



## Shots fired on Highway 53

On Sunday, March 17, 2019, at 9:50 p.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call from a female advising that she was walking on Highway 53 by Rice Lake after a domestic with her husband, Steve Anderson. She stated that he had hit her, pulled a gun out and pointed it at her. After she exited the car, he fired several rounds off.

Barron County Deputies, along with the Rice Lake Police Department, were sent to the area where Joni was located. A Rice Lake Police Officer spotted the suspect vehicle on Highway

53 and attempted to stop the car. The vehicle did not yield to the officer for about one mile and finally came to a stop on Highway 53. Mr. Anderson was taken into custody without further incident and two firearms were located in the car.

Steven Anderson, 39, of Rice Lake, is being held in the Barron County Jail on charges of 1st Degree Reckless Endangerment, Armed While Intoxicated, Battery, Domestic Abuse, Knowingly Flee an Officer and Operating a Motor Vehicle While Intoxicated, 2nd.

## Cumberland man sentenced

Randy L. Schamberger, 43, of Cumberland, who was charged with seven counts of capture an intimate representation and one count of misdemeanor invade privacy-use surveillance device to take photos of patrons at a local fitness club, has been found guilty of the charges. It was previously reported that he used a USB phone charger plugged into a wall outlet of the tanning rooms to take photos.

Officers reviewed the data that was captured, which included nude and partially nude footage of multiple female patrons. When questioned Schamberger admitted to setting up the cameras.

Schamberger was found guilty to one count of capture an intimate representation and two counts of misdemeanor invade privacy-use surveillance device. The remaining charges were dismissed, but read in by the court.

He received a withheld sentence of three years of probation to be served concurrently with two years of probation on one of the misdemeanor convictions for invade privacy-use surveillance device. The Court also ordered 90 days of time in county jail, to be served consecutively to a nine month county jail sentence that he received for the other of his misdemeanor conviction of invade privacy-use surveillance device. He received credit for two days previously served and was granted Huber work privileges.

The Court also ordered Schamberger to complete sex offender treatment, along with any other evaluations, counselling, treatment and follow-up recommended by the Department of Corrections. The issue of sex offender registration is to be left open until completion of probation.

## State Health Officials Warn the Flu Season is Far From Over

*Stronger H3 flu virus making the rounds throughout the state*

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) expects this to be one of the longest flu seasons in recent memory with the powerful influenza A/H3 virus currently affecting young and old alike.

"The average peak for flu activity is the first week of February, but we expect this season to extend at least through the end of March, if not beyond," said DHS Influenza Coordinator Thomas Haupt.

The H3 type of the virus is more powerful than the A/H1 virus that circulated earlier in the flu season. While the first wave was hard on younger people, Haupt says the H3 virus is hitting people 65 years old and older especially hard.

"H3 is covered by this year's flu vaccine, so if you haven't already, know there is still time to get a flu shot," Haupt added.

The flu vaccine is safe and effective and is a better match to this season's virus than last year's vaccine.

## Spring snowmelt and rain can contaminate wells

*Well owners encouraged to be vigilant as the seasons change*

Warming temperatures, snow melt, rain and lingering frozen ground can create conditions that may affect private wells and drinking water.

"Our recent rain, mixed precipitation and local

flooding throughout the state is a reminder that changing spring weather can lead to well contamination," said Liesa Lehmann, DNR private water section chief. "At this time of year we encourage well owners to watch for signs of flooding and note any change in the color, smell or taste of

their drinking water."

Owners who see flood waters very near or over their wells should assume their drinking water could be contaminated. Take the following steps:

- Stop drinking the water and find another safe source.
- Once the waters recede, make sure the well is prop-

erly disinfected.

- Before drinking the water again, sample the well to assure the water is safe.

Flood waters and rain runoff may contain bacteria and other contaminants that can affect water supplies and cause illness. Wells located in pits, basements

## Red Cross offers a surprising way to help patients kick cancer

*Give platelets or blood to help patients battling cancer*

People may be surprised that they can play a direct role in the fight against cancer, and it's easier than they might think. By donating platelets or blood through the American Red Cross, donors can share their strength and help patients kick cancer.

Platelets are tiny cells that form clots and stop bleeding. About 2 million units of platelets are transfused each year in the U.S., and more than half of all donated platelets go to cancer patients.

"Some cancers and certain types of chemotherapy drugs and radiation can damage bone marrow, where red blood cells and platelets are produced," said Dr. Pampee P. Young, chief medical officer, American Red Cross. "Cancer patients often require blood products during treatment or after surgical procedures. Platelet transfusions, in particular, are needed to prevent life-threatening bleeding and help cancer patients

continue receiving lifesaving treatments."


Because platelets must be transfused within just five days from the time they are donated, platelet donors have the power to help save up to three lives within days of their donation.

In addition to cancer patients, platelets and blood are needed every day for lifesaving surgeries, traumas and those living with blood disorders. The Red Cross must collect more than 2,500 platelet and about 13,000 blood donations every day for patients at about 2,500 hospitals nationwide. In the North Central Blood Services Region, 138 platelet and 671 blood donations are needed each day.

**How to donate platelets**

Platelet donation is available at the following Red Cross blood donation centers. Appointments are encouraged and can be made using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org/Cancer or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

## Important Reminders for Voters About the April 2nd Spring Election

The Wisconsin Elections Commission reminds voters to bring an acceptable photo ID when they go to the polls for the Spring Election on Tuesday, April 2, 2019.

"Most people already have the ID they need to vote," said Meagan Wolfe, Wisconsin's chief election official. "If you don't have a photo ID, you still have time to get a free one at the DMV, but you should not wait."

Acceptable photo IDs for voting include a Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin state ID card, Veterans Health Administration ID card, military ID card, U.S. passport, tribal ID card and some student ID cards. A full list is available at [BringIt.WI.gov](http://BringIt.WI.gov).

If you do not have all the paperwork you need to get a free state ID card, such as a birth certificate, the DMV will still help you get a temporary document that you

can use for voting, Wolfe said.

Wolfe reminds voters that the address on their photo ID does not have to match the address on the poll book. "When you show your ID, you are proving your identity, not where you live," she said. "Voters only have to prove where they live when they register to vote."

**What's on the ballot?**

To find out what's on your ballot, visit the My Vote Wisconsin website: <https://MyVote.WI.gov>.

All voters will have the opportunity to elect a Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice in the Spring Election. Voters in Wisconsin Court of Appeals Districts 2, 3 and 4 will have uncontested races for judge. There are also elections for 29 circuit court judges in 15 counties, three of which are contested races (Milwaukee County Branch 40, Ozaukee

County Branch 2 and Racine County Branch 7).

Most voters will also have local elections for school board members and for municipal offices including mayors, village board presidents and town chairs; city alderpersons, village board trustees and town supervisors; and city, village and clerks or clerk/treasurers. In all, more than 10,200 local offices are up for election across the state.

There are also 87 local referendum questions on the ballot across Wisconsin, including binding questions about exceeding school revenue caps and bonds, as well as advisory questions including all-

terrain vehicles, marijuana legalization and redistricting.

**How do I register to vote or check my voter registration?**

In Wisconsin, voters can register at the polling place on Election Day. However, Wolfe reminds voters that if they plan to register for the first time or update their registration with a change of name or address at the polls on Election Day, they must bring a proof of residence



## View from my Senate seat: A Fresh Start by Senator Janet Bewley

As I looked out my kitchen window the other morning, I noticed that the snow was beginning to melt. I could see a little more of the White River, which runs past my home up in Delta. It finally felt like we'd turned the corner on winter. I'm sure we'll have more snow, but Spring is coming, and for most of us, it can't come fast enough.

It's a feeling of a fresh start in the State Capitol as well. Legislators from around the state are proposing new ideas on how to make Wisconsin an even better place to live and work. I appreciate the opportunity the voters gave me to represent them for another four years. I look forward to working with colleagues

both familiar and new. And of course we have a new Governor in Tony Evers, who just two weeks ago unveiled his budget proposal before a joint hearing of the legislature.

It's a departure from the budgets we've seen in the past. During his campaign for office, Governor Evers spoke of a budget that works for everyone in the state, not just a select few. That means reinvestment in our public schools, finding ways to pay for our roads and bridges, and ensuring that all of us have clean water, both to drink and enjoy recreationally. To me, this budget is like springtime. A new beginning after winter's deep freeze.

It is clean water that I think about as I watch the White River meander pass my window. We're incredibly lucky here in the North to have access to such amazing lakes and rivers; it's part of our identity. But that doesn't mean there aren't challenges. Over the last several years we've watched the erosion of science in our DNR, and seen many wells, primarily in Northeastern Wisconsin poisoned by runoff from CAFO's. Governor Evers budget helps address

these issues.

Through the creation of the Bureau of Natural Resources Science, five new scientists will be brought on to research water quality statewide and help identify areas of contamination. It also authorizes \$6.5 million for a program known as Target Runoff Management or TRM. This will provide municipalities the financial assistance to combat runoff of animal waste from CAFO's throughout the state, and it will also incentivize the owners of those CAFO's to police themselves to help combat this issue.

The legislative process is long, and no doubt changes will be made to the Governor's budget along the way. I hope that regardless of party or political ideology, my colleagues and I can all agree that clean water is essential to our way of life and work together to pass these proposals. It's time for a fresh start. I will be holding listening sessions on the state budget across the district in the coming weeks and months. I look forward to hearing your thoughts on the Governor's proposals as well as your ideas about how to make this great State even better.

## Gov. Evers declares State of Emergency for flooding

On Friday, March 15th, Governor Tony Evers declared a statewide State of Emergency in Wisconsin due to flooding caused by rapid snowmelt and rain.

"Many residents and communities across our state have been responding to flooding that has impacted homes, businesses, and cities and towns across Wisconsin," Governor Evers said. "The warm temperatures and rain the last few days have caused much of the heavy snowpack and ice to melt resulting in flooding, ice jams, and rivers and creeks to rise. I would like to thank all the first responders who have been helping those in need."

Executive Order #16 directs state agencies, including the Wisconsin National Guard, to provide additional personnel and resources as needed to assist in emergency response and recovery operations.

## Northwoods Notebook: What if there was no newspaper? by Larry Werner

I grew up in a home with five siblings, two parents and a newspaper.

No matter how tight the money was in our one-income household, and it was plenty tight at times, my parents always found the cash to pay for the paper. And even though neither Mom nor Dad was well educated, they both read the local newspaper as religiously as we attended church and avoided meat on Fridays.

Before I finished high school, I was writing for our local newspaper, was working for the college paper before classes began my freshman year, and spent 45 years after college as a writer and editor in cities from Dallas to Detroit, Buffalo to Minneapolis.

As these words attest, I'm still writing for a newspaper six years after retiring. Each morning, I read a daily newspaper, often online, and on Wednesday, I stop by the Advocate office to pick up a copy of the paper you're now reading.

With the newspaper so much a part of my 71 years, the following words hurt when I read them in the *Minneapolis Star Tribune*

the other day:

"According to an Associated Press analysis of data compiled by the University of North Carolina, more than 1,400 towns and cities in the U.S. have lost a newspaper over the past 15 years."

The story dealt with reasons for newspaper closings: Loss of advertisers to the internet, a drop in advertising by national retailers and a steady decline in the numbers of people subscribing to newspapers over the past 30 years. (*Editor's note: We at the Advocate have been very fortunate. Our number of subscribers has remained steady through these years.*)

When I bought a place in Cumberland five years ago, I found a lot of things to like about this little town — the lake, of course, a vibrant arts community, a main street filled with independent merchants and a newspaper that's been chronicling life here for almost 140 years.

I feel privileged that Publisher Paul Bucher has allowed me to write for *The Advocate*, just as I felt lucky when the sports editor of my hometown paper hired me to cover high school

sports. A newspaper is more than something to read: It's an institution that builds community, celebrates a town's accomplishments, grieves its losses, entertains with stories of human interest and, perhaps most important, informs you, the reader, about what's happening in the place you live, work and play.

I'm spending some time in a Florida retirement community this month, and one of the first things I noticed when I started coming here three years ago is that at the end of virtually every driveway each morning is *The Villages Daily Sun*. We old people read newspapers.

What would happen if there was no newspaper? You wouldn't know what's happening at the school board meetings, at city council, with the local sports teams, who died, what businesses closed or opened, what's happening at the arts center and a thousand other things that are part of our shared life as a community.

Let's hope that never happens in Cumberland.

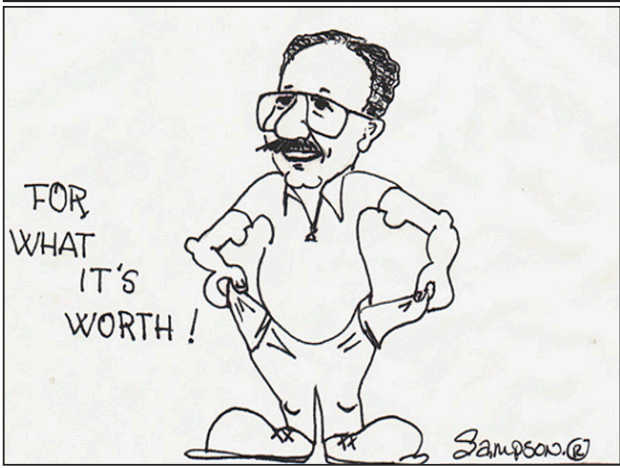

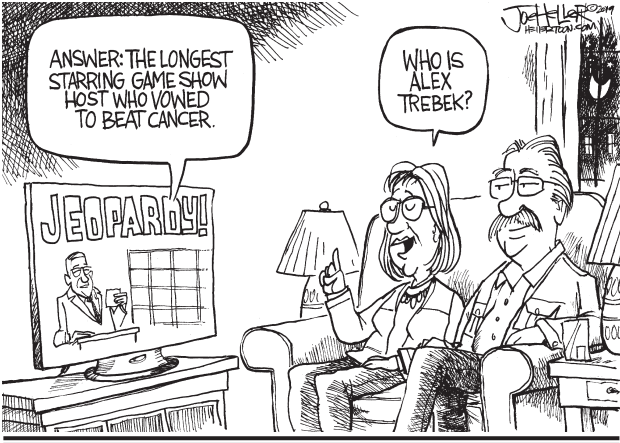

### Recent Weather doesn’t negate Global Warming

If huge snow and ice storms and severe cold weather occur, does it mean that there is no global warming? There is no human caused climate change; Mother Nature cannot be manipulated, right?

It certainly feels that way this winter. But just because some of us have suffered through a particularly cold and snowy period doesn’t negate the fact that our globe is warming as we continue to emit carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases into the atmosphere.

According to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the 10 warmest years on record have occurred since 1997. The National Atmospheric and Oceanographic Administration (NOAA) reports that the warming we’ve seen since the late 19th century is unprecedented over the last 1,000 years.

Perhaps even more important is that ocean temperatures are increasing at a rate of 0.12 degrees centigrade per decade. While this doesn’t seem like much,

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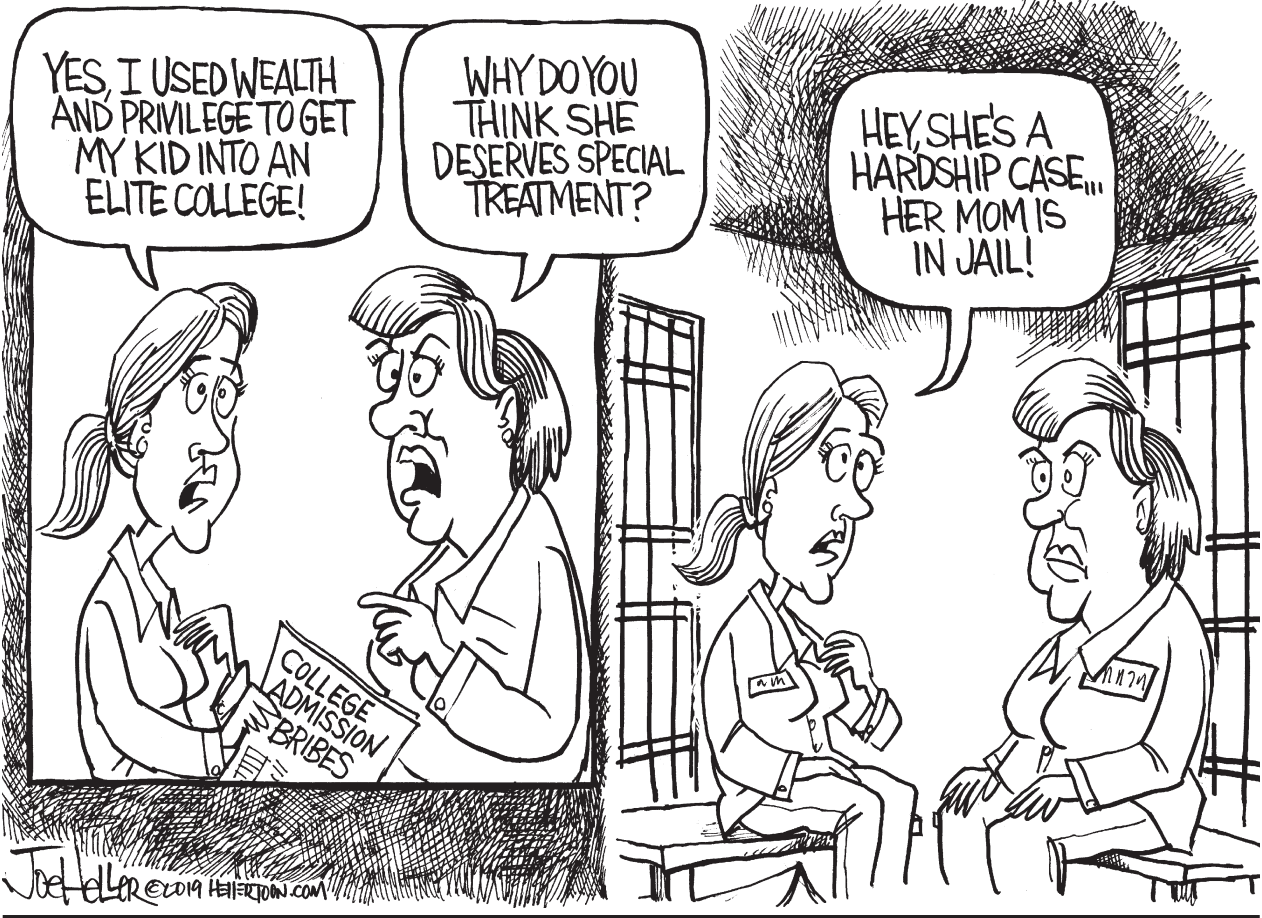

## Inside Wisconsin by Tom Still

### Building stronger tech workforce is issue nationally and in Wisconsin

MADISON, Wis.—Young people are natives when it comes to using technology, from smart phones to tablets, and from social media to video games, but they can be aliens when it comes to working in tech jobs.

Despite the coast-to-coast glut of well-paid jobs in tech professions such as coding, cybersecurity and network management, the pipeline of potential workers is much smaller than what observers would prefer.

With experts predicting there will soon be eight information technology jobs for every qualified applicant, how does the process of training people – the workforce “supply” – keep pace with the demands of industry in virtually every sector?

Four-year colleges and tech colleges in Wisconsin and elsewhere are making strides, but the need for qualified workers now is capturing the attention of two other groups: for-profit colleges that are well positioned to produce qualified students, and federal and state policymakers.

Steve Gunderson, who represented Wisconsin’s 3rd Congressional District for 16 years, is president of the Washington-based Career Education Colleges and Universities, an association that represents some of

the nation’s 2,700 private, for-profit schools. Some of these accredited schools are focused on careers in medical professions, cosmetology, culinary arts and automotive skills, but a growing number are specializing in tech professions.

“We’re not competing with schools such as the UW-Madison and its computer sciences department; we’re more about a different kind of student who wants to earn credentials in a given amount of time, to find a job, or to enhance the jobs they’re already doing,” Gunderson said.

A growing area is cybersecurity, where needs are exploding in sectors ranging from retail to financial to healthcare.

One of the leading producers of cybersecurity talent is the University of Advancing Technology in Tempe, Ariz., which has been producing graduates in the field since 1998 – before cybersecurity was a commonly used term. It was called “network defense” at the time.

“All we do is tech,” said UAT President Jason Pistillo, a self-described “tech geek” whose school has produced about 5,000 graduates in 20 programs over time through an intense and unique curriculum. Students

have hailed from all 50 states and are hired almost as soon as they’re done.

“On any given day, there are 10 jobs for every one of our students,” he said. The demand is especially high in cybersecurity, where 30 percent of UAT graduates have classified credentials and another 20 percent work in jobs where there are non-disclosure agreements in place.

“You can’t swing a stick without hitting one of our (cybersecurity) graduates,” Pistillo said.

He laments the lack of college students studying technology and has worked in Arizona and beyond to build a younger base of students, giving away about 1,200 computers over time and working with K-12 districts on curriculum, coding camps and more.

The talent shortage is why federal and state policymakers seem intent on closing the gap. In Congress, a bipartisan bill that shows promise for states such as Wisconsin is the CHANCE in Tech Act. That’s an acronym for Championing Apprenticeships for New Careers and Employees in Technology.

The bill is a recognition that tech apprenticeships in the United States are largely a patchwork of programs

that don’t always result in certificates that are “portable” from one workplace to another. It would instruct the U.S. Department of Labor to award contracts to industry intermediaries to develop apprenticeships in tech; define how those intermediaries – such as colleges of all types – would work with business; and make apprenticeships available to high school students, early college science and tech students and post-secondary students.

It recognizes that IT professions don’t require a four-year college degree and jobs can be filled with a skilled workforce that has other certified training.

In Wisconsin, several bills have been introduced to encourage more internships and to support “upskilling” of people quickly through what is described as “micro-credentials” in hard-to-fill fields.

Whether it is Congress or the Wisconsin Legislature, there can be partisan hurdles to finding solutions. With worker shortages looming in so many critical tech fields, let’s hope those differences give way to action.

document like a utility bill showing the voter's current name and address.

"Election Day registration ensures that everyone who is qualified to vote will get to vote," said Wolfe, interim administrator of the WEC. "However, you must bring a current proof of residence document to register on Election Day."

Acceptable proof of residence documents also include a lease, bank statement, cell phone bill or other official government documents, and can be shown on paper or displayed on an electronic device like a smartphone or tablet. A list of acceptable documents is available at <https://elections.wi.gov/publications/voter-guides/proof-of-residence>. Before Election Day, you must have lived at your current address for at least 10 days to be eligible to vote, but the proof of residence document does not need to be 10 days old.

You can also register to vote before Election Day. Registration in your municipal clerk's office takes place until 5 p.m. on the Friday before the election (March 29, 2019). Remember, you will still need to bring your

proof of residence document to register.

Online voter registration is now closed, but voters on the state's MyVote Wisconsin website <https://MyVote.WI.gov> can check their registration status. Online registration reopens after the election.

### Where do I vote?

The easiest and most reliable way to find your polling place is to visit MyVote Wisconsin: <https://MyVote.WI.gov/en-US/FindMyPollingPlace>. While it is likely you will vote at the same polling place as November 2018, it is also possible there have been changes. Checking MyVote before Election Day will ensure there will be no surprises, and you can even get map directions to your polling place.

### When and where can I vote absentee?

Thursday, March 28 is the last day for most voters to request an absentee ballot from their municipal clerk's office. Friday, March 29 is the last day for voters who are indefinitely confined to their homes due to age, illness, disability or infirmity to request an absentee ballot. Finally, Tuesday, April 2 at 5

p.m. is the deadline for clerks to issue absentee ballots to hospitalized voters.

Wolfe urged voters who are thinking about requesting an absentee ballot not to wait until the legal deadlines for doing so to ensure ample time for the post office to deliver and return them in time to be counted. Absentee ballots must be returned to the municipal clerk's office by Election Day in time for the clerk to send the ballot to the polling place.

Many municipal clerks offer in-person absentee voting (also known as early voting) in their offices during regular business hours up until the Friday before the election, March 29. Some larger cities offer in-person absentee voting at satellite locations including public libraries before the election, including the weekend before the election. Some smaller municipalities offer in-person absentee voting by appointment only. For the schedule in your city, village or town, call your municipal clerk's office. Visit <https://MyVote.WI.gov/en-US/MyMunicipalClerk> to find your clerk's contact information.

Brannan added a 7th in the 55-meter hurdles, while Brenna was 7th in the triple jump. The final Cumberland place winner was Tanner Johnson, who was 8th in the 200-meter dash.

Overall, I was pleased with our overall performances,” added Coach O’Connell.



Spring Lake for Gators

**Hello friends,**  
From about 1992 until 2018 I averaged catching between 1 to 3 northern pike per year that was 40-inches or more. Many of these were caught through the ice and a few in June in Canada and I have never hit 43-inches. With the end of winter approaching I decided to head to Pool 5 on the Mississippi River near Buffalo City where I would hike in. There would be three trips and I would spend two nights sleeping on the ice and try to fetch some meat and catch a trophy.

**Friday, March 8th**  
**High 33, low 22**

The trek in would not have been so difficult had it not been for 10-30 inches of snow which had 6-inches of water underneath it. Slush on the ice is the story for most ice fishermen recently. I pulled three Otter sled loads in with each trip being a 20 minute, mind over matter/pain experience.

It has been about 6 years since I have fished here and I forgot where to put my camp, I say this because some places you are over 4-feet of water and a stones throw away you have 30.

I started to build my camp over 20-feet of water and put out three tip ups with one over 5-feet of water and one over 14 and the other over 20. About three in the afternoon I had my only flag and caught a small northern pike on the tip up over 5-feet of water.

I then made an executive decision, moved my other two tips ups, and fished in the same same depth as where I caught the fish. I also moved my camp.

I had my pup Ruby along for companionship, built a very comfortable camp, and went to sleep shortly after dark.

**Saturday, March 9th**  
**High 34, low 27**

A good sized snow and wind storm was predicted for today. From first light until 9:00 I had no action. Then I started having flags and the fish were taking out line and dropping my minnow which was rigged with a steel leader that had a spinner on it for at-

traction. At noon I made an executive decision and switched all three tip ups over to 20-pound monofilament for leaders and the action was immediate but my fish were still small.

It was at this time that the wind was really blowing and a rain/sleet mix began. At about two I caught a 32-inch northern, and at that time the fishing became incredible. Each tip up was a good hundred yards from camp and walking in the snow/slush was a unique challenge as was landing fish.

The storm was predicted to be a dandy and I have to tell you I was loving life. I had my Eskimo ice shack secured with every rope and ice anchor that I had. Inside my shack I had a comfortable cot, a cook stove, heater, a propane light, a kitchen, and most importantly the gators were hungry and I knew Mrs Pigasauras was not far off.

I had one in the very heavy category bite threw my line, and at dark I had 4 dandies on the ice and let 8 go for a truly incredible afternoon.

That evening I listened to the snow hit the shack and the wind try to blow my shack away from the very comfortable confines of my sleeping bag.

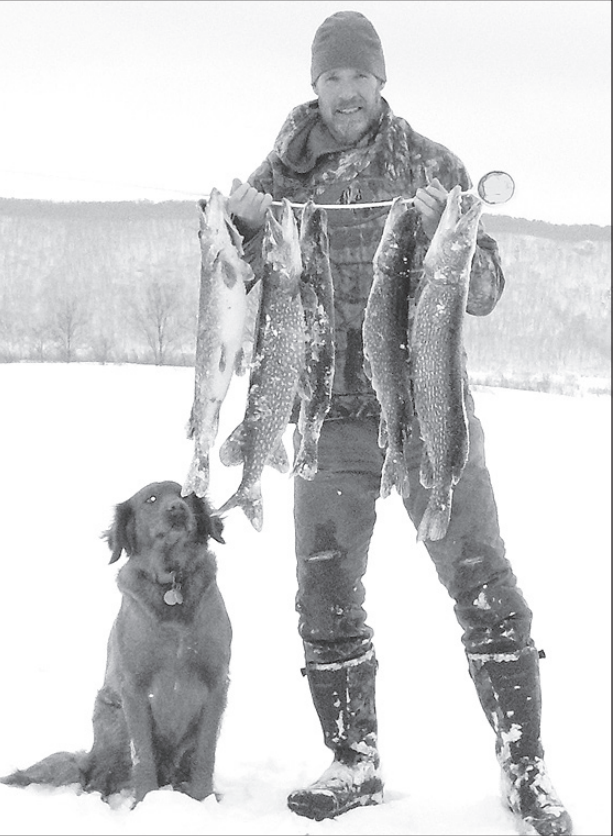

I had so much fun and was kind of bumming that I would not be returning this winter but good luck came my way when I realized Selina had the following weekend off from her job at the Necedah Kwik Trip and she wanted to go back to Spring Lake and try to catch a big gator!

DNR:Black bear management plan open for public comment beginning March 25

Wisconsin wildlife officials will accept public input on a revision to Wisconsin’s black bear management plan beginning March 25.

The Department of Natural Resources has revised the plan to outline objectives and strategies to guide black bear management in the state from 2019-2029.

The plan will be available for public comment at dnr.wi.gov, keyword “bear” from March 25 through April 14.

DNR staff will present the plan at six informational sessions around the state. The event in our area is: Monday, April 1st at 236 Ritzinger Hall, UW Eau Claire-Barron County, 1800

College Dr. The meeting will run from 7-9 p.m.

“There’s likely no wildlife species more emblematic of our northern forests,” noted Scott Walter, DNR Large Carnivore Specialist. “The management plan emphasizes the science-based approach to managing our state’s black bear population and will also address

current issues such as range expansion into southern counties, agricultural damage, and hunting opportunity. Given the ecological importance of black bears and their direct relevance to so many people, we’re excited to get this plan into the hands of the public.”

DNR: Time to buy your fishing and hunting licenses; boat, ATV, UTV and OHM registrations due for renewal

As spring approaches, many Wisconsin residents are anxious to get outdoors and pursue their warmer-weather outdoor recreation passions. You can purchase your 2019 fishing and hunting licenses, as well as order the 2019 collectible conservation card. Licenses and conservation cards can be purchased online at GoWild.wi.gov and from over 1,000 license agents. The new conservation card now features Wisconsin elk, the

Before hitting the trails and waters, the Department of Natural Resources reminds everyone to check the registration on their boats, ATVs, UTVs and off-highway motorcycles (OHM) as many will expire after March 31, 2019. A \$5 late fee will be applied to ATV, UTV and OHM renewals that are received by the DNR after the March 31

expiration date.

DNR encourages you to renew your registration early so the new decals are in-hand when you are ready to use your boat or recreational vehicle. You can renew online before your notice arrives at GoWild.wi.gov through your customer Go Wild account. Or if you have your renewal notice already, you can use the new expedited renewal process through the GoWild.wi.gov web page under the Quick

Sale catalog. Simply click on the RENEW NOW link, enter the RRN number from the renewal notice, which is located to the left of the name and address and make payment. When done, a temporary operating receipt can be printed. Yes, it’s that easy - click, print, GO!

License agents can also renew boats, ATVs, UTVs or OHMs by simply scanning the RRN barcode on the renewal notice.

My prejudice melted away. It had painted a wrong picture of this wonderful person with a beautiful message. He bubbled about the magnificence of an experience he could hardly describe. We had dinner together and sang Johnny Cash songs around a warm campfire that wasn't even lit. He stayed the night in our camper and we parted the next day.

I learned more than he hoped to tell... not the least of which is the title of this true tale. May it also warm your heart.

*"...and who through the Spirit of holiness was appointed the Son of God in power by his resurrection from the dead: Jesus Christ our Lord*  
(Romans 1:4)

The opening verses of Paul's epistle to the Romans stressed that the gospel of Christ was actually the fulfilment of "the gospel He promised beforehand through His prophets in the Holy Scriptures" (Romans 1:2). This promise was centered in God's eternal Son who had been promised from the Old Testament to redeem the world from sin and death. Even from the first book, Genesis 3:15, this promise begins, yet many say this book is allegory and is not a real history or worse, not even God's word. Yet today, we now know that the first promise is true because the promised One raised Himself from the dead. He ate, drank, talked and walked with many eyewitnesses to this fact. He lives and reigns with us today, and is found in Christian worship wherever His Word is preached in truth and His Holy Sacraments are delivered in purity!

The Savior from sin become a man, "concerning His Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh" (Genesis 3:15 and Romans 1:3), yet He also must be sinless in both nature and practice before He could become God's perfect sacrifice for sin. He must be a perfect man as God intended man to be. He must be a "second Adam," created without sin, yet He must not fail as did the first Adam, being "in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15).

He must, therefore, be miraculously conceived, "a body have you prepared for me" (Hebrews 10:5), a perfect body unblemished by a sin. To be born of a virgin and to live a life "holy, harmless, undefiled" until that perfect sinless man could be made "one sacrifice for sins forever" (Hebrews 7:26; 10:12).

Plus, by getting the flu shot, you're protecting yourself and everyone around you from serious illness.

In addition to the vaccine, people are strongly urged to cough or sneeze into a sleeve or tissue (and throw the tissue away after one use), wash their hands and use hand sanitizer, and stay home if they're sick to avoid spreading germs to others.

Hospitalizations for flu-related symptoms are increasing to about 50 a day in Wisconsin, with one in five hospitalized patients being admitted to the intensive care unit due to the severity of their symptoms. So far this season, there have been 36 influenza deaths in the state.

and low-lying areas are especially susceptible to contamination. “Disinfection and sampling is best done by a licensed well driller or pump installer,” says Lehmann. Any water supply system that has been submerged by flood waters should be pumped out once the floodwater recedes, then thoroughly disinfected and tested to determine that the water is safe, she adds. To ensure safe drinking water, well owners are encouraged to learn whether they have a properly constructed well and test it an-

nually for bacteria. More information on bacterial contamination of drinking water wells, along with lists of licensed well drillers, pump installers and labs certified to analyze water samples can be found on DNR’s website. For individuals who receive drinking water from a public water supply, these systems are designed and operated to keep out contaminants. If you have concerns about the safety of your community’s drinking water, contact your public water supplier.

## 3D Coaching

3-Dimensional Coaching is a framework that will allow the coaches of the Cumberland School District (CSD) the opportunity to learn about and how to implement practices that will develop our student athletes in these 3 dimensions: 1) The Body, 2) The Mind, and 3) The Heart. The certification program primarily focuses on how to reach the student athletes in the second two dimensions; The Mind (motivation, confidence, emotions, team cohesion and goal setting), and the Heart (purpose, values, identity, character, significance and self-worth). The coaches will gain valuable information and tools that will help transform the way they “teach” our student athletes through sport and they will develop a transformational purpose statement that will help to guide them in this process. Student athletes who have coaches who teach/coach in all three dimensions learn skills faster as well as are capable of teaching those skills to others, are more adept to handling situations that arise suddenly, develop deeper relationships with teammates and coaches, and possess the ability to be more creative. These skills will help them excel more effectively in the classroom and life beyond high school. Approximately 500 total students play sports (this includes High School and Middle School students, some which play multiple sports). The objective of the 3-Dimensional certification program is to provide common language that our coaching staff will use to educate and transform our student athletes. Having all coaches certified in 3-Dimensional coaching will help to guide the culture of the Athletic Department. Every coach will develop a transformational purpose statement that will guide their coaching and teaching of CSD student athletes. Plus, many more objectives that are unmeasurable, such as deeper relationships, more creative and adaptable students, more intrinsic motivation and self-confidence, improved character, values, and self-worth. Though the Grant is for the 2019-20 school year, the program will serve the District for many years to come.

## 2018 Legacy Grant Reaching New Heights

The Reaching New Heights program established a low ropes course at the Cumberland School District forest for use instructional use with students of all ages. In addition, the equipment is available for use by community businesses and organizations. The program enhances problem solving, creativity, and relationships. Play is just as necessary for adults as it is for kids, but in low-income areas there are often limited spaces for play and fewer people attending arts and cultural activities. The course teaches students how to collaborate, solve problems, work together, listen to each other, take risks, fail and try again and respect ideas. What makes this venture unique is that it stresses teamwork, collaboration, and problem solving in an outdoor environment full of challenges. It compels students to work together and get involved with each other, provides individual and group challenges in balance and coordination, encourages teamwork to support an individual’s goal, providing opportunities for creative thinking, strategic planning and problem solving, and develop communication skills with fellow participants.
