## Northwoods Notebook: A city's past is something to celebrate

I grew up in a Michigan town settled in the 1800s, when lumber companies moved in to strip the land of trees that were milled for building homes. Meanwhile, the railroad was built through Bay City to carry people and products into the northern frontier, and farmers planted the fields with potatoes that are commemorated in an annual summer festival.

Our main street, Center Avenue, is lined with beautiful wooden Victorian homes built for what my dad told us were the "lumber barons" who, once they brought "light to the forest," moved west to Illinois and Wisconsin.

Sound familiar? Lumber mills. Building a railroad to the north. Substitute rutabagas for potatoes, and you've got the historical roots of Cumberland, the town I discovered a few years back and have grown to love for what it is – and what it was. The Island City, nick-

named for its location in the middle of a lake called Beaver Dam, where lumber was harvested in the 1800s and sent to the mills that were among our town's first businesses, reminds me of the place where I was born and raised. The river that flowed through my town carried trees cut by lumberjacks who worked hard by day and drank hard at night in taverns – like those in Cumberland.

I've learned that Scandinavian farmers and Italian railroad workers also settled here, built beautiful wooden homes on our main street known as Second Avenue, on the lake and on Mill Hill near where the Miller family operated the mill.

Cumberland's past has been memorialized in a few books, including a photo history compiled by my neighbor Nancy Bentz and a video produced by my friend Tom St. Angelo, whose grandfather was one of the town's early settlers

and for whom our Library is named.

In recent weeks, a Minnesota historian named Brent Peterson has been spending many hours at the Thomas St. Angelo Public Library doing research for a book he is writing about our town's history. It's titled "Cumberland: The Island City." Peterson suggested a Cumberland book to his publisher after writing a book about Stillwater, Minn., his hometown and the city that bills itself as the place Minnesota began.

His publisher wanted him to write a history of a Wisconsin town, and he suggested Cumberland because it's where he spent summer days at his family's cabin on Big Dummy Lake. He and his siblings and cousins would swim and water ski and cram up to 20 people into the two-bedroom cabin that his family still owns. And he remembers coming into town on rainy days to watch movies at the

Isle Theater or hang out at the library and stop at Dairy Queen before going back to the cabin.

He also chose to write about Cumberland because its history makes a great story.

"Cumberland has history about everything," Peterson said one day last week at the library. "Louie's Meats. Ardisam. You've got the core of businesses. You've got the unique story about the drowning elephant. There's sports figures. The early people that came here were people looking for lumber. Timber cruisers looking for land, and the railroads were following them. Beaver Dam Lake was at the center, get the logs into the lake, have them milled out."

Peterson gets animated when he talks about our town's past, including the unfortunate 1911 drowning of Tom Tom the circus elephant. His first draft is due Nov. 20, and his publisher

"Over 40 years, I've never met somebody who is sarcastic or mean," he said. "Even if you're a Viking fan, they treat you pretty well."

His book about Stillwater is available at the three history museums in Washington County, Minn. After listening to him talk about the rich history of Cumberland, I couldn't help but wonder

why there's no museum here, or even a historical society.

In Cameron, we have the Barron County Historical Society and the Pioneer Village Museum, said Connie Bussewitz, a Cumberland native and treasure trove of local history. Yes, but Cameron isn't Cumberland.

Wouldn't it be nice if one of our vacant downtown buildings became a place where locals and visitors could learn the story of the Italians, the Scandinavians and Germans who settled this place – and the elephant who came here and never left?

**A passion for food inspires new cookbook** *By Jan K Jenson*

Mary Stenberg and David Knutson grew up 15 miles from each other in the Cumberland, Wisconsin area. They had the good fortune of growing up in families where good food was central to their lives. They each learned to cook and bake from their respective family members, and they each cherished a 1940 edition of the Cumberland Cookbook.

Although their parents knew each other, Mary and David never met each other until they became colleagues working together at Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College's Ashland Campus in 1988. Here they discovered their common roots – and a mutual passion for food and collecting recipes.

The Ashland campus was well known for its pot luck meals, and Mary and David were famous for bringing homemade treats for their co-workers. After sampling some of Mary's and David's dishes, staff frequently asked for their recipes.

"You should write a cookbook together," they were frequently told. That idea lingered in the back of their minds until they retired from WITC and began to think seriously about sharing some of their favorite recipes. They also wanted to preserve old family recipes that have been passed down

over the generations. In 2010, they released "Tried and True, A Collection of our Favorite Recipes." The initial printing of 500 copies sold out fast, mostly due to word-of-mouth from family and friends who loved Mary and David's recipes. Over 1200 copies have now been sold – and their fans were now asking for a second edition, for more of their wonderful recipes.

"Tried and True Two, Another Collection of Our Favorite Recipes" has just been released. It is packed with a fascinating collection of everything from appetizers to casseroles, soups, salads, desserts and much more. Many of the recipes are actually easy to prepare – a real benefit in our busy lives. This is more than a cookbook, including interesting notes about the various recipes and the authors' experiences with food.

David and Mary invited me for lunch one day at David's rustic cabin which is tucked into the woods in Wascott, Wisconsin and has no electricity or running water. David's antique Monarch wood cook-stove "still heats the food and warms the soul."

We dined on a delicious Make Ahead Chicken Casserole, Hazel's Cucumber Salad, Easy Peach Crisp

and Brandied Cranberries – after snacking on Shrimp Dip and Spanish Olive Spread appetizers. All were amazing – and all recipes are included in their new cookbook.

As we enjoyed our meal together, we chatted about food. Their enthusiasm for food and trying new recipes was evident. Both grew up in Scandinavian households and had similar connections to food, cherishing memories created while gathering around a table sharing good food with family and friends.

One of the messages that both Mary and David want to relay is the importance of preserving family recipes for future generations. One way to do this, they say, is to print your own cookbook

through a company like Morris Press Cookbooks. They will do as much, or as little, of the work as you need done.

"We have learned that people who cook have something in common," they write in the intro to their cookbook, "They care enough to make the lives of those around them better. Cooking is kindness made real."

"Tried and True Two" is available at a number of regional locations from Bayfield, Washburn and Ashland to Wascott, Minong, Solon Springs and Cumberland.




# Opinion

## Inside Wisconsin

### Tech, art and design of ‘smart’ cities converge through Wisconsin company

MADISON, Wis. — Six weeks ago in the art-conscious town of Santa Fe, N.M., a somewhat eclectic group of technologists, architects, city planners, fabricators and artists of all persuasions got together to talk about the future of art and how it can transform public settings. Given that southwest city’s affinity for all things creative, perhaps that’s not surprising — except the gathering of about 170 people from around the world revolved around CODAworx, a young Madison company. Co-founded by serial entrepreneur Toni Sikes, CODAworx is becoming the Amazon of the commissioned art economy. By connecting artists and designers with opportunities that range from private building projects to public works of art to specialty commissions, CODAworx is matching talent and utilizing technology to streamline an often-complicated mating dance. “I really think this is the most important thing I have ever done in my life,” said Sikes, who built other arts and publication companies in the past. “There has always been commissioned

art, but there wasn’t an organized, tech-based way of bringing together the supply with those who had the demand. We’re the hub, the connectors, for all types of people within the industry.” CODAworx is short for the “collaboration of art and design,” an apt acronym for a company that touches about 17,000 artists and 10,000 possible buyers and people with a stake in the industry, which includes consultants, city planners, architects and museum directors. The presence of people who care about the importance of art in planning buildings, parks, urban spaces and cityscapes is a major part of what makes CODAworx tick. The company’s leadership advocates for what artists bring to the world, of course, but they’re especially passionate about how art in all forms creates value in otherwise humdrum or even dangerous settings. “Art in our public and private spaces helps us fight ordinary buildings, ordinary streets, ordinary cities. We celebrate the extraordinary,” reads a passage from “CODAworx Manifesto.” Sikes takes it a step further when she talks about the use of all types of technology to create works of art around light, sound, artificial intelligence and other interactive effects. “The traditional arts world has, for the most part, overlooked what’s happening with technology enabled art,” she said. “It can have the effect of raising the value of real estate. It creates spaces where people love to work, shop and live. You can even place the right art in crime-ridden spaces and it can transform them.” The business model for CODAworx is tiered. It is free for artists who want to list up to three published projects and to review requests for proposals; \$500 per year for artists who want to expose more of their works and dig deeper into commission opportunities; \$1,000 per year for industry members; and larger contract amounts when people who commission art want CODAworx to handle the nitty-gritty of executing a project. The latter category can happen when city planners and others decide they want to commission art but aren’t experienced in screening potential artists, negotiating terms and executing delivery. “Cities are realizing, as they do economic development, that art is critical,” Sikes said. “When we do manage a project, we try to anticipate all of the pain points.” It’s not just major cities or big companies that commission art. Projects touched by CODAworx over time have included cities such as Janesville, Eau Claire, High Point, N.C., Sewanee, Ga., and St. Mary’s, Md. Those cities and more might have been limited to a few choices of artists in the past but can cast a wider net by using the CODAworx database. Founded as The Art Commission in 2012 by Sikes and Terry Maxwell, CODAworx today has 15 employees and 6,000 projects accessible through its website. For Sikes, that’s just a good start. “Artists are some of the original entrepreneurs, and they’re increasingly banding together in companies,” Sikes said. “We want to help them grow.” Still is president of the Wisconsin Technology Council. He is the former associate editor of the Wisconsin State Journal.

Finally they indicated he had gone into the hotel laundry room, which is an employee's only area, and grabbed one of the females working in there and kissed her on the neck. They indicated she was quite upset over it.

The staff pointed out the individual that was standing at the front desk. Chief Gabe recognized him and made contact with him, and questioned him concerning the incident in the one room. Chief Gabe specifically confronted him about having contact with a female employee and kissing her on the neck, which he acknowledged had happened.

Chief Gabe made contact with a female who indicated she had been in the laundry room at the table folding laundry when a male came in and stood behind her. She said she had walked over to the shelf to put the laundry away and it was at this point he put his arms around her right side to her back and kissed her on the left side of her neck. She indicated she had no idea who this person was and by no means gave him any permission to touch her or kiss her in any fashion.

If convicted Lowe may be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned for not more than 90 days, or both. His hearing will be held December 19, 2018.

He believed Larry Bronstad, who also has a suspended driver's license, may be driving the vehicle.

When the male driver was able to see Officer Schallock, the car backed up to the gas station and parked again. Officer Schallock observed the vehicle leave after approximately three minutes and turn north on Clinton Street and then left onto Highway 8. Officer Schallock attempted to catch up to the vehicle on Highway 8 as it was traveling eastbound, at an estimated speed of over 80 miles an hour.

Officer Schallock activated his emergency lights

and siren. He observed the vehicle turn right and head south on 8th Street. He also observed the vehicle speed up very quickly and travel at a high rate of speed. Officer Schallock pursued the vehicle, which made several turns and changed directions. Officer Schallock lost sight of the vehicle, but was advised by Deputy Moin that he had observed the vehicle go by him as he was in the area.

Deputy Moin encountered the vehicle and subsequently met the vehicle near the intersection of 9 1/2 Street and 13th Avenue. The lights and siren were activated on his squad car as well. Deputy Moin attempted to make a traffic stop near the intersection and ultimately had to turn around to pursue the vehicle. When they arrived at 8th Street, the vehicle took a left turn and went south again on 8th Street. He observed the vehicle turn into field drive which was an alfalfa field. Deputy Moin pursued him back into the field and observed the driver back the car down a field drive in the woods and flee on foot. Deputy Moin pursued the subject on foot, yelling at him numerous times to stop and also advising that he was a police officer.

During the course of his radio contact with Deputy Moin, Officer Schallock was advised as to where Moe had gone. Officer Schallock made contact with Moe and ordered him to get on the ground. Moe stopped, turned around and walked toward Officer Schallock, yelling at him. Officer Schallock yelled at him numerous times to get on the ground. Moe was at the driver's door of Officer Schallock's squad car and was so close that Officer Schallock could not open the driver's door of the squad car. Ultimately Officer Schallock was able to get out of the squad car and take hold the Moe and direct him to the ground. Officer Schallock advised Moe to remove his hands and place them behind his back. Moe had his hands on the ground underneath him near his lower stomach and waistband area. Officer Schallock believed Moe may be reaching for a weapon and yelled at him to put his hands behind his back or he would let his K-9 out. Officer Schallock was attempting to gain control of Moe's left arm, Moe continued to try and pull his arm away from him. Moe finally removed his arm as a result of the deployment of Officer Schallock's K-9.

If convicted Moe may be fined not more than \$32,500 or imprisoned for not more than six years or both. His driver's license may also be suspended for not more than one year. His preliminary hearing was held November 12, 2018.

**Drivers Should Prepare Now for Fall and Winter Travel Challenges**

Several factors help explain why traffic crashes tend to peak in Wisconsin over the next three months. Along with the potential for wintry weather, there are decreased hours of daylight, increased deer activity, combined with several major travel periods. The Wisconsin State Patrol Law of the Month for November highlights steps drivers should take to prepare themselves and their vehicles to safely navigate the fall and winter driving seasons.

A primary factor behind many crashes and slide-offs is drivers who are going too fast for conditions, Wisconsin State Patrol Captain Nick Wanink of the North-west Region said. To help ensure a safe trip, check the weather forecast and remove any frost, ice or snow from vehicle windows. Then, make sure everyone is buckled up, watch your speed, scan the road ahead carefully and allow adequate following distance.

Posted speed limits apply to ideal travel conditions. State law (346.57) requires drivers to operate at a speed that is reasonable and prudent to maintain safe control of their vehicle. Violations can result in a fine of \$213. State law (346.88) also requires drivers to keep all vehicle windows reasonably clean at all times. Violations can result in a \$175 citation.

**When roads become slippery:**

- Slow down. Avoid sudden braking or steering.

Don't use cruise control.

- Don't be overconfident if you have a four-wheel or all-wheel-drive vehicle. All vehicles require additional time and distance to stop in slippery conditions.

- Remember that bridge decks and overpasses tend to freeze up first.

- Make sure that your vehicle is prepared for the challenges ahead:

- Ensure that vehicle tires are properly inflated, have adequate tread and that the battery and cooling system are in good condition.

- Put a snowbrush/scraper in each vehicle, replace worn windshield wipers and have adequate washer fluid.

- Make sure that headlights and other vehicle lights are operating properly.

- Keep your fuel tank at least half-full to help prevent fuel lines from freezing and provide necessary fuel should you become stranded.

- If your vehicle breaks down, or you slide off the road, its generally safest to stay buckled up inside your vehicle until help arrives, Captain Wanink said. Getting out of your vehicle and walking around a highway is always dangerous, but especially when roads are slippery.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation website provides more tips on safe winter driving, things to consider should you become stranded, keeping your vehicle properly maintained and how to prepare an emergency winter travel kit.

## Wrestling Comes To Cumberland

Today, the tradition of Cumberland Wrestling is well known throughout Northern Wisconsin and the State. That wasn't the case when the sport became a High School extra-curricular offering in 1959.

It started the same year the cities brand new High School was dedicated on November 8, in front of a large crowd in the high school gymnasium. State Superintendent George Watson addressed the attendees, after which an open house was held, complete with free cookies and coffee. The total cost of the building was stated at \$850,000.00.

Joe Hegenbarth, who had come to the District the year before, would become the first wrestling coach. He would say "The wrestling that will be taught is not the fake wrestling seen on television. It will be scientifically based with thorough knowledge of holds and releases." The Beaver Booster added, "Wrestling is a sport where the individual can shine and also where the individual is on his own. Once the wrestler is in the ring, he does not receive any help from his team." That must have dealt with the physical, only!

The first event that took place in the new gymnasium was a basketball game against Barron on November 19. The Advocate said 1400 people filled the gym, only to see Barron pull out a 52-50 victory. That same night, the Isle Theatre was showing the Three Stooges in "Have Rocket Will Travel," and the Company Store was advertising lutefisk for 25 cents a pound.

Wrestling got their chance on January 7, when they opened up their season in the brand-new facility against Rice Lake. Spooner and Barron were two other area schools also in their first year of wrestling.

Rice Lake would win 43-7, but Howard Bents would become part of Cumberland wrestling history with the first ever Beavers victory, a five-point pin. The other two Cumberland points came from a Bob Scharmer tie.

The first team victory would come on January 28, when the Beavers beat Barron 28-23. Leading 25-23 going into the final match, Heavyweight Les Loverude secured the win with a decision over his opponent. Cumberland received additional points from Bob Ekenstedt, Paul Weimer, and Bents pins.

Things went pretty smoothly that first year with the Beavers taking fourth at the Conference Tournament. The exception was the last dual meet of the year, which was called after five matches when the lights went out in the new gymnasium and could not be fixed.

Loverude would become Cumberlands first State participant the following year, in 1960-1961, after winning the Unity Sectional. He would drop his first match in Madison by a referees decision, but the tradition had started. As of last year, 113 Cumberland State participants have hit the Capitol city. The only area State Champion that year was Dave Karpenske of Amery, who would eventually coach the Beavers squad.

Success began to progress at a rapid pace. Loverude would go to State once again his senior year and finish with a 19-1 overall record. In 1963, Phil Peterson would score Cumberlands first ever State Tournament points when he went 2 and 2 in Madison. One of his losses would be to the eventual State Champ. Peterson finished the season at 20-2-1

and his career with back to back HON Titles.

Wrestling had become so popular at the school, that an Intramural Wrestling Tournament was held in early March of 1962. Comstock won the Team Tournament, with Barronett taking second, Section 10 third, and Maple Plain fourth. Among the individual winners was Bob Skinner, who took home the 180-pound weight class.

By the mid-60's, Ben and John Peterson had joined the sport. They would be part of Cumberland's first Regional Championship team in 1967. Ben Peterson would be the team MVP that year, while Ric Chartraw had the most pins with 12.

Before their graduation, both Peterson brothers would have good high school wrestling careers, with Ben going to the State Tournament twice and taking a State runner-up. One of their biggest impacts on the wrestling mat, however, would come in 1972 at the Munich, Germany Olympics, where they took Gold and Silver Medals.

Their welcome home was held two weeks after the Olympics in a Comstock hayfield, where thousands of people congregated to honor the two local heroes. Governor Patrick Lucey was among those joining the throngs of admirers. Cumberland Wrestling would never be the same and this would be only the beginning of their involvement here, including several years of John Petersons assistance on the coaching staff.

After others came close, Cumberlands first Individual State Champion would come in 1980 from 112-pound wrestler, Rick Ranallo. He would win the title with a 7-6 victory in the finals, coming from behind to take the win. This was something the Advocate would say was his trademark all season.

Ranallo's State Championship was followed by others from Jamie Olson in 1991, James O'Flanagan in 1992, Josh Peterson and Seth Strickland in 2000, Lucas Hoisington in 2007, Chip Erickson in both 2010 and 2011, and Ben Stone in 2015. Conference titles would soon become a regular winter event and large crowds would fill the gym to watch the sport.

Martens, only a sophomore, was at the receiving end of numerous passes. Named at the receiver position, his 56 re-


ceptions placed him 15th in the State this fall. He scored nine touchdowns and added 293 rushing yards to his excellent year.

# An Outdoorsman's Journal

## Return to Paradise

**Hello friends,**  
We all know how time flies when you are having fun. This week that fact was once again proven to me when I camped in The Meadow Valley Wildlife Area in northern Juneau County for the 48th year in a row.

In simple terms, 48 hunting seasons ago my dad the late Robert Walters took myself and my brothers Tom and Mike deer hunting and camping to this enormous tract of public land (all together over 180 square miles when combined with the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge and county land).

Folks I fell in love with this place and over the years The Red Brush Gang was formed which is the name of our deer camp, and that is what this weeks column is about.

**Thursday, November 1st  
High 48, low 32**

I had just enough time to build a quick camp this afternoon, and then headed out to a nearby flowage with my golden retriever Ruby for a duck hunt. As is the case for everyone in this part of the world there is a lot of water, and it is eating away the gravel roads and was probably the reason that I did not fire my gun on this hunt.

There is so much water in the woods and other marsh's that ducks in this area are scattered.

A bit of history on the marsh I was hunting. I caught the last wolf in Juneau County on the last hour of the last day of Wisconsin's last legal wolf trapping and hunting season. That wolf was in my last trap.

Back in the winter of 90/91 I camped here from mid September through most of the winter and was a true hermit. I was hand writing this column and would mail it out in Mather and get my photos printed in Tomah.

I cross country skied hundreds of miles each winter and was a very avid ice skater. I spent at least 4 years of my life camped here when you add up all of the experiences and never skied or skated in the daylight.

I would stay up until about 3:00 a.m and would finish my day skiing and skating. Knowing back in 91 that I was going to try to hike the entire Appalachian Trail this is where I trained and that was with an eight foot oak log on my shoulders and two one-gallon jugs of ice in my golden retriever "Ben's" pack.

The name that you see at the end of this column each week "Sunset" was my trail name on the AT. Ben and I made it 1244-miles at which time I became very ill with the affects of long term dehydration, and ended up in a hospital in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania for a week.

**Friday, November 2nd  
High 52, low 31**

Ruby and I were in a canoe on that same marsh long before daylight and I did not fire a shot while hunting, I do not get too caught up in duck less hunts or fish less outings. Today I started cutting wood for The Red Brush Gangs' camp as most of the gang would be in camp the next morning to build our shack for the deer season.

**Saturday, November 3rd  
High 50, low 33**

Today was a great day, as this day is every year. Nineteen members of The Red Brush Gang made it to camp to assemble our 18x36 foot temporary pole barn/deer shack in the woods. The Red Brush Gang's number one elder is Tony Cibulka, and Tony is 81. Tony and I would be wood cutters as between the two wood stoves and eternal campfire we go through four pick up loads. Tony is one tough critter and is very good with a chainsaw.

The 17 other members split wood and did one heck of a job of building the shack, running gas lines for five propane lights, putting up bunk beds for 18, which is not enough, and rigging up our kitchen and two wood stoves.

Shortly after dark our work was done and we did what we always do at night. We drank beer, told stories, ate great food and laughed a lot. I love this place, I moved to this part of Wisconsin because of it, and as I have always said, by taking kids on outdoor

# WIDNR Deer Hunting Forecast for Barron and Polk County

Sportsmen will be finding plenty of deer when they head to the fields and forests this fall, despite a winter that never seemed to end.

After three mild winters in a row, these Central Farmland counties experienced a more severe winter. However, losses were minimal and the effect on reproduction does not seem to be great. There are plenty of does that have twin fawns and even some reports of triplets. Fawns seem to be healthy and growing to a large size already. Winter stress on bucks can affect their antler development, but we will wait and see this fall what the effects will be on rack size. Preliminary observations of bucks show some nice bucks on the landscape in these farmland units so effects may not be great. Overall, Barron and Polk

produce trophy bucks and provide entries every year in the Pope and Young and Boone and Crockett record books. Approximately 40% of the harvested bucks are 2 1/2 years or older so even if they do not make the record book, with abundant food, fertile farmland soils, and good genetics, these are a quality deer in anybody's book.

Along with quality bucks, these counties produce good numbers of deer for those that want to fill the freezer. Polk County is consistently in the top 10 statewide for total harvest and was in the top 5 for both gun and bow harvest in 2017. Although it does not have as many deer as its neighbor to the west, Barron County made the top 10 in total harvest in 2017. With abundance comes some challenges, and several metrics point to the abun-

dant population. There has been a substantial increase in deer/vehicle collisions in both counties. The number of nuisance complaints in regard to grazing on ornamental flowers, shrubbery and gardens has increased. Agricultural damage is increasing and forest regeneration is being affected in some areas. Managing deer populations to remain in balance with these environmental and social factors will require a substantial antlerless harvest. In Barron County, two antlerless harvest authorizations are included with each deer hunting license. Likewise, Polk County hunters will receive one antlerless harvest authorization with each license. Both counties will have additional antlerless harvest authorizations that can be bought over the counter. Some sportsmen and

outdoor enthusiasts may be concerned about overharvest with these large numbers of antlerless harvest authorities available. However, along with population estimates which show increasing deer numbers in both counties, other independent indicators and observations by the public also point toward a growing deer population.

Maintaining a deer population in balance with the habitat is important for the well-being of the deer themselves and allows them to survive severe winters such as the one just experienced, or to a greater degree, like the winter of 2013-14. Overall, it looks like a great fall for hunting in Barron and Polk County for whatever kind of deer that interests you, whether you are looking for that trophy buck or just want to fill the freezer. Enjoy it.

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

SECTION FIVE. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect on the day after passage and publication as provided by law.
