District calendar and Financial Audit top agenda at February School Board meeting

When the Cumberland School Board met on Tuesday, February 21st for their regular monthly meeting, the first order of business was to approve the 2018-19 School Calendar. The calendar closely follows this year's calendar, with the exception of the removal of a couple of in-service days to insure the required number of classroom days fit in schedule.

Next, Steve Mann, the district financial officer, gave a report on the recently completed 2017 Financial Audit. Steve was happy to announce that it was another successful audit, thanks in great part to the efforts put out by the District staff to insure the criteria are met throughout the year. Steve was particularly proud of the fact that the district received no new negative comments. There were a

couple of remaining notes from previous years that the district has been working to resolve. Most involve how the "activity accounts" are monitored and the number of inactive activity accounts. The district has formulated a plan and will be working to resolve these issues before the next audit.

In the administrative reports, Elementary School Principal Jim Richie reported on a very successful Child Development Day event. They were able to screen 45 children and identify children with needs and refer them to the correct agencies for help.

The Board then adjourned to closed session to discuss employment and compensation issues.

The next regular board meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 20th at the District offices.

Gregg Takes her 5th Birkie Crown with Norway's Gloersen Taking the Title in the 44th Slumberland American Birkebeiner

Skiers from 36 countries & 49 States Compete in the 44th Annual Race

Cold overnight conditions and freshly groomed trails set the stage for a fast and firm course for the 44th Slumberland American Birkebeiner ski marathon. Anders Gloersen, Oslo, Norway took the men's title and Caitlin Gregg, Minneapolis, MN, skied into the record books with her fifth victory, the most wins ever, man or woman.

Gregg finished with a time of 2:23:30.3 in the 50K freestyle race, just 2.5 seconds before Maria Graefnings of Sweden with a time of 2:23:32.9. Chelsea Holmes of Girdwood, Alaska, rounded out the podium with a time of 2:23:34.2 for third place. In the men's freestyle race, Gloersen raced to the finish with a time of 2:02:29.6, with Ivan Perrillat-Boiteux, France, just 1.9 seconds behind with a time of 2:02:31.6. On his heels, third place went to Ameri-

can Kyle Bratrud, of Verona, Wisconsin with a time of 2:02:33.1.

"It was a great race with perfect conditions on the race course. I had the perfect position to go into the last 300 meters. It was a good race for me and I'm happy with my results," said, Anders Gloersen of Norway. "It was a beautiful trail with good competitors."

"I tried to set the bar pretty high for the next person to come along and break that record. The conditions were absolutely perfect, the course was in amazing shape. This is one of my favorite races, that's why I keep coming back," said Gregg, of her fifth win. "Everything about it from the organization to the volunteers makes this a really special event for all of the competitors. It was such a special day to fight for the win."

The morning started out crisp with temps near zero. By the end of the race, sun-

ny skies drove temps to 34 degrees at the finish line, a perfect day for spectators and volunteers alike. Thousands of spectators lined Main Street, ringing cowbells, eating brats, celebrating with friends, and watching the kaleidoscope of colors as skiers passed by.

Midwest skiers swept the classic titles of the 55K race with Benjamin Saxton, Lakeville MN in first (2:47:35.9), Cole Morgan, Bozeman, MT, in second place (2:47:37.4), and Mathias Rolid, Marquette, MI (2:47:42.0) in third place. For the women, Felicia Gesior, Verona, was at the top of the podium (3:08:07.3), followed by Brandy Stewart, Bozeman, MT in second (3:19:02.1), and Josie Nelson, Medicine Lake, MN taking the third spot (3:19:28.2).

The excitement at the 2018 Birkie was palpable with a strong showing of elite athletes from around

the globe. This year's race found competitors from 36 countries and 49 states competing in this, North America's largest cross-country ski marathon.

Friday's 29-kilometer Kortelopet race, finishing for the first time on Hayward's snow-covered Main Street had a strong field of competitors. The Kortelopet has a long legacy of elite skiers winning the race including Olympic gold medalist Jessie Diggins' who won the Kortelopet twice in the earlier days of her skiing career.

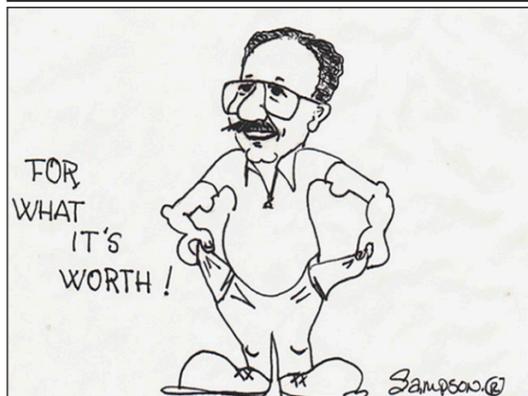

Inside Wisconsin

Continued progress on Wisconsin broadband will require mix of technologies

MADISON, Wis. – When it comes to strengthening Wisconsin’s internet connections, from its most rural settings to under-served neighborhoods in its largest cities, there is no “one-tech-fits-all” solution.

In fact, the blend of technologies required to better connect people, businesses, schools and emergency responders will range dramatically depending on cost, location and speed of delivery.

That was made apparent in a Feb. 20 meeting on broadband in Madison, and at a recent gathering of tech professionals and advocates in Washington, D.C. Fortunately, that notion of clearing the way for diverse technology solutions is resonating with most members of the Wisconsin Legislature.

“Broadband” is a general term for a mix of technologies that can connect people and machines to the internet. Those delivery systems range from typically slow dial-up connections to cable and Digital Subscriber Lines; from satellite to public Wi-Fi networks; and from optical fiber to prototype “fixed wireless” antennas on existing power lines.

Here are two examples of technologies getting attention in Wisconsin and elsewhere because of the potential for improved connections:

Small-cell technology is already deployed in many

cities and major facilities. It is expected to become the backbone for the rollout of fifth-generation, or 5G, advanced wireless systems across the world. Without it, the full potential of trends such as the “Internet of Things,” “Smart Cities” and autonomous vehicles cannot be tapped.

The Wisconsin Assembly passed a bill (AB 348) in June 2017 that would pave the way for a network of low-profile, small-cell antennas that can be attached to utility poles or building exteriors. The bill would clarify administrative and regulatory rules and allow Wisconsin to join neighboring states – Minnesota, Iowa, Indiana and Ohio – in encouraging deployment.

Although the bill passed a key Senate committee, it has yet to surface on the floor of the upper house, where the calendar is running short on working days. Unless Wisconsin moves quickly, it runs the risk of falling behind other states in attracting investment and jobs in virtual reality, driverless vehicles, telemedicine, entertainment venues and connected homes – precisely the areas where 5G can improve speed and service.

Broadcast “white space” describes buffer zones between assigned broadcast channels in the spectrum used to transmit electromagnetic waves.

Wisconsin is on a short list of a dozen states targeted by a coalition led by Microsoft to greatly expand the use of white space, mainly in the television spectrum, to extend high-speed broadband internet service.

Primarily intended for hard-to-serve rural areas, the white space option is attractive because it can operate at speeds four times faster than Wi-Fi and reach up to 16 times farther. Wireless signals can travel over hills, as well as through foliage and buildings, the same qualities that have long allowed rural communities to get strong television signals.

It’s also less expensive – at least, in most rural areas – because the equipment needs appear to be less elaborate than fiber-optic cable or transmitters that must be more densely situated to work. The Federal Communications Commission approved the “white space” option in 2008 but there hasn’t been much progress, in part because broadcasters have reservations.

The Wisconsin Assembly passed a resolution Thursday to support “white space” technology, which could help prompt state pilot programs like those in other states and encourage the FCC to set aside unlicensed spectrum in each state in the 600 megahertz to 700 megahertz range. The resolution was immediately sent to

the Senate, where action is pending.

Speaking Tuesday to the Tech Council Innovation Network in Madison, state broadband director Angie Dickison agreed it will likely take a mix of technologies to fill out Wisconsin’s broadband portfolio – which is improving due to private investment, federal initiatives, state aid and community partnerships.

“Our broadband expansion grant program is agnostic... We’re in a wonderful time that we have all of these different (technology) options in front of us so that Wisconsin communities will potentially have choices,” Dickison said.

The same philosophy was on display in Washington, where federal policymakers were among those who spoke Feb. 14 at an annual gathering of CompTIA, the nation’s largest tech group. Democrats and Republicans alike emphasized the need for flexibility in government rules so that broadband technologies will be free to compete.

In Wisconsin, where thousands of people are still stranded on the wrong side of the “digital divide,” having that measure of choice is welcome.

The criminal complaint states that on Wednesday, February 21, 2018, Investigator Emmons of the Barron Police Department was contacted by Monroe Manor in Barron, regarding that an employee has stolen Oxycodone.

Investigator Emmons responded to Monroe Manor and made contact with the administrator and the nurse manager for the facility.

The administrator said that they received an email the day before from family members of a patient, who is currently a patient of the memory care portion of the facility. The email questioned why he was billed for 320 tablets of Oxycodone for the months of September, October and December, 2017, and January, 2018.

The administrator provided Investigator Emmons with documents showing that 60 5 mg. tablets of Oxycodone were ordered on September 27, 2017, October 27, a third order for 100 5 mg. tablets was placed on December 9, 2017, and again on January 19, 2018.

The administrator also showed him documentation indicating that Amy Shackleton, signed for each of the orders when they were delivered. She stated that it was Shackleton's responsibility to order the medications, and that the orders indicate that they were for the male patient. The administrator stated that their records did not show the Oxycodone being placed in any of the places medication would be kept at the facility.

Information was shown to Investigator Emmons that the male patient was prescribed 60 5 mg tablets of Oxycodone on January 3, 2017 and that on January 18, 2017 the facility received a fax stating that the family did not want the patient taking Oxycodone because of how it affected him, and that no Oxycodone was ordered for him until the order placed on September 25, 2017. The administrator reviewed her system which documents daily which medications that are given to which patient/resident, and the male patient had not been given Oxycodone since at least

March, 2017.

Investigator Emmons made contact with Shackleton later that day and after attempting, ineffectually, to explain away the situation, she eventually stated, "my life is over," and she said she gave it to her fiancé. She stated that her fiancé had back surgery a year ago and that the doctors would not give him any more pain medication. Investigator Emmons asked her if her fiancé had forced her to steal the Oxycodone from work, and she said no; and she stated he did not ask her any questions about where the Oxycodone was coming from. She denied selling the Oxycodone, and stated that all the Oxycodone she had taken had been consumed, and that there was none left at her house.

Shackleton asked Investigator Emmons what was going to happen next, and he said he was going to arrest her and take her to jail. She asked if she could see her sister first, who also worked at Monroe Manor, and he allowed her to do so. Shackleton told her sister, "I stole oxycodone and now I'm going to jail."

Investigator Emmons spoke with another subject regarding 120 Oxycodone tablets that had supposedly been destroyed. She said that while she was busy with mealtime Shackleton approached her and asked her to sign the form regarding the destruction of 120 Oxycodone tablets and that she signed the form, even though she had not witnessed such.

If convicted Amy Shackleton may be fined not more than \$20,000 or imprisoned for not more than 12 years, or both. Her preliminary hearing was held February, 27, 2018.

Smoke Alarm Safety

According to the National Fire Protection Association three out of five home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms, or non-functional smoke alarms. NFPA notes that when home fires occur, people in homes without smoke alarms are more than twice as likely to die as those in homes with working smoke alarms. In house fires where the smoke alarm did not sound, it was discovered that half of them had missing or disconnected batteries.

When installing new smoke alarms look for Underwriters Laboratories (UL) label on the alarm. Smoke alarms should be replaced per the manufacturers recommendations or every 10 years. You should place a smoke alarm outside every sleeping area, inside every bedroom and on every story of the house including the basement. Smoke alarms should be mounted four to 12 inches from the ceiling if it's a wall mounted alarm and for ceiling mounted models at least four inches from the nearest wall.

Smoke alarms should be tested and cleaned once per month and the batteries change at a minimum of once per year. Smoke alarms are essential to protecting the people in your home from house fires, properly functioning alarms are there to help alert everyone to the presence of fire.

Three Cumberland Wrestlers Place at State Meet; Olson Runner Up

The Cumberland Wrestling Team sent four wrestlers to the State Wrestling Meet last weekend and three came away with finishes in the top six in their weight classes in the Division III competition. Reid Olson, Logan Steglich, and Gio Torres all came home with medals in an excellent showing by the Cumberland contingent, Coached by Isaac Lundquist.

Leading the way for the Beavers was 132-pound competitor, Junior Reid Olson, who completed his outstanding year with a Second Place finish, giving him a final record of 41-7.

Olson showed grit and determination by defeating three good wrestlers on his way to the Championship match. It all started with a quick pin over Brenden Dornier of Wabeno Area/Laona in a Thursday night opener. Dornier finished the year with a 38-9 record.

Friday, Olsons march to the Finals began with a thrilling sudden death victory over Trevor Wanck (45-8) of Fennimore and continued with a pin over Cam Hanrahan (44-7) of Kewaunee. These two hard earned victories would send Olson into a Championship collision with Tate Murty of Cochrane-Fountain City, who he'd met in the Sectional Championship just a week earlier.

Unfortunately, Murty would again come out on top with a tech fall over Olson. Murty would finish the season with an outstanding 42-2 record, while Olson will return next winter among the top wrestlers in the State at his weight class.

The next top finish for Cumberland came from their 113-pound entry, Senior Logan Steglich, who ended up in Fifth Place.

Steglich ends the season and his excellent career with a final record of 33-8, as he went 2 and 2 on the weekend.

Steglich opened things up with a Friday morning 9-6 victory over Kade Pinter of Kenosha Christian Life. He would be pinned in a semi-final match against Koltin Grzybowski of Coleman,

however, later that night. Grzybowski would go on to capture the 113-pound Title.

Steglich would then drop a match by tech fall in a Consolation opener, before rebounding to take a 9-3 decision over Griffin Slezewski of Southern Door for Fifth Place.

Senior Gio Torres became the third Cumberland wrestler to claim a medal with a sixth place finish at 195-pounds. He finishes the season with a final record of 29-17.

Torres went 2 and 3 in the Tournament, but won two of his first three matches to set him self up for a top six finish.

Torres opened things up with a 6-2 win over Cade Nettsheim of Ithaca-Weston on Thursday night. He would then drop a 4-0 decision to Colton Heil of Edgar on Friday morning to enter the Consolation bracket. Heil would eventually finish in Second Place.

In Consolation, Torres would win by forfeit over a St. Croix Falls wrestler before losing by a tech fall and a pin. Garrett Joles of Boyceville would take the 195-pound Title.

A fourth Cumberland wrestler to compete was Senior Isaiah Skidmore, who dropped an opening round Major Decision at 145-pounds to Bill Condon of Horicon on Thursday night. Condon would go on to finish in Second Place. Skidmore finished up the season with a 26-16 record, but a trip to Madison.

Area wrestlers did well in the Tournament. Boyceville, coached by former Cumberland athlete Jamie Olson, picked up two Championships, a third place finish, and a fourth. Clear Lake took one title, a runner-up, and a fifth, while St. Croix Falls had a second and a third. Ladysmith, meanwhile, took home one Championship wrestler at 171-pounds.

"I was very proud of our wrestlers and the great support of our wrestling fans. Our entire team and coaching staff is to be complimented for their hard work and effort," said Coach Lundquist.


For the season, Johnson, a Junior, would finish with three goals and four assists.





An Outdoorsman's Journal

Winter Camping on Lake Onalaska

Hello friends,
My daughter Selina is 17. The countdown to when this junior that attends Necedah High School leaves the nest is no longer that far off. Selina is in seven clubs, and an officer in a few of them. She works at the Necedah Kwik Trip, and has a lot of friends.

I have taken Selina on a winter camping and ice fishing trip every winter since she was two. Scheduling a weekend getaway with her has become very difficult due to a robust schedule, but this past week Selina and I camped for two nights on Lake Onalaska in an attempt to catch a very large northern pike.

Thursday, February 15th
High 16, low 5

I have never fished on Lake Onalaska, which is a part of the Mississippi and Black Rivers, about 8000-acres in size and has several islands and channels.

For the last month I have been hearing about some really big gators being caught out of here, and when I mean big I am saying 31 to 41 and rumors of a couple of 45's.

Yesterday I made a trip over here and built our camp and in the two hours that I was on the ice saw a very fat 37-inch northern pike caught and also a 35.

It may seem like Selina does a lot of this outdoor stuff, but in reality she has a lot of experience on several subjects and is too busy to do weekly outdoor experiences. In reality I think her favorite part of these trips are spending time with her beloved golden retriever "Fire" and Fire's crazy pup Ruby.

We get to camp in time to put out three tip ups apiece. Each is baited with a large shiner, and I use 17-pound fluorocarbon line for a leader and a number 10-treble hook.

Just before dark Selina had a flag and she put up a great fight on what seemed to be a very large fish.

As luck would have it, it cut through the leader, but we really were not too upset as we had a lot of time left to fish.

Friday, February 16th
High 18, low 3

I put lights on our tip ups and last night at 1:00 one of Selina's lit up, which generally signals potential fish action. I woke Selina and it was very windy and cold. She dressed like an Eskimo and when we got to her tip up there was a fish on the other end, and the hand over hand battle of a tip up fisherwoman began.

Selina's gator was not a monster, but it was 31-inches and gave us some quality meat. We went back to camp, I made a livewell, and she hit the rack.

During the day my good friend Mike Brown who is a retired school teacher and the President of the Coulee Chapter of KAMO was on the ice with us as well, and folks I have to tell you there are some very good tip up fishermen here. I saw at least five gators caught that were between 34 and 36 inches, and though we had a great day, it was not without some stress.

Two more times today Selina had big pike break her leaders which caused me to rethink my leader strategy.

In reality Selina and I do not care about what we catch or shoot. We cook really good meals, are well aware that we are survivors on the ice, and Selina is always talking to her dogs and of course they always want to snuggle with her on her cot.

The clock is ticking, after watching Kevin, Travis and Joey move on with their lives after high school, I am well aware that the last bird will be flying out of the nest in about 18 moons.

I like to think that they were prepared well.

Ordinance 708

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2017-2037

The City Council of the City of Cumberland, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION ONE. SECTION 7.08 of the Municipal Code of the City of Cumberland is hereby created to read as follows:

(1) Pursuant to Sections 62.23(2) and 62.23(3) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the City of Cumberland is authorized to prepare, adopt, and amend a comprehensive plan as defined in Sections 66.1001(1)(a) and 66.1001(2) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(2) Pursuant to Section 66.1001(2)(i) of the Wisconsin Statutes, a comprehensive plan shall be updated no less than once every 10 years.

(3) The City Council of the City of Cumberland, Wisconsin, has adopted and implemented written procedures designed to foster public participation in every state of the preparation of a comprehensive plan as required by Section 66.1001(4) (a) of the Wisconsin Statutes, which included a public hearing as required by Section 66.1001(4)(d) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(4) The Plan Commission of the City of Cumberland, by a majority vote of the entire Plan Commission recorded in its official minutes, has adopted a resolution recommending to the Common Council the adoption of an updated comprehensive plan entitled "CITY OF CUMBERLAND COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2017-2037".

(5) The City Council of the City of Cumberland, Wisconsin, does, by the enactment of this ordinance, formally adopt the "CITY OF CUMBERLAND COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2017-2037" pursuant to Section 66.1001(4)(c) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION TWO. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law. PASSED, ADOPTED AND APPROVED this 6th day of February, 2018.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail, email or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:

5 pm on the fifth day before the election, March 29, 2018.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person.

Master Gardener Volunteer Training to be held in Spring

Garden enthusiasts interested in learning more about horticulture and who have an interest in volunteering in their local communities can now register for the UW-Extension Master Gardener Volunteer Training program. This program is a gateway to learning for personal growth, and a mission to volunteer through community events, school projects, outreach, and UW-Extension activities.

The first session is scheduled to begin Tuesday, April 3 from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Spooner Agricultural Research Station and continue each Tuesday evening through June 19, 2018. An orientation session will be held on Saturday, March 17 from 9:00 a.m. to Noon.

Participants will receive a minimum of 36 hours of in-depth horticulture training. Each week a different horticulture subject will be explored including: Annual, Perennial and Native Plants, Houseplants, Landscape Design, Fruit and Vegetables, Weeds, Wildlife, Soils, Insects, Plant Diseases and Low Input Lawn Care. Participants will learn from a wide range of instructors from University of Wisconsin, UW-Extension, local experts and through on-line materials.

Cost of the course is \$125 or \$200 for two people willing to share printed materials; the fee includes access to on-line lectures and instructional material, the UW-Extension Master Gardener Manual: Foundations in Horticulture, a one

year membership to the Wisconsin Master Gardener Association, and speaker costs. Registration deadline is March 2, 2018.

The purpose of this program is to train volunteers to assist UW-Extension with community projects related to horticulture, gardening, and nutrition. To become a certified UW-Extension Master Gardener Volunteer participants must complete 36 hours of training, pass a final exam, and complete 24 hours of volunteer service per year.


