Two vehicle crash claims life

On Thursday, August 9, 2018, at 7:21 p.m. the Barron County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call of a two vehicle crash on Highway 53 at 26th Avenue.

Deputies from the Barron County Sheriff's Department, along with the Rice Lake Fire Department, Rice Lake Police Department, Wisconsin DNR, Bear Lake Haugen Fire Department, Lakeview Medical Center Ambulance and the Life Link Helicopter were all dispatched to the scene.

Initial investigation shows a vehicle driven by Cheryl Stone, 75, of Iowa, was traveling west on 26th Avenue when she failed to stop at the

stop sign and struck a vehicle driven by Phillip Block, 36, of Illinois, that was traveling north on Highway 53. The vehicle also had one additional adult, age 36, and two children, ages 4, and 6 in it.

All five victims were transported to LMC. Stone was later flown to Mayo in Eau Claire, where she passed away from her injuries several hours later. The injuries to the other victims were non-life threatening. Highway 53 was closed in the northbound lane for about one hour.

This accident remains under investigation by the Barron County Sheriff's Department.

Storm drain repair costs approved at August City Council Meeting

The City Council met on Tuesday, August 7th at 7:00 p.m. with a shortened agenda.

The public hearing for a conditional use permit was pulled when it became known that the County Board was hearing a related matter for the same property and the City hearing could not be conducted until the County hearing was completed. It will be rescheduled when appropriate.

However, the council was able to approve \$11,900 for the repairs to the storm drain at the "four corners" which caused traffic on Hwy 63 to be rerouted for a couple of days the previous week.

Also approved by the council was the closing of Second Ave. between the "Four corners" and Donatelle St. for the annual Poker Run on August 18th.

The Council approved the yearly updates to the Emergency Operations Plan as required by the Barron County Sheriff's Department.

Lastly, the council voted for a resolution supporting a referendum to close the "Dark Store" tax loophole. Currently, retailers who build new facilities in a community receive tax breaks on the new facilities while the old storefronts/properties remain unsold or vacant. There is a movement to place a referendum before the voters which would close the loophole and bring revenue back into the tax base.

Having no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned at 7:18 p.m. The next council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 4th at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall.

Northwoods Notebook: Roger's boys to play for scholarships Aug. 21 by Larry Werner

In the winter of 2017, when I was putting together a summer concert series we named "Island City Music," I suggested to Roger Wistrcill that we book his two sons to perform together on Library Lake. Roger, the retired coach, teacher and principal, thought that was a good idea and said he'd even sponsor the "Return of the Wistrcill Brothers."

You see, Dan Wistrcill, who happens to be my son-in-law, had a band called "Chain Reaction" when he was growing up here in the 1980s, and he still plays guitar with a group called "Hot Broccoli" in the Twin Cities. His much younger brother, Joe, performs as "Reverse Mechanic" and also lives in the Cities.

We talked to the brothers about the idea, but they struggled with how Dan's rock music would work with Joe's rap tunes. So it didn't happen last summer. But a few days after Roger's funeral in January, I suggested to the boys and Roger's widow, Barb, that we do the brothers' concert in the second season of the Library Lake series and make it a fund-raiser for the scholarship fund Barb set up as a memorial to her educator husband.

So the concert Roger thought was a good idea will happen at 6 p.m. Aug. 21 as the final installment in the 2018 Island City Music series. And because the area behind the library will be getting set up for Rutabaga

Festival next Tuesday, the Wistrcills and Friends will perform in the GAP Pavilion at Tourist Park. Food will be served by the Barronett Civic Club and the school district's kayaks will be at the beach instead of on Library Lake.

And the ETC tip jar will be there, as it has been on Tuesday nights, but all the money tossed in will go to the scholarship fund rather than to the performers. We got a head start on the fund-raising when Johnson, Agen Kupferschmidt accountants agreed to write a sponsorship check that will be deposited in the scholarship account at Cumberland Federal Bank.

Roger would be pleased his boys will be playing to-

gether. When Dan expressed concern about blending his cover-band music with Joe's rap music, Roger said to Dan, "It's just hip hop," assuring Son No. 1 he could back up Son No. 2.

Among the others performing with Dan and Joe are Scott Gerry, a former band mate of Dan's who is married to Roger's daughter, Korri, and Ben Peichel, whose grandfather hired Roger about 50 years ago when Frank was the school superintendent and Roger a young teacher.

And Barb says there may be a surprise guest performer.

One of the priorities of the scholarship fund, Barb said, is providing assistance

Confidential Informant arrested in drug deal double-cross

Collin J. Polichnia, 23, of Cumberland, has been charged with manufacture/deliver schedule IV drugs, repeater, obstructing an officer, repeater, three counts of delivery of methamphetamine, repeater, and four counts of obstructing an of-

ficer, repeater.

The criminal complaint states that on April 23, 2018, Barron County Detective Carroll interviewed a female subject after a controlled buy operation on April 4th in which Polichnia was acting as a Confidential

Informant for the Barron County Sheriff's Department, purported to have purchased prescription narcotics (Clonazepam pills), a Schedule IV controlled substance, from the female subject. After interviewing her, he did not believe she

had delivered prescription narcotics for Polichnia. Detective Carroll questioned Polichnia about the transaction and he admitted to setting up a fake narcotics transaction.

Polichnia told Detective Carroll he did not believe she



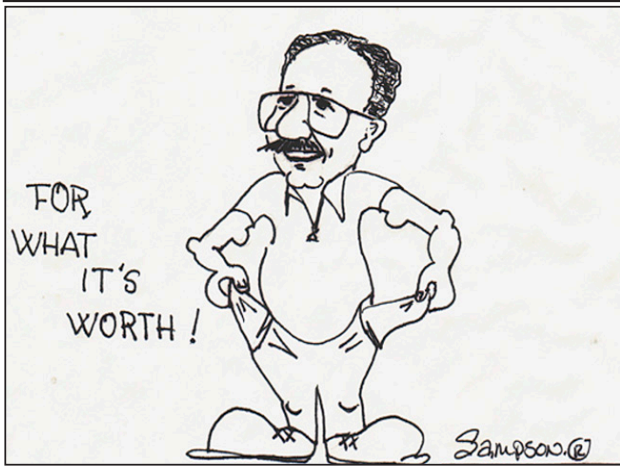

A special highlight of this year will be the Cumberland Community Theatre presentation of “Island City

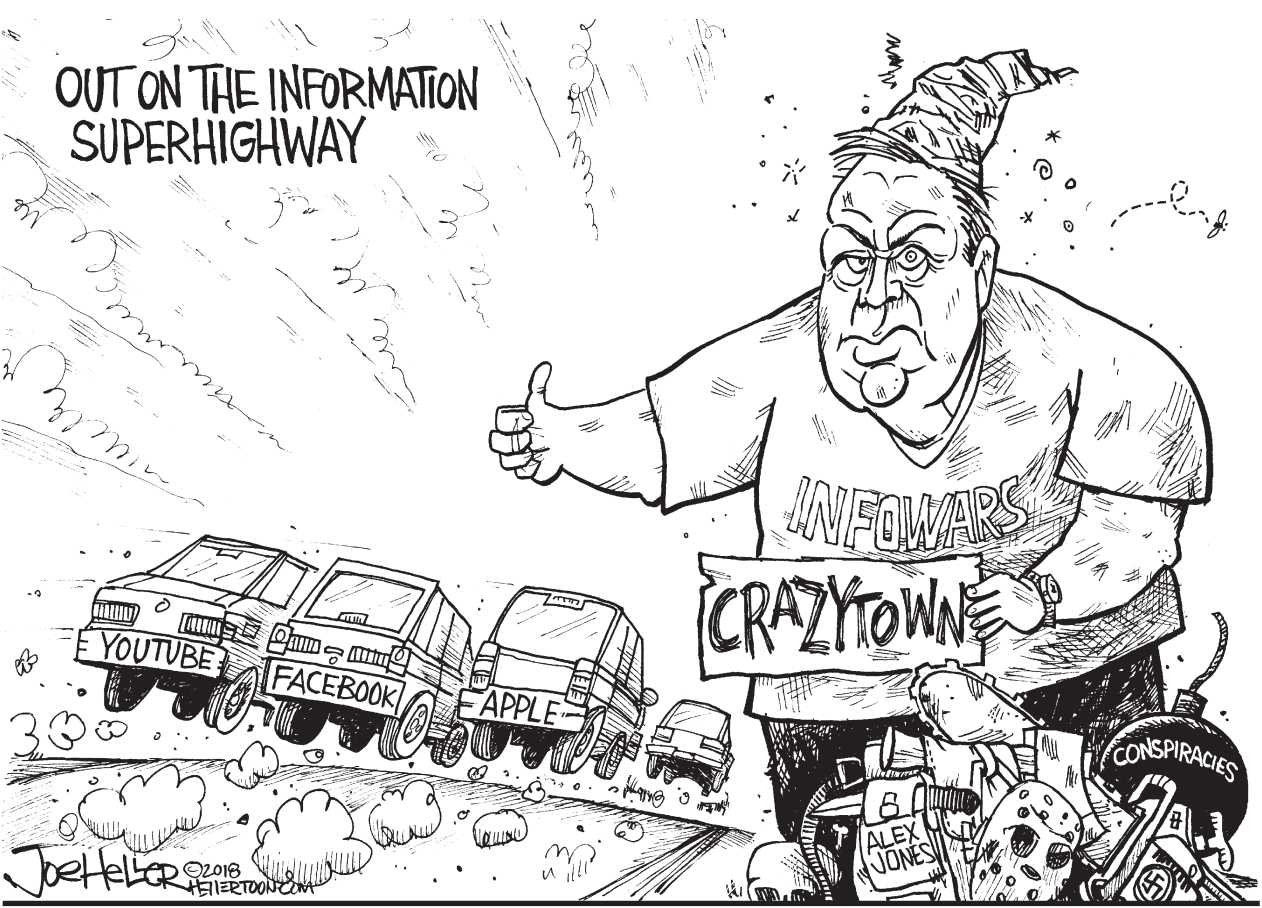

As trade war escalates, China emerges as the primary target

MADISON, Wis. – The news reports are disturbingly frequent: People with ties to China are being accused of stealing proprietary technology from American companies and universities. It's a trend that helps to explain President Trump's push for tariffs, even if a broad-based trade war is the wrong solution to the problem. Some examples:

- Early this month, a General Electric engineer with ties to China was arrested for what an FBI affidavit described as multiple instances of stealing and encrypting GE's power-turbine technology. The engineer, a U.S. citizen, is accused of downloading trade secrets – including 19,000 files in one 2014 incident alone and using “elaborate means” to conceal it.

- A former Apple engineer with the company's car project was arrested at the airport in San Jose, Calif., while attempting to travel to China. According to a FBI affidavit, the man stole company secrets before leaving Apple this spring for a job with XMotors, a Chinese automotive startup.

- A federal grand jury in Delaware has charged a former employee of Chemours, the U.S. chemical company, with conspiring last year to steal trade secrets about Chemours' sodium cyanide business to Chinese investors.

- Closer to home, a research assistant at the Medical College of Wisconsin was arrested five years ago for allegedly stealing three vials of a cancer-fighting compound from a colleague's desk. He eventually pleaded guilty to illegally downloading research data and was sentenced to time already served plus two years of probation.

It can be assumed only a few Chinese techies and scientists engage in espionage, but the damage can be substantial if it's systematic. The FBI has long warned of China's One Thousand Talents program, for example, which recruits ethnic Chinese science and tech experts at western universities and research institutes by offering incentives to work in China.

Watchdogs say One Thousand Talents essentially allows the Beijing government to gather tech expertise without incurring the research costs that come with producing it. Another Chinese organization active on some western campuses is The Confucius Institute, which some accuse of being a front for espionage.

These incidents and more have created a bipartisan storm on Capitol Hill, where legislation has passed to tighten the U.S. government scrutiny of foreign investments and exports of sensitive technology. Once in ef-

fect, the law will strengthen reviews of foreign investment by the existing Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States.

The committee can now review any investment that grants foreigners access to a U.S. company's high-tech trade secrets. Before the change, however, such reviews were done only when a foreign investor gained control of a company.

Other provisions tighten controls on “emerging and foundational technology” and allow federal agencies to track patterns in foreign investment, especially around specific tech sectors.

Some worry the law will reverse the steep climb in Chinese investment that began in the early 2000s, box U.S. companies out of the Chinese market and make international academic collaboration much more difficult.

Within the U.S. tech industry, the concern isn't government efforts to stop Chinese espionage. After all, tech companies are the primary losers when tech secrets are pilfered. Instead, it is about using tariffs as a tool to fix what should be a matter of enforcing the law.

“There is no doubt our trade agreements need to be updated, and China needs to be held accountable for its unfair and illegal practices,” read an Aug. 2 letter to congressional leaders from

a coalition of tech groups, including the Technology Councils of North America.

“But rather than imposing tariffs that punish American companies, workers, and consumers, the U.S. should develop a sensible negotiating strategy that can more effectively address the long-standing trade challenges with China and that includes collaboration with our allies who face the same challenges in China,” the letter added.

Citing U.S. products such as integrated circuits, semiconductor devices, motion sensors, printer parts and more, the tech groups noted China is the largest single market for U.S. tech exports – \$19 billion in 2016 alone – and imposing tariffs will hurt companies and consumers alike.

“The U.S. government should not punish American companies with a tax. This is misguided and ineffective attempt to change China's policies,” the tech groups said.

Let's see if the growing number of intellectual property thefts can be slowed by enforcing new and old laws and confronting China with facts about its wrong-doing, not by ratcheting up tariffs that hurt a wide range of businesses and workers.

According to the criminal complaint, on Monday, August 6, 2018, at approximately 7:20 p.m. Rice Lake Police Officer Eckes observed a male subject, later identified as Charles R. Donald, traveling southbound on Main Street at Sawyer Street in Rice Lake riding his bicycle. Donald continually glanced back at the patrol car while riding his bike. Officer Eckes continued westbound on Sawyer Street and saw Donald get off his bike while continually staring in the direction of the squad car. Officer Eckes formed the opinion that Donald was about to, or had just done, something illegal. Officer Eckes drove around the block so he could return to the parking lot, as he believed Donald would be coming out shortly.

Officer Eckes pulled into the parking lot behind a white vehicle. He observed the female owner of the vehicle hurriedly exit the store and go to her vehicle. He observed her pointing and it appeared that she was crying and very frantic. Officer Eckes exited his squad car and spoke with her. She told him that Donald had followed her around in the store and had just left. She said she has a restraining order against Donald.

In her written statement she stated she was at the store, when Donald walked in the door. She said he saw her, smiled at her and kept walking until he got by her aisle. She said he kept staring and smiling at her. She moved a couple of aisles away from him, but he continued to smile at her. She said she got scared, ran out of the store and called 911. She said Donald kept staring and smiling at her in the store. She felt he was trying to intimidate her, she got scared and feared for her life once again.

On August 13, 2016, Donald, who is an ex-boyfriend of the female subject had come over to her residence and said he wanted to be friends with her. Once inside he began calling her names. She said he became very loud and was screaming at her. She said she could smell the odor of beer on him, and indicated that Donald, while in a kneeling position in front of her and with her sitting directly in front of him, made rude comments to her and proceeded to touch her inappropriately. She told him to stop and he then stood up and kissed her, at which point she yelled at him to get out of the house. She said these actions upset her and she felt scared.

On August 14, 2016, Donald again came to her residence and was heavily intoxicated. He pushed the door open and began yelling at her and another individual who was inside the residence. He asked them "if they wanted some of this" and said "I'm not afraid to go back to jail," before he left the residence. Officer Eckes observed her to be shaking and crying while he was talking with her about what had happened.

After speaking with the female subject, Officer Eckes, viewed a mug shot of Donald and recognized him to be the same person that was riding the bike. He communicated the information to Sgt. Zimmerman, who made contact with Donald. Dispatch advised that Donald was on active parole with conditions not to have any contact with the female subject. Officer Eckes contacted probation and was informed that probation would be placing a hold on Donald.

Officer Eckes informed Donald of the hold, which was being placed on him. Initially, he appeared to cooperate. He turned around placed his hands behind his back, and Sgt. Zimmerman

was able to secure him into handcuffs. Sgt. Zimmerman then conducted a pat down search of Donald. Donald indicated he had a knife on his side. Officer Eckes told Donald to leave the knife there and the officers would get it. Donald then began pulling his arms down and appeared to be aggressively attempting to gain control of the knife. Sgt. Zimmerman removed the knife.

Officer Eckes then escorted Donald around the back of Sgt. Zimmerman's squad car. Upon nearing the back driver's side, Donald attempted to rip his arms out of Office Eckes' hands and head toward the road. Officer Eckes was able to grab ahold of his arm before he was able to get into the roadway and bring him back towards the squad car. Officer Eckes advised him to stop resisting, and at this time Donald threw both elbows at Officer Eckes body and again attempted to escape. Donald began to try and square up to Officer Eckes and appeared as if he was going to try and spit on him.

Officer Eckes directed Donald by the arms to the back of Sgt. Zimmerman's squad car. Officer Eckes continually advised him to stop resisting. Sgt. Zimmerman then came and was able to gain control of Donald's other arm. Donald began attempting to pull away and started shaking side to side, using his legs to push off Sgt. Zimmerman's car. At this point Officer Eckes took Donald to the ground. Eckes continued to fight officers after he had been taken to the ground. Shortly thereafter it appeared that Donald head butted the concrete ground. He continued to resist. Donald was placed into the back of Sgt. Zimmerman's squad car. He then began head butting


Sgt. Zimmerman's squad car. Sgt. Zimmerman transported him to Lakeview Medical Center for medical clearance. Officer Eckes followed to assist Sgt. Zimmerman.

Upon arrival at the hospital, Officer Eckes observed Donald to be pushed up against the side of Sgt. Zimmerman's squad and kicking the squad window. Officer Eckes could hear the kicks from his squad car. After repeated warnings to stop kicking the car, Sgt. Zimmerman utilized his OC spray to bring him under control. Donald was decontaminated at the hospital and placed into a room. He began yelling profanities. Officer Eckes asked him to stop, as there were other persons inside the hospital. Donald then began screaming swear words as loud as he could. Officer Eckes closed both outer doors while Donald continued to yell profanities. Donald then stated, "If I had a gun I would shoot you, while looking at me." Officer Eckes perceived this as a threat toward his life and placed Donald into handcuffs behind his back due to the threat.

Donald had a backpack, which Sgt. Zimmerman opened briefly to check. He located a light bulb in the backpack that, based on his training and experience, appeared to be an item of drug paraphernalia. Officer Eckes tested the burnt light bulb and it tested positive for the presence of methamphetamine.

If convicted Donald may be fined not more than \$30,500, or imprisoned for not more than 12 years, and ten months, or both. His adjourned initial appearance was scheduled for August 15, 2018.

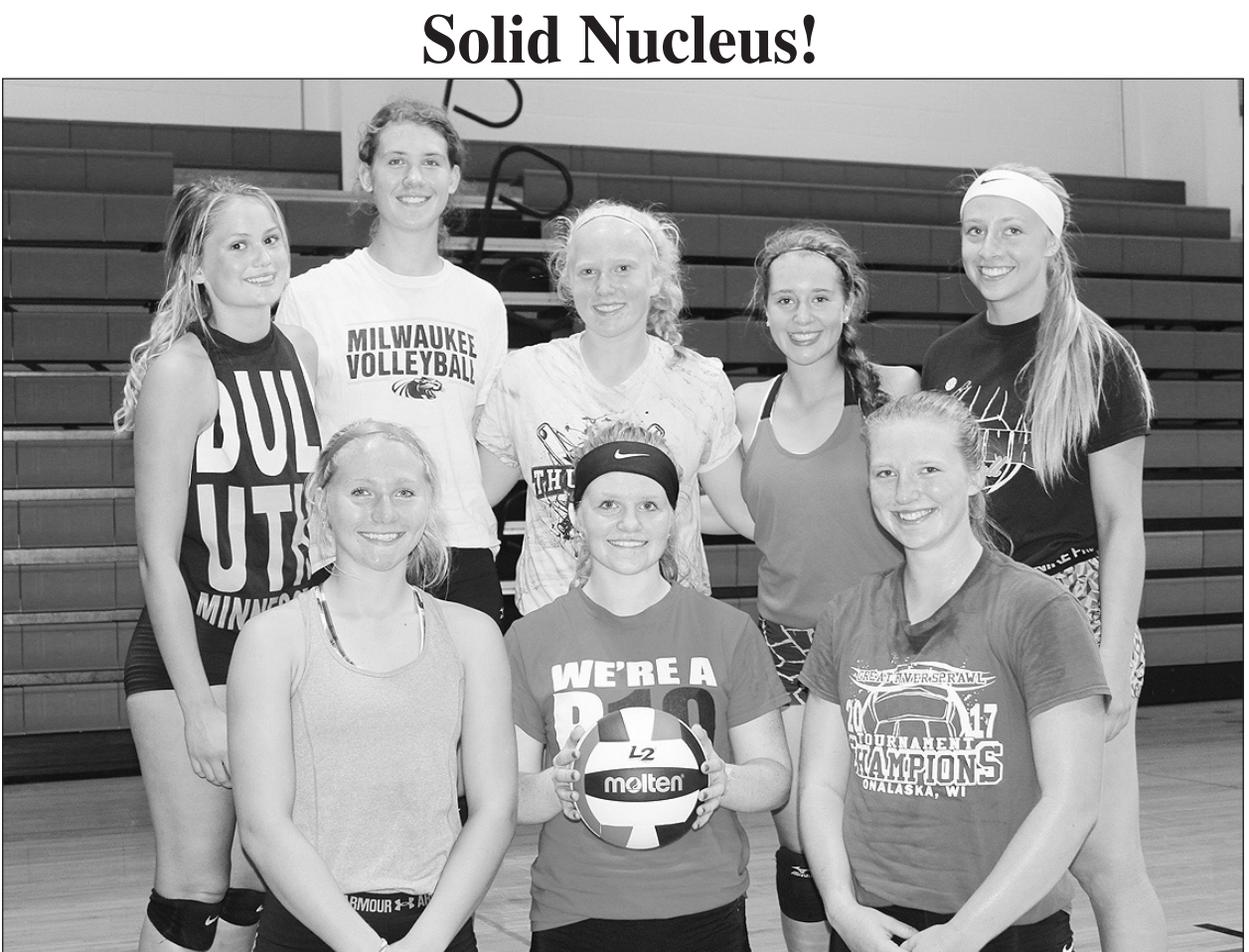

An Outdoorsman's Journal

Muddy Waters Hunt Test

Hello friends,
I have been raising golden retrievers since 1982. I have been an outdoor columnist since 1989.
My favorite form of hunting each fall is in a canoe, and after ducks. You would think I would have knowledge of hunt tests for retrievers. Until this past weekend I had zero and this week I am going to write about spending two days at Mead Dog Training area, and watching a hunt test that was run by Muddy Waters Retriever Club which is headquartered out of Junction City.

I have way more to write than I have space so please forgive me for not being very descriptive.
Saturday, August 4th
High 83, low 56

This story actually began several years ago when our golden retriever "Fire" had pups. I did my homework and found an excellent stud who had an immense background in both field trials and hunt tests. The last litter that Fire had was with Duke and they put out some pure hunting machines, my stepson Travis has Ash who could do double blinds on her first season, I have Ruby, and my neighbors Paul and Chris Johnson have Pike. When Paul and Pike became a part of each others lives it changed Paul's. The Johnson's always had goldens, but to be honest they had couch potatoes which they love, but do not hunt.

From day one Paul decided he was going to have Pike trained by a professional trainer and become a waterfowl hunter. The problem is that Paul could not give up Pike for a couple of months so Paul joined WisIII Hunting Retriever Club which is based out of Bong Recreation area near Kenosha, the Johnsons are seasonal neighbors, and both Paul and Pike as I would learn have become "hunt test" machines.

So I pull into Mead DTA and as I said I have no idea what takes place. There are owners and trainers from as far away as Durant, Mississippi. There are 158 dogs of which 112 are labs, 13 are goldens, 10 are chesapeake, 4 are poodles, and the rest are either boykins or water spaniels.

I thought this was a competition and I was completely wrong. Again I apologize for being vague but space is an issue. So here is my description. Started, seasoned, and finished, are the three levels and basically you are talking beginners to pros and some beginners are not young and some pros are.

There were two separate days of hunt tests. For a started dog to make it to the seasoned level it has to "pass" four hunt tests. Almost everyone that was here on Saturday also was on Sunday as once they are at the Seasoned level they have to pass three hunt tests with each one consuming a very long day. I spent my time observing all three levels of which half of each day for each group is on land and the other half is over water.

There is nowhere that I can think of where you are going to see this many well behaved dogs. Over two days I never saw a thing that raised an eye brow. One trainer that I really was impressed with was John Wilson of Wax Lake Retrievers. John bases out of Durant, MS and spends his summers training 20, mostly labs in Ohio as it is much cooler. John Wilson was a pure machine as he worked dog after dog as the goal is to get each one its title which in the end means a better animal for the owner to hunt with, and vastly ups the dogs value for stud fee or pups. For this weekend John Wilson was working with seven labs and it was interesting to spend a lot of time around a friend from the south.

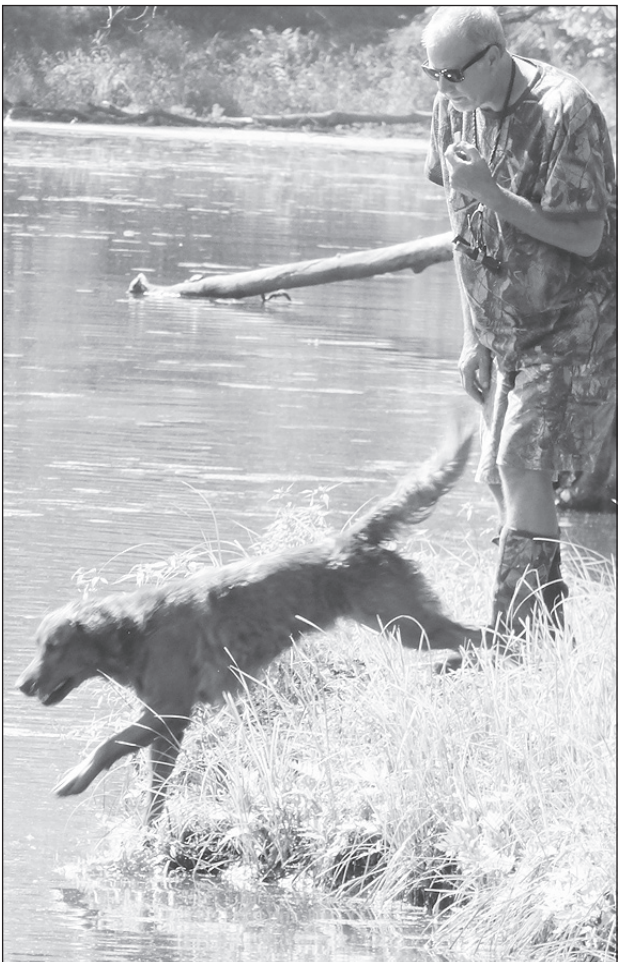
Quite possibly the coolest part of this weekend was watching Pike and Paul. I am the registered breeder for Pike and let me tell you he is a machine, and I heard it from a lot of judges and dog people as they watched Paul and Pike work.

I knew that Paul Johnson was serious about his dog training but for a guy that 24-months ago did not know the difference between a blind retrieve and a double he is incredible at running his best friend.

In all tests "wingers" machines operated by humans send ducks flying through the air which land on water or in fields. In each test there are either two or three ducks and for Seasoned and Finished there is also a blind retrieve which was hidden before each individual test starts.

There is also a "diversion bird" which in reality is a duck that is sent through the air as a duck is being retrieved. The idea is that the retriever keeps up its retrieve and when he or she has brought back the original ducks that it is retrieving it finishes with the diversion bird. Like everything else in a hunt test this is a self discipline exercise.

After a great weekend of watching and visiting with a lot of really good people, I was totally impressed with this very cool sport that connects a

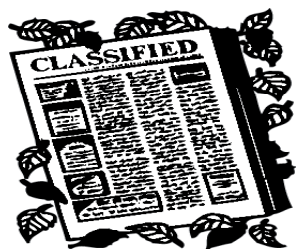

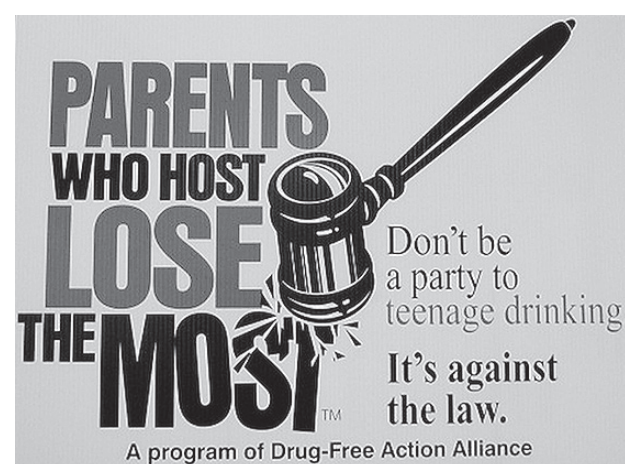

Fake Drug Deals...

Carroll, that while he was walking up to the female subject’s residence, he retrieved prescription narcotics which were planted at the end of the driveway by an associate in an attempt to make it look like prescription narcotics were purchased at the residence when he went up to the front door and spoke to an elderly female. He said he set this fake transaction up because he was desperate for money. Polichnia was given \$100 in prerecorded buy money and delivered 18 Clonazepan pills to Detective Carroll after completing this fake transaction.

On April 30, 2018, Detective Carroll interviewed a male subject, after a controlled buy operation in which Polichnia was acting as a Confidential Informant, purported to have purchased one gram of methamphetamine from the male subject on April 4, 2018, and 3.5 grams of methamphetamine from him on April 6th. Detective Carroll interviewed the male subject, who said the residence where the purported transactions occurred was his brother’s trailer and that he was not at the trailer, nor had he ever used or dealt drugs. The male subject said that on April 4 and April 6, 2018 he was working in Eau Claire. Detective Carroll made

contact with his boss, who provided a date stamped picture showing him working in Eau Claire.

Detective Carroll viewed the covert camera worn by Polichnia on April 6th. The camera shows a clear picture of the front of the trailer just prior to Polichnia covering up the camera. He observed that the male subjects vehicle was not parked there or anywhere on the street. Polichnia purported to have paid \$20 in prerecorded buy money for the purchase of 1/4 gram of methamphetamine on April 4 and \$200 in prerecorded buy money for the purchase of 3.5 grams of methamphetamine on April 6th. The actual weight of the substance delivered to Detective Carroll on April 6th was 1.8 grams.

On July 2nd, Detective Hagen testified at a probation revocation hearing after two separate controlled buys in which Polichnia purported to have purchased methamphetamine from another male subject. Polichnia purported to have arranged the purchase of 1.75 grams of methamphetamine for \$175. While searching Polichnia after the purported transaction. Deputy Kolb located \$100 of the prerecorded buy money in Polichnia’s front shirt pocket. He claimed he was not

aware of the fact that he did not remove all of the money from his pocket and give it to the male subject. The actual weight of the substance delivered by Polichnia was 1.4 grams.

Detective Hagen utilized Polichnia again on November 21, 2017, in a controlled buy operation in which Polichnia purported to have purchased 1/8 ounce of methamphetamine from the male subject for \$220 and payment to him of \$80 for what he claimed he shorted him the previous night. Polichnia was given \$310 in prerecorded buy money to facilitate this transaction. The actual weight of the substance delivered to Detective Carroll on November 21, which tested inconclusive for the presence of methamphetamine, was four grams.

Detective Carroll informed Polichnia that he was under arrest for arranging fake drug deals. Polichnia admitted the subjects he accused of selling to him did not.

If convicted Polichnia may be fined not more than \$125,000 or imprisoned for not more than 46 years, or both. His driver’s license may also be suspended for 15 years. His preliminary hearing will be held August 17, 2018.

Ladysmith man killed in accident

On Saturday, August 11, 2018, at about 5:25 p.m. a motorcycle traveling westbound on U.S. Highway 8 was attempting to make a left turn onto County Highway B in the Village of Glen Flora, County of Rusk, when it was rear-ended by a vehicle traveling westbound on U.S. Highway 8.

The driver of the motorcycle, 58 year old Dwight J. Cooley of Ladysmith, was pronounced dead at the scene.

The crash is still under investigation by the Rusk County Sheriff’s Office and the Wisconsin State Patrol.
