## Hudson man injured in crash

Todd C. Hochman, 55, of Hudson, was severely injured, after having lost control of his motorcycle Saturday afternoon.

Hochman was riding his motorcycle on Highway G, east of 2 1/2 Street, when he lost control of the motorcycle while negotiating

a curve in the road. He entered the northeast ditch and came to rest. He was not wearing a helmet.

Hochman was taken by ambulance to Cumberland Healthcare and then airlifted to Regions Hospital in St. Paul, MN.

## Road work on Hwy 48 begins July 24th

The Barron County Highway Department will be performing a chip seal on STH 48 from STH 25 west to Cumberland. This surface treatment is designed to maximize the pavement life and provide a new wearing surface for STH 48.

Work is scheduled for the week of July 24th. The chip seal will be applied on July 24th, the loose stone will be swept off July 25th and 26th, and a fog seal and pavement marking will be applied on July 27th. This schedule is subject to change depending on weather condition. Advance notification of the work zone will be signed. While the crew is present, the work zone will be single

lane and controlled with flaggers and a pilot vehicle. Motorists should expect delays and use of an alternate route during this project is encouraged. STH 48 will have an advisory speed limit of 35 mph during this project as loose gravel will be present. Caution is advised.

When you encounter work zones, please pay attention as conditions may change. You are also reminded that the use of hand-held devices, such as cell phones, in a work zone is against the law. Please help protect yourself and all construction personnel by putting down the phone and paying attention to the road.

## Northwoods Newcomer: Simple pleasures with grandkids in Cumberland by Larry Werner

I have five grandchildren, and they all live in Eagan, Minn., a Twin Cities suburb of about 60,000. Since their parents all work, summer is a time for enrolling them in camps at great expense.

But for two of those grandkids – Ben and Tatum Wistrill – three weeks of summer are spent at what my daughter refers to as “Camp Cumberland.” You see, Ben and Tatum have five grandparents in three homes on Beaver Dam Lake, and they get to spend a week at each of our houses.

Last week was our turn, and, our first turn at hosting Camp Cumberland, since Ann hasn’t been able to spend full weeks here because of her business, which she has now sold. It was a wonderful week in a place much smaller, much quieter, much simpler and much less expensive than the bustling city of Eagan.

It wasn’t without its challenges, especially the nightly homesickness, which we addressed by talking to Mom and Dad by Face Time.

But my grandkids got to enjoy things they can’t in the Cities – a cruise on the lake one gorgeous summer night when we ran into Grandma Barb Wistrill out in her boat; chasing frogs in Grandma Bonnie Modjeski’s yard the night she watched them while we had dinner with friends at The Five O’Clock Club; listening to Dan Hoffmann’s songs and stories at the Island City Music concert on Library Lake; walking to Peter & Annie’s for a root beer float and a smoothie, and kayaking with Grandpa Larry and Granny Annie.

They did participate in a camp during the week. It was

at the Boys & Girls Club – a computer-coding and robotics camp offered by the Cool Creator Club.

That camp, put on by computer expert Supakorn Bagley, is similar to one Ben attends at Macalester College in St. Paul. But it costs about one-tenth of what the St. Paul coding camp charges. And there were six kids in the camp, as opposed to several dozen at Macalester.

It might be my imagination, but the grandkids seem mellow here than they do at home. Eagan is a nice community, with lots of organized sports and every type of store a kid could want. But you really can’t walk anywhere. And you can’t take a pontoon out to the sandbar for a swim in the lake, or toss a line after fish at the end of the day, or watch a loon catch a bass, as we did one day while we passed over the sandbar on our pontoon.

My son-in-law, Dan Wistrill, talks wistfully about growing up in Cumberland. Dan’s father, Roger, compares our town to Lake Wobegone, the fictional village of Lutherans Garrison Keillor made famous on public radio’s A Prairie Home Companion. Having spent more than 40 years in Cumberland as an educator, businessman and now a retiree, Roger told me there is no better place to raise kids.

And, I might add, no better place for kids to visit grandparents in summer. I feel very blessed that I get to share this place with Ben, Tatum, Leo, Paige and Reid.

## Men arrested in motorcycle high-speed chase

The northbound lane of Highway 53 at 26th Avenue was shut down for about 20 minutes Sunday afternoon while emergency personnel responded to a motorcycle crash which was related to a three-motorcycle high speed chase.

At 3:10 p.m. the Chipewewa County Sheriff’s Department advised the Barron County Sheriff’s Depart-

ment that three motocyclists entered Barron County at approximately 100 miles per hour.

At 3:25 p.m. a Rice Lake Police Officer reported that he was behind the motorcycles as they rode up the shoulder of the road. Two minutes later the officer discontinued the chase in the Bear Creek area.

At 3:29 p.m. a caller re-

ported that a motocyclist had crashed south of Hauge, in the median between 26th and 27th Avenues. At 3:34 p.m. the Rice Lake officer, reported having a motocyclist in custody, with the third headed northbound on Highway 53. Washburn County was notified.

A State Patrol Trooper picked up the chase south of Sarona. At 3:42 p.m. the

trooper had the third motocyclist in custody.

Arrested were Nathan A. Manley, 29, and Eric J. Green, 37, both of Superior. The third subject was not identified.

Highway 53 northbound was shut down at 26th Avenue at 3:48 p.m. and reopened at 4:09 p.m.

## Sex Offender released to Rice Lake

The Rice Lake Police Department is releasing the following information, pursuant to Wisconsin State Statute 301.46, which authorizes law enforcement agencies to inform the public of a sex offender’s release, when in the discretion of the agency the release of information will enhance public safety, awareness, and protection. The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of a sex offense. Further his criminal history places him in a classification level which reflects the potential to re-offend.


This sex offender has served the sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by the police at this time. This notice is not intended to increase fear. It is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Sex offenders have always lived in our communities, but it was not until the Sex Offender Registration and Community Notification Law was enacted that

law enforcement was able to share this information with the community. Citizen abuse of this information to threaten, intimidate, or harass registered offenders will not be tolerated and will be considered a criminal offense.

As a community, this notification provides us with an opportunity to work together by sharing information to enhance the public safety by increasing community awareness regarding this offender and offering positive crime prevention suggestions.

This notification pertains to: Stewart R. Eagleman, Jr, he is 38, is 5’8,” weighs 153 pounds, has black hair and brown eyes. He was released on July 18, 2017. He will be residing at 518 N. Main Street in Rice Lake. He will be on supervision for 2nd Degree Sexual Assault of a Child and will be placed on the GPS program through the Wisconsin Department of Corrections and will remain on intensive supervision until approxi-

mately 2024.

Eagleman was convicted on December 18, 2001 of 2nd Degree Sexual Assault of a Child.

He was previously arrested for: 1994: Theft/operating a motor vehicle without the owner’s consent; 1995: Criminal damage to property; 1997: Bail jumping, discharge a firearm; possession of marijuana; possession of drug paraphernalia; 1998: Resisting arrest/obstructing an officer; 2000: Three counts of burglary, party to a crime; 2000: Sexually related offense conviction involving a guilty plea to bail jumping when he violated terms of his felony cash

bond when he forced sexual relations on an adult female which he was previously involved with; 2015: Drive or operate a vehicle without consent-passenger.

The conditions of supervision, not limited to: No unsupervised contact with individuals under the age of 18. He is prohibited from being in places frequented by children. No use of alcohol or drugs. And lifetime GPS.

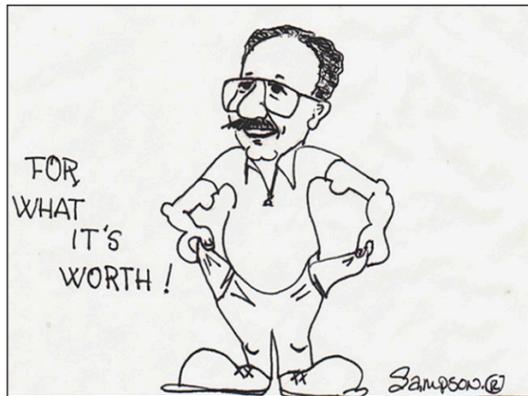

## Inside Wisconsin

### Calculating the cost – and benefits – of landing Foxconn

MADISON, Wis. – What's it worth to Wisconsin to become the U.S. hub for a global company with one million employees and \$136 billion in annual revenues?

Answer: It depends on what the state will gain versus the size of the public investment over time.

As Foxconn Technology Group investigates where it may build a next-generation production plant in the United States, Wisconsin is competing with a small number of states on factors such as physical location, transportation logistics, workforce skills, research and development expertise and supply chain potential.

Wisconsin must yet compete on a package of financial incentives, such as tax credits and worker training grants, that may fall between \$2 billion to more than \$3 billion over two decades or more. Lest you keel over with a case of sticker shock, here's how I arrived at the number:

Almost every state has an arsenal of incentives, some of which are found at the local government level, to attract company expansion projects or to retain companies already there. Wisconsin's biggest tools are performance-based tax credits tied to jobs and salary levels, grants to train or retrain workers, and "tax

incremental financing" used by local governments to finance roads, utility lines and similar public services.

Some of the largest state packages in recent times have involved states scrambling to keep what they already have: \$8.7 billion in the state of Washington to keep Boeing from flying into the sunset, and a combined \$8 billion in Michigan tied to that state's automotive giants.

The more telling category are state incentives designed to attract new businesses and the jobs they create.

Some major examples over the past decade are Nevada and Tesla (\$1.3 billion and 6,500 jobs); New York and Advanced Micro Devices (\$1.2 billion and 1,200 jobs); Alabama and ThyssenKrupp (\$1 billion and 2,000 jobs); South Carolina and Boeing (\$900 million and 3,800 jobs); and New York and SolarCity (\$750 million and 3,000 jobs).

That's an average of about \$312,000 per job over the course of the incentive agreements, which are typically 20 years or more. The Tesla and SolarCity deals stood at roughly \$200,000 per job.

Let's assume the estimates are correct that Foxconn would create 10,000 direct jobs over time if it picked Wisconsin. Using the Tesla and SolarCity incentive

packages as examples, that works out to an incentive package of \$2 billion over time. The average of the five largest deals suggests a package of \$3 billion or more.

That cost is tied to direct jobs only. Indirect jobs in the Foxconn supply chain could total another 20,000 because there would likely be 150 or more suppliers. Building a massive plant may require 15,000 construction workers for the duration.

Have I mentioned that Foxconn's presence in Wisconsin could position the state as a leader in 5G technology, display screens, virtual reality, artificial intelligence, nanotechnology, materials science and regenerative medicine? While the company is best known for assembling Apple's iPhone, it is the world's largest contract manufacturer of electronics and increasingly a player in medical devices, diagnostics and imaging.

In short, the deal could redefine the Wisconsin economy in ways that would touch all corners of the state while building on existing strengths.

"When it's an industry close to the heartbeat of a state economy, the incentives can be huge," said Tim Sheehy, president of the Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce. "If the right foundation ex-

ists, an appropriately aggressive incentive package ... makes sense."

Some economists don't believe state incentives pay back sufficiently over time. Other people may object to what they perceive as "corporate welfare." Still others may wonder if there are better ways to put several billion dollars to work over time.

It all comes down to the math of costs and benefits. In the context of a proposed state government operating budget of \$75 billion for two years, \$3 billion or so invested over two decades may seem more palatable.

Entice a company to come to you instead of someplace else, and an entire industry will likely crop up to work near or with the first business. In time, you have many more jobs than what you first paid for, and service sectors grow with the larger population. Because everyone in the food chain would pay taxes, the benefits could outweigh the cost of the deal.

It's an equation Wisconsin will seek to balance as it competes with larger states and deeper pockets for Foxconn.

Officer Smith made contact with Christianson, who refused to make any statement. Officer Smith then made contact with Premo and observed that the right side of his face was swollen and he had blood on his shirt. Officer Smith walked Premo to the nurse's office where it was discovered he had multiple shallow stab wounds on his right hand, behind his left ear, and on the back of his head, and on his right bicep. Premo's jail uniform was observed to have blood splatter on it, along with holes and pencil marks. Premo advised Officer Smith that he was unsure of why Christianson attacked him. He expressed to jail staff that he was afraid and felt like Christianson was trying to kill him.

Officer Smith reviewed more surveillance footage

from D Block and observed a second incident had occurred at 5:10 p.m. Officer Smith observed Christianson grab food off of Premo's table. Premo then got up and grabbed food from Christianson's table. Premo then ran into his jail cell, and Christianson ran after him. After approximately 30 seconds, two other inmates went into the cell and were observed pulling Christianson out of the cell. After Christianson was out of the cell, he started pushing and fighting with one of the inmates who had pulled him out. Premo stated that during the second incident Christianson stabbed him multiple times with a pencil Christianson pulled from his pocket.

If convicted Christianson could be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than six years or both. His preliminary hearing was held July 14, 2017.

Abdifatar M. Muse, 26, of Hopkins, MN., has been charged with obstructing an officer.

According to the criminal complaint on Sunday, July 9, 2017, Barron County Deputy Fick assisted Deputy Hulback with a traffic stop with a vehicle at a convenience store parking lot in the City of Barron. During the course of assisting Deputy Hulback, Deputy Fick made contact with a male passenger in the vehicle. When asked for identification, the male provided the name of Ahmed Muse with a date of birth of May 6, 1993. When asked by Deputy Fick if he had identification out of Wisconsin or Minnesota, he advised that he was from the Cities. When asked if he had a middle name, he advised he did not.

Deputy Fick attempted to run the name that was provided through both Wisconsin and Minnesota, but was not able to obtain any information under that name. He re-contacted the male subject again and asked him for additional information and was provided the name of Ahmed Muktar Muse, with a date of birth of May 1, 1993. When he attempted to run that information, nothing came back on file under that name and date of birth. Dispatch ran the information through Minnesota and advised they were able to get information on an individual with that name and date of birth. Deputy Fick requested the physical information, and was advised that the information came back to somebody 6'2" tall and 195 pounds. Deputy Fick noted that the male subject he was speaking with did not appear to be taller than 5'8" and not even close to 195 pounds. When Deputy Fick advised the subject that the information he provided didn't fit, the individual advised that he didn't want to talk to Deputy Fick anymore. When Deputy Fick again asked the male subject who he was, the individual refused to identify himself. Given the fact that he had provided two different names and dates of birth and the physical description of one of the names did not match the individual, Deputy Fick took him into custody for obstructing an officer.

According to the report

of Barron County Captain Ron Baures, he was made aware of the arrest made by Deputy Fick. He further learned through jail personnel that they were attempting to positively identify the individual that had been taken into custody. Through investigation by jail staff and Captain Baures through various Minnesota law enforcement agencies, several booking photos were obtained from Hennepin County, Minnesota, which indicated that the subject Deputy Fick took into custody was an individual named Abdifatar Muktar Muse with a date of birth of March 4, 1991. Based on Captain Baures review of the mug shots from Minnesota in conjunction with the mug shot taken at the Barron County Sheriff's Department, there appeared to be a physical match due to a scar near the left eye. Captain Baures ran a criminal history of Muse and found out that he had prior arrests in California, Minnesota and North Dakota. Several of the offenses included obstructing, resisting arrest, and a 2nd degree robbery in the State of California. Captain Baures also learned that Muse was wanted on a warrant from California.

Captain Baures interviewed the individual that Deputy Fick took into custody. Captain Baures confronted him with information that he had learned that this individual had been arrested in the states of California, North Dakota and Minnesota and that there was a warrant for him from the State of California. He requested the individual to provide his real name, at which point the individual printed the name Abdifatar Muktar Muse. According to Muse, he was aware of a parole warrant out of the State of California stemming from an armed robbery conviction several years ago in which he served three years in a California prison. He admitted that when he had contact with law enforcement at the convenience store in Barron, he provided his brother's name, who lives in Minnesota, as a way to provide a different name to them so he would not get arrested on the California warrant. He further indicated that he had driven from California to Wisconsin by motor vehicle and was scared that with this warrant, he would be sent back to a California prison.

If convicted Muse could be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than nine months or both. His hearing is scheduled for August 30, 2017.



# An Outdoorsman's Journal

## Life at a Public Boat Launch

Hello friends,

Generally I am launching a boat but often I am putting one of my canoes in the water at a public boat landing. I travel all over the upper Midwest and over the years I have seen a lot of crazy and expensive things happen with people while they are taking care of business at a boat launch.

This past week I spent time at a very busy boat launch on Lake Wisconsin in Columbia County, as well as, Park Lake in Pardeeville and Beaver Dam Lake "Waterworks Park" in Beaver Dam.

What I did was, I sat in a lawn chair with my golden retriever pup "Ruby" next to me and observed and talked to people for two full days.

**Saturday, July 1st**  
**High 83, low 63**

Today is the first full day of the 4th of July weekend and I picked a boat launch that I knew would be crazy busy and that is the landing at Whalen's Grade on Lake Wisconsin, which is part of the Wisconsin River.

This launch can easily have a hundred boats, kayaks, canoes and jet skis run through it in a days time and though I felt knew a lot about people and their ability or inability to be a smooth operator while launching a watercraft I learned a ton today while sitting here from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

There are maybe four categories from what I could see of situations at a boat launch.

First is probably 80-percent of everyone that is launching or trailering. This person or persons has a plan, is good at backing up their trailer and the entire job is done in a minimal amount of time.

Second and this person is very common. Perhaps it is their first time of the season or they do not have the ability to think ahead or care about the one to five trucks with trailers waiting behind them to launch their own watercraft

Though they may be good at backing a trailer up, they have no plan as to already having gear from their truck or car into their watercraft. Every landing has a place where, before you are at the launch, you can get everything from your vehicle into your boat so that when you launch your boat you are using the

minimal amount of time.

Third and I observed this at all three launch's and it goes with both launching and putting their rig back on the trailer. That is the person or persons that do nothing to help the people that they are with that are doing all of the work. I believe that I witnessed this at least forty separate times.

Fourth and as anyone who has spent much time at a landing knows about this. That is the person that simply cannot back up a trailer. The bad guy in me finds this to be hilarious; if you filmed it you would know what I mean. The good guy in me and he generally rules, feels very bad for this person, tries not to watch "even though I do" and likes to see that at least this person is trying to enjoy our great lakes and rivers.

So I had a ton of time to watch people and train my pup with water retrieves and of course observe my fellow man.

Here is the fifth category (I know that I said four but it is expanding). Perhaps only one in 50 people are like this but most of us are aware of what I am talking about and that is rude people. Whether on the water or waiting to back up a trailer, they are always waiting and looking for an opportunity to butt in line or perhaps will not take their trash home and leave it at the landing or beach.

Here is fifth category person that I observed; this is a very real situation. This person is generally with their wife. I could tell every time that the woman was really excited to be putting the boat on the water. I also had strong feelings that in their younger days they probably spent many a day with friends and family on the water. As time passed, many of the earlier mentioned categories came into play or perhaps are leaving. These folks are in their twilight years for hauling and launching a pontoon boat or any watercraft as far as that goes and as happens in all forms of the aging process, their skills are diminishing and my friends, I ask that everyone respects this person. I believe that they are well aware of what is happening, if you can help them please do so, in the very least please do not embarrass them. If you are lucky and ambitious you will stay on the water until the day

## WI State Patrol Law of the Month: State law prohibits drivers from using hand-held cell phones in work areas

*Violators faces fines, risk a serious crash*

With the states highway construction season reaching its peak, the Wisconsin State Patrols July Law of the Month reminds motorists that a recently-enacted state law prohibits drivers from using a hand-held mobile device in a Wisconsin work zone. Violators face fines of up to \$40 for a first offense and up to \$100 for subsequent offenses. There is an exception to report an emergency.

While distracted driving comes in many forms, one thing they all have in common is they're dangerous, said Wisconsin State Patrol

Captain Nick Wanink of the Northwest Region. Drivers need to stay focused on the road at all times and that's why we strongly encourage people to put away their cell phone any time they're behind the wheel. Work zones are especially challenging as motorists often encounter narrow lanes, reduced speeds, construction workers and equipment all operating in a relatively confined area.

Last year, there were over 2,800 crashes in Wisconsin work zones resulting in 1,110 injuries and nine deaths. While workers in construction zones are especially vulnerable, the ma-

majority of people injured and killed in work zone crashes are motorists.

The state law banning use of hand-held electronic devices in work zones builds on other efforts to discourage inattentive driving. State law prohibits new drivers with an instruction permit or probationary license from using a cell phone when driving (except to report an emergency). Another state law prohibits texting while driving for all motorists. Federal law makes it illegal for commercial motor vehicle drivers from using hand-held cell phones when behind the wheel.

"Whether you are in the market for flip-flops or laptops, notepads or padlocks, there is a sale somewhere geared toward your student's needs," said Frank Frassetto, Division Administrator for Trade and Consumer Protection. "Discounted prices will cross a wide range of products and specific sales terms may apply, so pay close attention at the register to ensure that you receive the

advertised prices for your items."

Follow these simple tips to ensure that you are charged correctly:

- Before setting out for your shopping run, review the advertisements for restrictions on quantities, sale hours, returns and rain checks. Check store policies on price matching to consolidate your run.
- Write down prices or special sales while you shop to have a better sense of the final total before you hit the register. Most pricing errors occur on sale items.
- Keep an eye on the display screen while your items are being scanned. Speak up if you think you have been overcharged for an item.
- If there is a pricing error, Wisconsin law requires that a store refund any overcharge. Work with customer service to receive a refund while you are in the store. Double check your receipt before you leave to ensure that the totals are correct.
- Report pricing errors to

state or local inspectors. To file a weights and measures complaint with DATCP's Weights and Measures Bureau, send an e-mail to [datcpweightsandmeasures@wi.gov](mailto:datcpweightsandmeasures@wi.gov) or call 608-224-4942.

• When you are finished shopping, save your receipts and submit any rebates immediately.

Every year DATCP's Weights and Measures team visits stores statewide to test for price accuracy, and the results show that consumers pay correct prices at Wisconsin stores an overwhelming majority of the time. In 2016, DATCP inspectors tested more than 58,000 items for price accuracy and found that prices registered accurately or in the consumers' favor nearly 99% of the time. Even so, it doesn't hurt to keep these back-to-school shopping tips in mind during this busy shopping season.

## June traffic crashes claim 59 lives in Wisconsin

*Through the first half of this year, traffic deaths down slightly compared to 2016*

Preliminary data from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) shows that 59 people died in Wisconsin traffic crashes last month - three more compared to June of last year and five above the five-year av-

erage for the month of June. The safest month of June occurred in 2015 with 44 fatalities, and the deadliest June was in 1956 with 115 fatalities.

Through the first half of this year, Wisconsin recorded 271 traffic deaths including 31 pedestrians, 29 motorcyclists and one bicyclist. Traf-

fic deaths through the end of June were one less than the same period last year. During the recent July Fourth holiday weekend (from Friday, June 30 at 6 p.m. until midnight on July 4), there were eight traffic fatalities in Wisconsin compared to 12 last year.

"The summer months generally equate to higher vehicle speeds - and driving just five mph over the limit increases stopping distances, decreases reaction time, and puts drivers, passengers and everyone else along the roadway at greater risk," said David Pabst, Director of WisDOT's Bureau of Transportation Safety. "We're asking drivers to watch their speed and be alert at all times, especially when traffic is heavy and where road construction is underway." Last year in Wisconsin, speed-related traffic crashes resulted in 186 deaths and 8,250 injuries.




