Buildings throughout Barron County, including the Barron Hatchery and expansion of the administration and production plant buildings.

Ralph is survived by four sons; Mark (Kim) of rural Eleva, Craig (Lynn) of Menomonie, Don (Lisa) of Hayward, and Brian (Pam)

of Austin, MN; one daughter, Sheila (Hoadley) Harris of Fargo, MN; sister, Myrtle Ruse of Coldwater, MI; brother, Bob (Marianne) Koser of Barnes, 13 grandchildren; nine great grandchildren and many cousins, nieces and nephews.

As a founder of the current Barron County 4-H Horse Project, Ralph operated the Almena horse project training center at his home for many years and helped guide the program. He also was a horse farrier for many years, 'shoeing' many horses throughout Northwest Wisconsin.

He was a member of St. Matthews Lutheran Church in Almena and for many years at Salem Lutheran Church in Barron, where he served as a council member and choir director. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, lake sports, golf and biking and was very active as a leader at the Almena V-F-W.

Funeral services will be held at 11:00 AM Thursday, June 1, 2017 at Salem Lutheran Church, Barron, with Rev. Karl Yahr officiating. Burial will be in St. Mat-

thew Cemetery. Almena. Pallbearers are Robert Hansen, David Anderson, Kurt Fischer, James Wanner, Tom Koser, David "Duffy" Anderson and Lauren Schwederske. Military honors were accorded by Almena VFW Post #8512.

# Safely Cut the Cost of Elective Medical Expenses

Whether it's a matter of comfort, appearance or safety, there are many medical procedures that you may want or need, but your health insurance won't cover.

Laser eye surgery may fall into the want category for most people and it can be a hefty investment with each eye costing several thousand dollars. For those wanting to start a family, infertility treatments, which can cost over \$10,000, may be closer to a need. Yet most states don't require health insurance to cover treatments.

Considering the lasting impact that these and other procedures can have on your life, you may not want to seek out the least expensive option. However, that doesn't mean you should forgo attempts to save altogether. From tax-advantaged accounts to comparison shopping doctors, there are many approaches to safely cutting costs.

See if you could get a tax break. Although tax breaks don't lower a medical procedure's price, tax deductions can decrease your taxable income and by using a tax-advantaged account you may be able to pay for some medical procedures with income-tax-free money.

• **Take a medical expense tax deduction.** If you itemize your tax deductions, you can get a deduction for your qualified medical expenses that exceed 10 percent of your adjusted gross income. Laser eye surgery and some fertility enhancement treatments may qualify. However, cosmetic surgery doesn't unless it's related to a congenital abnormality, disfiguring disease or an injury resulting from trauma or an accident.

• **Use an employer-sponsored flexible spending account (FSA).** Some employers offer FSAs as an employee benefit. You can make tax-deductible contributions to the account each year and withdraw the money tax-free to pay for qualified medical expenses, including health insurance deductibles and copayments. However, this approach could require planning as you may forfeit remaining FSA money at the end of each year.

• **Enroll in health insurance with a health savings account (HSA).** An HSA account is similar to an FSA in that you can contribute pre-tax money and withdraw funds to pay for eligible medical expenses tax-free. HSAs don't have the use-it-or-lose-it requirement, but

to qualify for an HSA account, you need to enroll in a High Deductible Health Plan (HDHP) and can't be eligible for Medicare.

**Ask your health insurance company about discounts.** Even when a health insurance provider doesn't cover a procedure, members may still be able to save money by going through their insurance.

For example, health insurance generally won't cover the cost of Laser eye surgery, but your provider may offer a 5 to 15 percent discount if you get the surgery at partner eye care centers.

Health insurance requirements can also vary from one state to another, and you should double-check your benefits before assuming something isn't covered. Infertility treatment is one of these gray areas, as some states require health insurance plans to provide coverage while others do not.

**Compare costs from different providers.** Varying medical costs sometimes make headlines when patients find out that a \$3,000 medical procedure at a hospital could cost several hundred at a nearby clinic. If it's not an emergency, there are websites that you can use to comparison shop nearby medical centers and get estimated prices.

Some people also look for savings in other countries. Medical tourism is a growing industry, and millions of people travel outside their home countries seeking lower costs, higher-quality services, treatments that aren't available at home, a relaxing environment to recover in or a combination of several of these factors. While the U.S. is a destination for some medical tourists, Canada, Southeast Asia, Latin America and parts of Europe are also popular.

**Bottom line:** Although you may not be able to convince your health insurance company to cover what it considers an elective procedure; you can turn to other methods to save money. As with other large expenses, you can take a dual big- and little-picture approach by looking for tax breaks that lower your effective cost and savings opportunities that can reduce a procedure's price.
