Attempted homicide in Polk County

Leonard Anderson, 50, of Clear Lake, has been charged with 1st Degree Intentional Homicide and 1st Degree Reckless Endangering Safety. Authorities responded to a report of a shooting in Clear Lake, on Saturday, April 28, 2018, at 1:17 p.m. The victim met with law enforcement officers near the county line in their vehicle. The law enforcement official could see the rear window of the vehicle was shattered and one bullet hole in the tailgate. Three bullet holes could also be seen in the right rear quarter panel of the vehicle. The victim went on to state that he was standing on the driver's side of his vehicle, when Anderson discharged his firearm into the vehicle, putting three shots

into the rear quarter panel. Anderson then told the victim that he had five seconds to get off the property and told him he was trespassing. The victim immediately started driving out of the driveway when Anderson allegedly began shooting again. One shot shattered the rear window and another struck the tailgate. One bullet struck the inside visor just above the subject's head, and also struck the windshield. Anderson appeared in Polk County Court on Monday, April 30, 2018. An application for specific judicial assignment was requested. A cash bond of \$25,000 was set. Anderson's next appearance will be scheduled when a new judge has been assigned.

Mark Fuller was introduced as the Cumberland "Citizen of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet held at Bistro 63 in Barronett on Tuesday, April 24th. Mr. Fuller accepted a teaching position in Cumberland in 1975. Over the next 40 years Mark would not only serve as a teacher

and a coach but was, and still is, a great ambassador of the community. Mark and his wife Barb, promote Cumberland like few others. While best known for baseball (his teams compiled an overall record of 482 wins and 243 losses,) while winning 10 HON championships, 14 regional titles and four sectional titles and a

state runner-up in 1998. He also coached football for 24 years, which included 14 years as head coach. Mark has written sports and other articles for the Advocate for over 30 years. He has run the Summer Recreation Program for many years, been a member of the Knights of Columbus, he had announced

the Rutabaga Parade for 24 years, and was instrumental in forming the Cumberland Athletic Hall of Fame. Finally, Mark is a member of the Wisconsin State Baseball Coaches and American Baseball Coaches Fall of Fame. Congratulations Mark, on being this years Cumberland Citizen of the Year.

Northwoods Notebook: We need a few more entrepreneurs Downtown By Larry Werner

On one of last week's nice spring days, as I walked along our main street, I noticed that work has begun on Stacy Ritchette's new building next to her Magic Touch Massage business. Stacy, a massage therapist, spent a couple years training to become an acupuncturist and is building next to Magic Touch for an acupuncture clinic.

But along Second Avenue, our main drag, we've got some empty storefronts crying out for new businesses. One of the nice things about our small-town downtown is our business district doesn't look like so many others – a few occupied storefronts and many empty ones. Take a look at downtown Luck or Webster.

But Schneider Drugs is selling off its merchandise after announcing it will close, and, of course, we've got the big empty Kwik Trip at the four-way stop after that company built its new store to the west where Next Gen boats used to be.

I've said in this space that the corner would make a great town square, and the building could be a nice community center. But our city officials would like some entrepreneur to buy the building and open a business that would continue to pay taxes. A city-owned community center wouldn't.

So what makes sense on this high-profile corner where motorists line up going east on 48 or north on 63? I've suggested in an earlier column that a year-round farmers' market makes sense in our downtown. My hometown of Bay City, Mich., opened the City Market a few years ago, and you can get produce, home-baked goods, cheeses, confections and even dill pickles sold by vendors who rent space in an old J.C. Penney store.

Heck, we've already got the produce and strawberry trucks selling at that corner in the summer.

But maybe something else would work there. How about a crafter's mall? These north woods are crawling with talented people who make things. My friend John Epple is a woodworker who can repurpose furniture. He turned an old antique bed of ours into a bench we now have in our front hallway where guests can take off shoes. Are there enough John Epples around here to rent chunks of space in the building to make it work for an owner?

Ironically, Vickie Komarek said one day when I was getting my latte at Peter & Annie's, our general store/coffee shop, that the location would be a great place for a coffee shop. Ann and I love Mexican food and dine regularly at Casa Mexicana in Rice Lake. Those folks should buy the building and open Casa Mexicana Dos in Cumberland.

This crossroads corner would also be a great place for a tourism office. As we know, thousands of people pass through that intersection in the summer months. But, once again, a state tourism office wouldn't pay property taxes. We need an entrepreneur to buy the building, which has great parking, and open a private business.

The other day, a friend from the Twin Cities asked me if we have an ice-cream shop in Cumberland. I mentioned the Dairy Queen and that you can get ice cream cones at Peter & Annie's. But a sweet shop with ice cream and home-made candies would be nice in the middle of our downtown.

Nature, they say, abhors a vacuum. I abhor empty storefronts in the downtown I walk almost every day. What ideas do you have for the old Kwik Trip property? Send me an email, and I'll share your ideas in a future column.

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

The community is invited to join any of these prayer times as we agree clearly, unite visibly, and pray extraordinarily for the next Great Spiritual Awakening in America!



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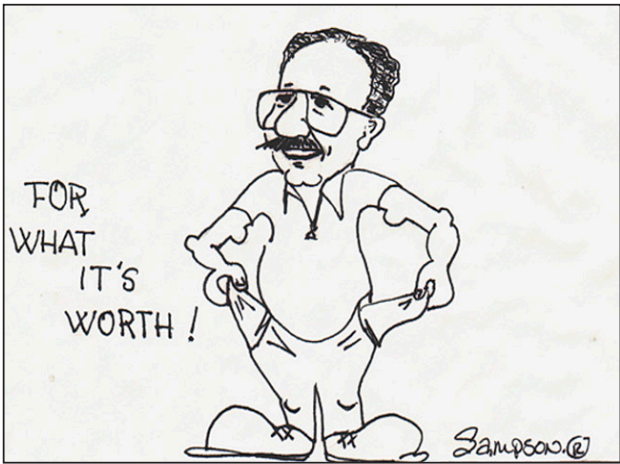
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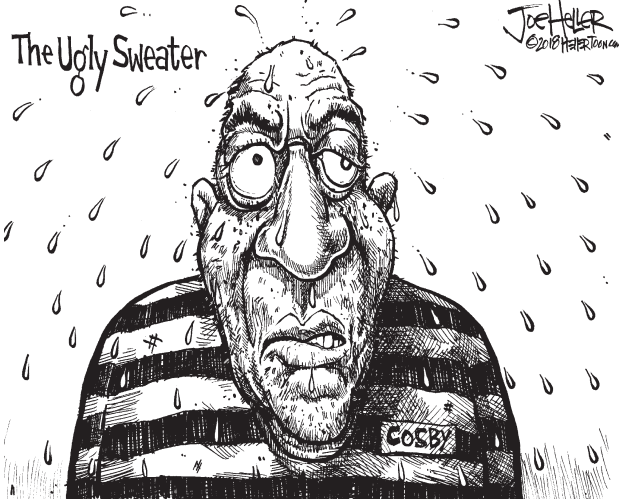

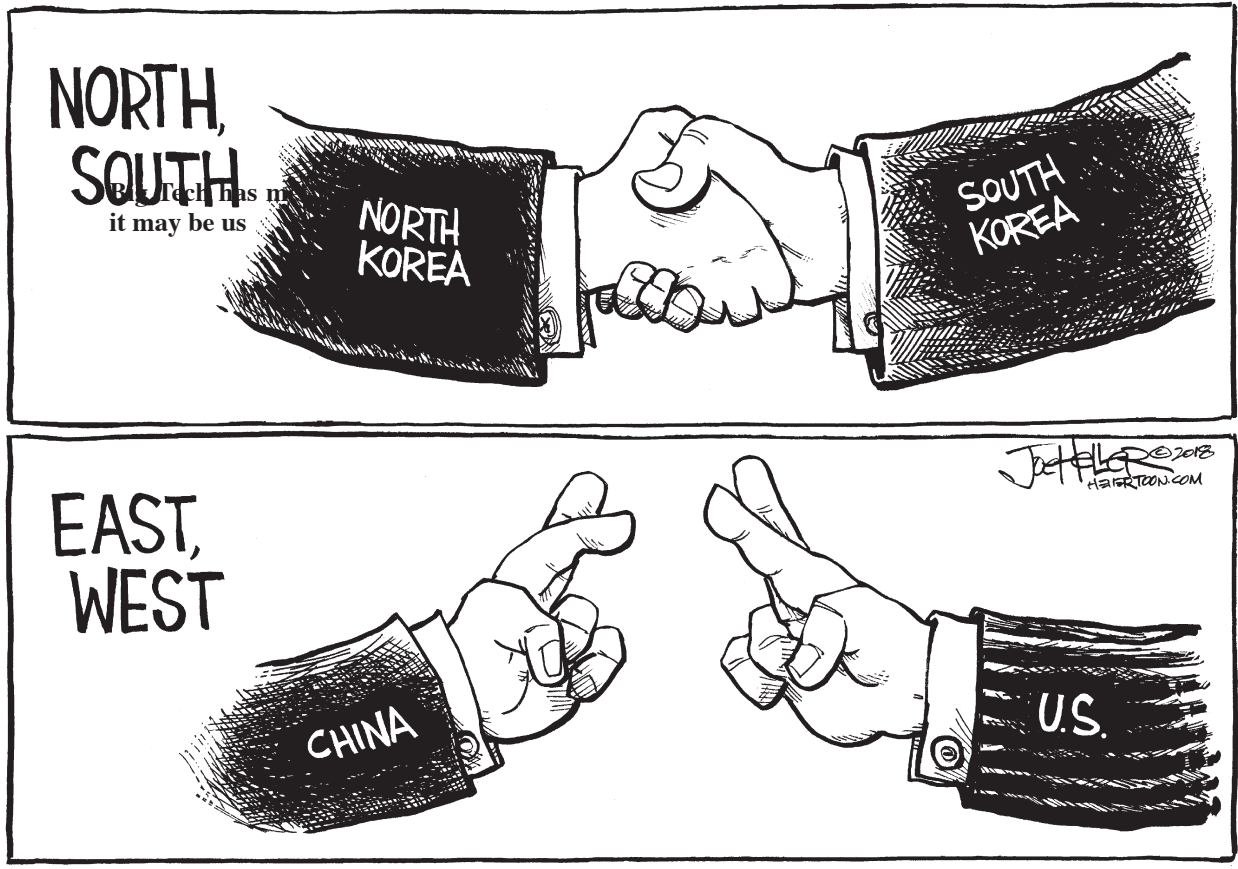

Big Tech has met the enemy – and it may be us

MADISON, Wis. – At the close of her speech to the Wisconsin Women in Government gala in Madison, former United Nations ambassador Samantha Power was asked about America’s deep political and cultural divides. Power offered several reasons, not the least of which is that many people consume only the news with which they agree. Her observation morphed into a broader lament about the role of Big Tech in society. Power, who served during President Obama’s administration and now teaches at Harvard University, said tech giants such as Facebook bear no small responsibility for breeding a social isolation that encourages distrust, cynicism and an erosion for civic values. Let’s leave aside that many people didn’t care when their Facebook data was used to peddle them pro-Obama messages, and are now shocked to learn it’s been used to pinpoint people with pro-Trump tendencies. Also, let’s forgive those naïve users who didn’t realize they’re paying for their “free” Facebook by forking over much of their personal data for advertis-

ing and other purposes. Power’s point is still well-taken: The startling rise of social media in less than 15 years has changed how people live, work and play – largely for the better, but also in ways that have corrosive effects. Facebook wasn’t a company until 2004. About a decade ago the young company allowed outside firms to mine their data for many secondary purposes. Just four years later Facebook took another turn and reined in the outside data-mining so it could better monetize that information itself. Somewhere along the way, data on roughly 87 million Facebook users was improperly passed along to Cambridge Analytics, now at the center of a privacy storm that has extended to Russian trolls and foreign governments. It’s why Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg has issued apologies to the public and Congress and pledged to do better. Meanwhile, other Big Tech companies are coming under scrutiny from anti-trust regulators, editorial writers, stock markets and other watchdogs as the industry reaches an accountability threshold not

previously acknowledged or even recognized. Before the digital pitchforks are hoisted too high, it’s worth considering the good that has come from innovation that was only a bold idea at the start of the 21st century. Social media is largely the product of a convergence of technologies that made it much easier, faster and cheaper to communicate with friends, colleagues and strangers alike -- anywhere, anytime. It has empowered people and, in many ways, democratized news, business startups and social action. However, as the CEO of corporate ethics and compliance firm LRN told the *New York Times* recently: “It all depends on how the tools are designed and how we choose to use them. The same amazing tech that enables people to form deeper relationships, foster closer communities and give everyone a voice can also breed isolation, embolden racists, and empower digital bullies and nefarious actors.” The technology revolution that began with the birth of the internet is maturing in ways never imagined. Just as the first three

Industrial Revolutions (machines, power and early computers) led to unintended consequences in society and democracy, so is the Fourth Industrial Revolution changing the world through mobile technologies, “big data,” artificial intelligence and the Internet of Things. Those changes will remake how we get our food, clothing, shelter, health care, education, entertainment and more. They may also lead society into uncharted territory that disrupts long-held values and beliefs. We can all choose to “unfriend” Facebook and Zuckerberg along with the other titans of tech. Or we can acknowledge today’s troubles are part growing pains, part corporate hubris and part our own addiction to tools that weren’t even available a generation ago. Most of us have trusted Big Tech with a lot of personal information and not asked anything in return. Now, it’s time for Big Tech to affirm that trust by making smart choices about how to better protect its users. *Still is president of the Wisconsin Technology Council. An Outdoorsman's Journal

Wilderness Turkey Hunt

Hello friends,
For a few years my main goal when it comes to turkey hunting each spring is to see that my daughter Selina gets her tom and hopefully at least one other kid that I take hunting. I love to hunt wild turkey, and this year I decided to skip the food plots and field. So for my hunt I would camp in a deep wilderness area that is loaded with wolf and bear and watch the last of Wisconsin's winter melt away.

Sunday, April 22nd
High 54, low 23
Here is my plan. I was going to camp in Wisconsin's Central Forest Region which is massive and I picked the Juneau, Jackson and Wood County line area. My plan was to drive deep into the forest, build a camp, not see another person, and hunt from Sunday afternoon until Tuesday night which is when my season would end.

That plan hit a rut when after two miles of breaking trail in 8-inches of snow the only tracks that I saw were those made by wolf. I checked out another area with the same results, and then headed to the Juneau/Monroe County line area and immersed myself and my pups Ruby and Fire into an area that has few roads and only one house in about ten square miles.

I only had three hours of daylight left after building camp and got kind of lucky when a guy came by my camp on a dirt bike and told me about an area where he had been seeing lots of turkey about two miles away.

In my scouting and hunt, there was about 3-inches of snow and plenty of deer and turkey sign and folks I have to tell you that is why I chose to hunt turkey this way. I wanted to sleep and wake up in a tent, I wanted to hear the wolves at night and I did not want to see many, if any people.

I saw one tom on my hike in and was pretty excited for my morning hunt.

Monday, April 23rd
High 68, low 23
It was very cold the first hour of daylight today. I had one tom gobbling a couple hundred yards away and could not pull him to my hen/jake decoy setup.

Later in the morning I moved to about a one acre clearing and had turkey coming in as soon as I started calling.

Two jakes and a hen entertained me for a half hour and I passed on the jakes. After a while a beautiful tom offered me a 25-yard chip shot, but there was too much brush and I did not want to take the chance of hitting and not recovering him.

An hour later an even larger tom gave me an even easier shot but again I had issues with brush and passed on the shot.

I put in about 10-hours hunting today and also went exploring. Whenever I had experiences with turkey I could not get the toms to pull away from their hens and in reality I really did not care.

Something else that I found to be very interesting and I am sure many people have seen is that our deer are so close to starving to death from this brutal winter that they are moving all day long and have next to zero fear of humans. I saw plenty and did not see a one that looked like it had a fawn that it would be dropping in a couple of weeks.

On Tuesday I put in another ten hours hunting and was out there until the last minute of my season.

This area is remote like I said earlier but I was only hunting about 100-yards from a quiet road that I could not see but occasionally would hear a vehicle.

About an hour before dark I heard a vehicle approaching, stop, there was a shot, no door opening and then idle away.

I honestly believe a road hunter shot and did not even take a look to see if he or she had hit their target.

I have immense disrespect for people that do this and had I had the chance this person would have had a problem.

For six months of winter our turkey do their best to literally scratch out a living, and then spend every night in a tree. I often think what it must be like on windy nights for a tom that has no feathers on its head to sleep like that, and then someone kills or try's to kill it from inside of a truck as they drive down a road.

I did not pull the trigger, I could have, but my hunt

“Let me hear...what God the LORD will speak...” Psalm 85:8

If you believe that God created all things, or at least is the architect then you are able to look at nature and deduce things about God. *“He who planted the ear, does he not hear? He who formed the eye, does he not see?”* (Psalm 94:9). It is logical that the one who poked a hole on each side of your head (ears)...hears. Obviously, the one who thought it good to create eyes...sees.

The fact that you have ears must mean God desired you to hear something-the sounds of nature no doubt, but also the sound from Him, from His mouth (He gave you one of those too). May God lead you to a congregation, if you haven’t one already, where your ears are filled with God’s Word that you may have life and know the joy of Jesus.

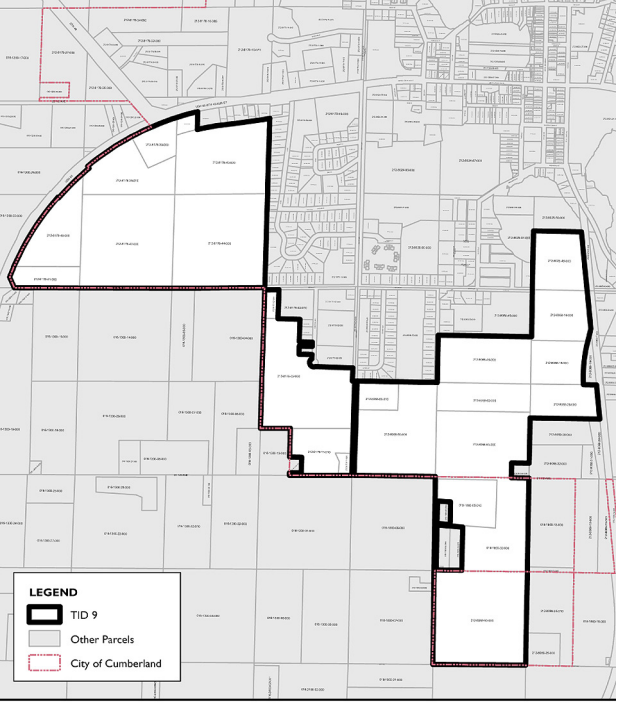
