Large crowd once again attended postponed meetings at City Hall

Another large crowd gathered on Wednesday, August 5 for the two council meetings at City Hall that were postponed from the night before. Promptly at 6:30 p.m. the meeting of the Finance & Licensing Committee was called to order. After approving the minutes of their previous meeting, Committee Chairperson, Jim Schullo, opened the floor for public comment.

First to address the committee was Larry Savina, owner of Island Wines & More. The thrust of Savina's comments concerned lack of transparency. He felt that the recent negotiations for the purchase of the former Kwik Trip property and the sudden change in the number of liquor licenses available lacked public transparency. He urged the committee and the council to rescind the license expansion order. He felt that the speed and lack of public information on the purchase and licensing change gave the appearance of back room dealing. He stated that elected officials have a duty not only to the community as a whole but to the individuals and businesses within the community. He said "It is not too late to walk back the liquor license expansion," and that he would like to see that issue separated from the purchase of the Kwik trip property.

Next to speak was Kelly Duncan. Duncan also remarked on the lack of transparency with the Kwik Trip purchase and license expansion. After witnessing, what he felt were similar events in New Richmond, which left the smaller businesses disenfranchised for the sake of larger box store and chains, he came to Cumberland because of the thriving local, small business community. He also suggested that when large

corporations receive local liquor licenses they should be required to make donations to various local charities in order to help support them because of what they might lose in community donations due to business being taken away from the local businesses by the larger concerns.

Ellen Harrison next spoke. Harrison explained that she has donated thousands of hours to various charitable and community organizations and wanted to share her knowledge on how money spent at businesses actually benefits the community. She explained to the council that when \$100 is spent in the community at locally owned businesses \$68 of that \$100 remains in the community, however, when the same hundred dollars is spent at larger regional stores such as Kwik Trip, then only \$43 out of the \$100 remains in the community, and in the case of online purchasing, 100 percent of those dollars leaves the community. Harrison also pointed out that local businesses support the local charities where as the regional or larger national chains do not. She ended by saying open liquor licensing will open the door to outsiders who do not contribute to the community.

Former Alderman Frank Cifaldi then addressed the committee and council. He urged the members of the council to always read their packets *prior* to attending the meetings and to do their homework. They need to ask questions, go to outside authorities for clarifications on laws or procedures, and he strongly asked them to know "what you are doing" and not just take the word of the people who present the documents for the packets.

Finally Tia Bismonte-Duncan addressed the council. Tia, in addition to

echoing the concerns for transparency and support for small businesses, stated that she believes in the community, and that the people of the first ward were not going to let the council drive small businesses into ground.

No one else wished to address the council at this time so the public comment period was closed.

The finance and licensing committee meeting then continued on and after approving the minutes of the previous meeting they moved on to consider the changes in language to Municipal Code 12.03 Liquor Licensing with regards to conditions and closing hours. Tom Goldsmith addressed the committee to explain the reason for the changes.

Apparently, back in 1999 when the Holiday Station Store wished to sell beer and liquor the council imposed a number of physical requirements that had to be in place before they would be willing to grant such license. The restrictions included separate entrance and exits (to prevent shoplifting by underage individuals) and they had to comply with an hours requirement where they could not sell after 9:00 p.m. or before 8:00 a.m. The Council at the time decided that if holiday was willing to meet the requirements, then there was no reason for them not to receive the license. These were the same conditions that the council continued to impose on anyone wishing to obtain the same licensure from that point on. Unfortunately due to some clerical mistake, that language was never actually added into the licensing laws. However, the council continued to impose those standards on future applicants for the license because they were not aware that the language had never been added into the ordinance. Therefore the purpose of the motion in front of the committee was to bring the licensing language up to the standards that the council had been imposing on license applicants so that from here on out there is a level playing field for anyone wishing to obtain this type of license.

Editor's note: Class "A" licenses control "take away" sales. There are two types of Class "A" Liquor Licenses available - one for Beer and one for "hard" Liquor. An applicant can request one or both types. The same physical restrictions apply to applications for either/both type of license.

The motion to update the language of the ordinance to include the physical and time restrictions was approved by the committee and forward to the Council for action.

Having no further business, the Finance & Licensing Committee meeting was then adjourned.

At 7:00 p.m. the regular monthly council meeting was called to order. The Council quickly dispensed with the regular business items and once again the floor was open for public comment. However at this time no one chose to speak.

The council then went on to approve the applica-

A View from the Lake by Tom Schroeder – President, Beaver Dam Lake Management District

Well, we continue to live in strange times. With the cancellations of many events and activities including the Rutabaga Festival and the continual reminders of social distancing and other Covid-19 recommended precautions it seems that Beaver Dam Lake is being used more than ever. With the air temperatures in the 80's and 90's and the water temperature in the high 70's for much of July, being on the lake or in the water was most pleasant. The water quality remains very good with little evidence of algae growth. However, there have been numerous inquiries and questions about Swimmer Itch occurring in various locations around the lake. It doesn't appear to be prevalent throughout the lake but most reports are from areas where water fowl such as geese and ducks frequent. In previous articles I have addressed how to avoid the problem and there is a lot of information on the Internet including a CDC site. You can minimize exposure to the problem by applying an oily lotion on your body, especially your legs before entering the water and by drying off immediately after leaving the water.

The BDLMD Annual

Meeting was held at the Cumberland Middle school on Sat. July 11, 2020. There were 29 in attendance which was higher than I expected because of the Covid-19 concerns. Seating provided distancing opportunities and, although optional face masks were worn by many attendees. Dr. Alan Carson was elected for another term. The proposed budget was passed with funding approved for the match percentage for a potential construction grant and the Planning Grant for the SE storm water pond, the remaining obligation to complete the Jeffery Blvd. and 3rd Ave. storm water project and control of invasive species. The current BDLMD officers agreed to serve another year.

I have received many comments and complaints about wake board boats (Wake Boat - WB) and the effect of the waves that are created on the shoreline, docks, swim rafts and other water craft both on the lake or tied off to docks and/or on lifts. Some people are advocating limiting the use of the Wake Boats including time of day use, limiting areas of the lake and increasing NO WAKE ZONES. However, inboard, inboard-outboard stern drives (I/O)

and outboard powered watercraft can produce waves similar to a WB. The issue is really using a common sense approach when operating any water craft between the no wake speed and top end capability of the water craft. Whether operating a wave runner/jet ski in a circular manner to make waves, operating a large water craft more suited for the great lakes or using a water craft in a manner that creates large waves, the operator should be aware of the boating regulations currently in place that address required distances from land, docks and other watercraft on the lake. Stay as far from shore as possible when creating large waves for wake boarding and surfing. Slowing down or avoiding congested areas on the lake such as the Narrows or the Dam (narrowing between Williams and Rabbit Bay) or stopping dead in the water when experiencing potentially dangerous situations are just a few suggestions that will help address the majority of the complaints I have received. Again, the use of common sense and being aware of the surroundings when operating any water craft may help to address this growing

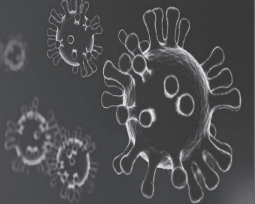

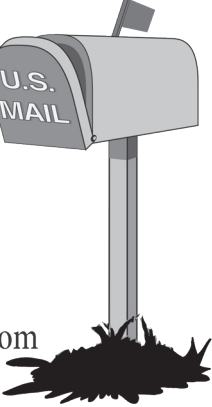

Northwoods Notebook: The summer of our discontent

“We knew it was coming,” a neighbor said to me the other day. But we didn’t know it would come in an onslaught of COVID that has turned The Island City into The Virus City.

Take a look at the graphic on the back page of last week’s *Advocate*. The bar graph shows Cumberland has about four times the number of cases as any other Barron County community. We’re told it isn’t just the outbreak at the Seneca Foods plant that is responsible. People participated in gatherings and parties and were otherwise in contact with people who were carriers, and they tested positive.

From the beginning of this pandemic, we’ve seen news reports of “hot spots” around the country. We’re not in the same league as the places where hundreds have died, but in northwestern Wisconsin, we’re a hot spot, and it doesn’t feel very good.

“Not what I want my hometown to be known for,” my son-in-law, Dan Wistrill, posted on Facebook with a story about the COVID-19 outbreak in Cumberland. And the bad news kept coming.

Dairy Queen and Louie’s Finer Meats have closed temporarily because of the COVID outbreak. Because of a drop in business this summer Bistro 63 has reduced the number of days it’s open. The Island City Co-op has struggled badly,

as have other businesses. Lakeside Restaurant and Idlewild Outfitters are for sale.

It seems appropriate this is the summer we lost our downtown anchor store – Peter & Annie’s World Market.

But let’s look at the bright side: Rick and Jessi Sebens bought the Peter & Annie’s building and plan to open Salud Salt & Spa, which will offer massage, reiki and other spa services. They are in the process of renovating the main street building. And Vickie Komarek is renting the old Kwik Trip at the four-way stop for a new Peter & Annie’s coffee shop and café she hopes to open by mid-September.

I told Vickie she will have the best location in town for her new coffee shop. Several thousand cars pass through the intersection of Second Avenue and 63/48 each weekend in summer. A few weeks back, I wrote about my wife Ann’s idea that Cumberland could be a halfway stop for northbound travelers the way Tobie’s bakery and restaurant are halfway between the Twin Cities and Duluth.

Peter & Annie’s II could be the Tobie’s of northwestern Wisconsin. It will be a great place to stop for a coffee, sweets or lunch if you’re headed north or east on Friday or south and west on Sunday. There’s plenty of parking at the former gas station/convenience store,

and room for tables outside.

And another piece of good news: The three old houses on the south shore of Library Lake are being demolished and will be replaced with a retention pond for stormwater runoff and a park where visitors can stop in our town for a break from the road. We need picnic tables there so visitors and locals can enjoy one of Vickie’s takeout lunches, or a burger from the Corner Bar, or some of the Spot Bar’s broasted chicken while sitting lakeside.

I’d like to see someone buy Lakeside Restaurant and restore its focus on pizza, and let’s deliver that pizza.

The Idlewild building is a great spot for an entrepreneur who could live in the loft apartment upstairs or rent it out to weekend visitors. How about a candy store or a used book and music store or a shared work office where all these people who have been working at home during the pandemic, having demonstrated they don’t have to be in their city offices, can do their jobs in a co-working space in a lovely town on a lake?

This crazy time will pass, and Cumberland will come out of it better than ever. Or am I just a cockeyed optimist?

tion for operators picnic and transient merchant licenses that were on file with the clerks office. There had been a previously announced agenda item to deal with applications for Class “A” Liquor Licenses, however it was determined that it would be better to hold an additional Council session on August 12th at 5:00 p.m. to deal specifically with that issue, so that agenda item was skipped. Note: The complete agenda for that meeting is posted on the door of the Advocate, at City Hall and on the City’s website.

The council then moved on to dealing with Street improvement project matters which included approving a change order for the Arcade and Water Street project in the amount of \$24,188.24. The Council also approved of a payment for Haas and Sons Inc. in the amount of \$550,062.35. The next approval was the engineering contract to CBS² for the Water Street and 4th Avenue project in the amount of 164,800. This represents the upcoming next phase of the street improvement projects for 2020-21

The council then voted to approve the change in wording to ordinance 747 regarding the changes to Municipal Code 12.03 concerning conditions and closing hours for the Class “A” Liquor Licenses that was approved at the Finance &

Licensing committee meeting just held.

The council then turned their attention to proposed changes to Municipal Code 11.08 (Garbage Service). The changes were made to clean up some language in preparation for bidding the new contract, which is scheduled for January 2021.

When the Carlone St. Project was approved by the DNR (land behind the new Don Johnson facility), there was a requirement to purchase “Wetland Credits” to offset the changes made to the existing wetlands on the property. The council approved that purchase.

The last action item on the agenda was asking for approval to pay an “Essential Employee” bonus to the Clerk-Treasure to cover the extended hours and responsibilities engendered by the COVID crisis. This motion was tabled to a later time.

In committee reports, Michael Cifaldi mentioned that the Fire District was starting to plan for the eventual retirement of current Chief Barry Kuenkel.

Al Bock, as representative to the Beaver Dam Lake Management District, reported on the demolition of the three properties on Elm Street. These properties have been purchased by the Lake District in order to install another storm water retention pond to further stop the filling of Library Lake by runoff silt. Plans

for the area also include park space and a possible walking trail. Bock also reported that work on the Senior Center kitchen is nearing completion.

Tom Goldsmith reported, as liaison to the Utility Commission, that an agreement has been reached regarding providing electricity to the new hospital property. The property is officially located in the area designated to be served by Excel Energies. Barron Electric negotiated with Excel to acquire the rights for service, which they have since turned over to Cumberland Municipal Utility.

Butch O’Dell announced that a Downtown Facade loan was granted to the new business which is taking over the former Peter & Annie’s space on 2nd Avenue and work has begun on the remodelling.

With nothing further to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at 7:36 p.m.

The Council will meet at 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 12th to discuss liquor license applications on file.

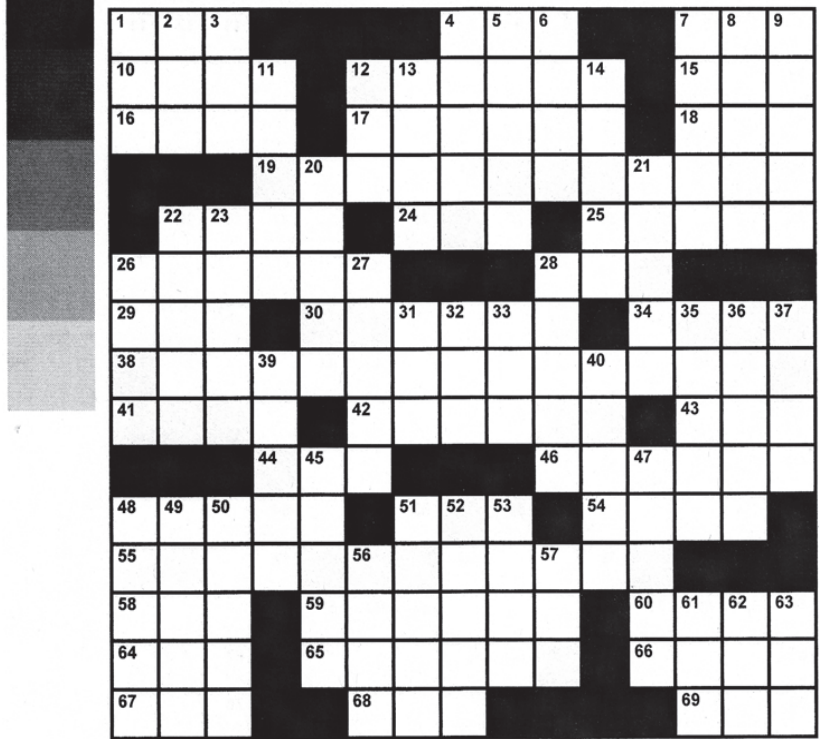

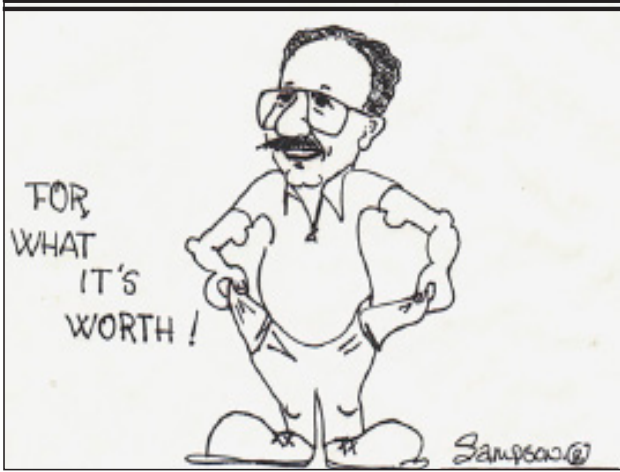

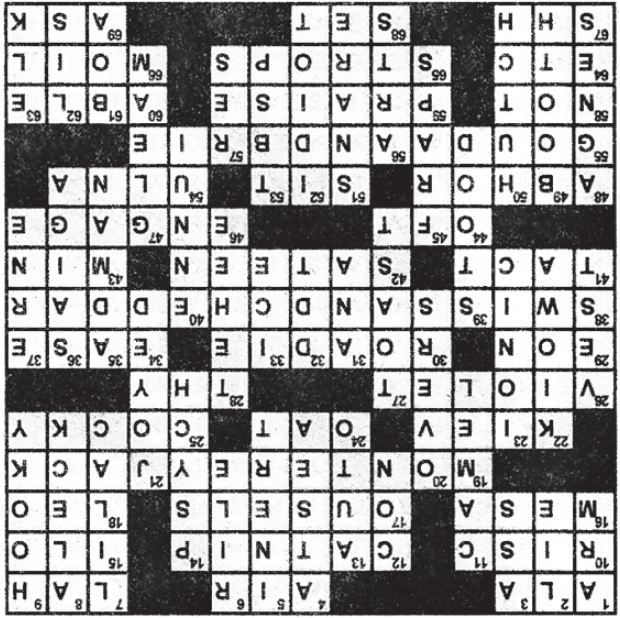

COVID-19 crisis throws into focus the problems of rural broadband

MADISON, WI - In Kenya, a Google-related company called Loon is working with an East African carrier to provide internet service through a fleet of high-altitude balloons. Hovering about 12 miles high in the stratosphere, the balloons will extend 4G connections across 31,000 square miles and represents the world’s first commercial use of the technology.

Asked why the tennis court-sized balloons are being tried in Kenya, the head of a tech research firm in Nairobi cited the coronavirus pandemic. “I think our current time of COVID-19 requires us to rethink infrastructure, essential services, movement of people, collection of data and connectivity,” Nendo founder Mark Kaigwa told the New York Times.

While it remains to be seen whether Loon is a permanent fixture in Kenya’s internet grid or a transition technology until more cell powers can be built and fiber optic lines laid, the sense of urgency surrounding rural broadband is not confined to isolated locations elsewhere.

It’s also a big deal in the United States, where COVID-19 has exposed

challenges of unconnected communities when it comes to schools, health care and economic development.

As Congress and the White House debate how to further respond to COVID-19, improving “hard” infrastructure needs such as roads, bridges, railroads and more has attracted attention. The communications infrastructure represented by broadband should be no less vital at a time when the nation’s digital divide threatens to deepen.

Two nationwide coalitions weighed in this week with letters to congressional leadership, urging them to support bills that would help pay for expanding rural broadband while cutting red tape that sometimes stands in the way of improving service.

The Tech Councils of North America, representing about 35 state and regional groups representing more than 20,000 tech firms, and Connect Americans Now, which spoke for 46 groups ranging from farmers to schools to small businesses, independently outlined the connectivity problem in much rural America.

While about 95 percent of American homes have ac-

cess to the internet, the percentage is much lower in rural America – and as low as 50 percent in parts of Wisconsin. About 42 million Americans lack internet access, which means there’s no working or schooling from home during a pandemic.

Connect Americans Now urged a “technology neutral” approach to federal broadband legislation, which means technologies ranging from television “white space” transmission, small-cell wireless technologies and – yes, giant balloons – could all be a part of the fix if satellite and fiber optic solutions aren’t available or cost too much. It also urged minimizing “administrative burdens” where possible.

Signers included the Wisconsin Corn Growers Association, Wisconsin Independent Businesses, the Wisconsin Potato and Vegetable Growers Association and the Wisconsin Technology Council.

The TECNA letter cited two bills, H.R. 7160 and H.R. 7022, introduced with bipartisan support. The first bill would remove regulatory hurdles that date to the days dial-up modems and open the door for more competition. The second bill would speed deployment

of gigabit-tier networks through the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund. The Wisconsin Technology Council is a member of TECNA.

Both groups noted the COVID-19 crisis and how life in unconnected communities could get more difficult as the pandemic drags on.

Of course, the short-comes of rural broadband didn’t begin with COVID-19 nor will they end when the virus has passed from the scene. In states such as Wisconsin, the lack of competitive, high-speed connections means that some communities operate at a disadvantage when it comes to commerce, health care, education and more. That’s not good for the long-term economic health of the state.

High-altitude balloons may not be perched 12 miles above the Chequamegon National Forest tomorrow, but some of the bills under consideration could make it easier to serve rural broadband needs in creative ways. Too bad it took a pandemic to get us to that point.

Officer Westberg also reports she also searched a nightstand which contained Schick's paperwork from the Rusk County Courthouse, with his name on it, and found the following items: A blue grinder with green residue, which was later field tested using a Nark II field test kit, which yielded a positive result for the presence of THC, a gem baggie containing a white residue which weighed approximately 1 gram. Officer Westberg reports Officer Damrell of the same department, later field tested the substance using a Nark II field test kit and received a positive result for the presence of methamphetamine, a glass pipe with white residue which Officer Westberg later field tested using a Nark II field test kit, and received a positive result for the presence of methamphetamine.

If convicted for possession of methamphetamine, Hirsch may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than three years and six months or both.

If convicted for possession of methamphetamine, repeater, and second subsequent offense, Schick may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than three years and six months or both. For possession of THC he may be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than six months or both. For possession of drug paraphernalia, he may be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned not more than 30 days or both.

Both of their hearings are scheduled for August 13, 2020.

James R. Taylor, 36, of Colfax, has been charged with battery to a law enforcement officer, and resisting an officer.

Officer Prinsen, with the City of Rice Lake Police Department, reports on July 15, 2020, at approximately 10:35 p.m., he received information from Barron County Dispatch of a male subject at a gas station in Rice Lake, who was shirtless and had blood all over his body. The male subject reportedly asked for help.

Officer Prinsen reports he arrived at the gas station a short time later and met with a store-worker, who stated the male subject had since left the store and started walking on Tainter Avenue.

Officer Prinsen reports he began patrolling in the area in search of the male subject. At approximately 10:58 p.m., Officer Prinsen reports he observed a shirtless male walking. Officer Prinsen reports he thereafter attempted to make contact with the male subject, at which point the male subject began running away.

Officer Prinsen reports he shortly thereafter observed the male subject to be lying behind a bush, in a yard. Officer Prinsen reports he exited his patrol vehicle and directed the male subject to stand up and show his hands. After making multiple commands, Officer Prinsen reports the male subject stood up and verbally identified

himself as Taylor. Officer Prinsen reports he recognized the male subject from past law enforcement contacts as Taylor.

Taylor reportedly was clenching his fists and walking towards Officer Prinsen, despite being directed to stop walking. Officer Prinsen reports he repeatedly warned Taylor to stop walking towards him. When these commands were ignored, Officer Prinsen reports he advised Taylor he would be tased if he did not stop. In response, Taylor reportedly yelled. "Tase me." Officer Prinsen reports he made contact with Taylor, placing his hands on Taylor's arms. When this contact was made, Prinsen reports Taylor started pulling away.

Taylor was eventually placed on his stomach, with his hands behind his back. At this time, Taylor reportedly began to attempt to roll onto his front and stand up. Officers reportedly advised Taylor to hold still so they could

assess the situation. Taylor ignored these commands, and then used his right leg, bending at the knee, to purposely kick Officer Foust, who had arrived to assist in taking Taylor into custody. Officer Foust reports Taylor used the heel of his right foot to strike her in the left side of her abdomen. Officer Foust reports Taylor kicked her in her abdomen at least twice. Officer Prinsen warned Taylor to stop kicking after he first struck Officer Foust, but he thereafter kicked Officer Foust again.

Taylor was taken into custody with the assistance of several officers.

If convicted for battery to a law enforcement officer, Taylor may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than six years or both. For resisting an officer, he may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than nine months or both. His preliminary hearing is scheduled for August 13, 2020.

Wisconsin River for the Good Times

Hello friends,
Some of the best adventures that I go on are the simplest. This week I camped on the Wisconsin River near Portage with Michelle Chiaro and my pups Ruby and Fire plus we had a new pal along and that is a baby duck named Murph. Murph literally wandered into our lives two weeks ago. I think he is a mallard and he/she is a super cool pet who loves attention and likes to eat sweet corn, chick feed, and spaghetti. Sometimes Murph sleeps with me and he/she loves to cuddle.

Tuesday, August 4th
High 73, low 51
Here was the plan. I was going to launch my 18.6 War Eagle at Portage and we were going to head to where a whole bunch of us held my stepson Joey Dushek’s bachelor party a year ago. Joey’s shingding was on a sand bar with a deep water drop off and there was a channel on another edge that held some dandy northern pike and musky.

Some bad luck came our way twice. First, we got the boat stuck in some sand and my rig was very full. Michelle and I had to do some gut wrenching to push the War Eagle out of our predicament. When we got to our destination time and current had changed it so that it was underwater and the fishing holes were very filled in with sand.

We headed north to a different sandbar/island and began the task of building a comfortable camp and the mood was excellent as we had about 40 hours to live in paradise.

A brief description of this area would be that for being so close to civilization there are very few people on the river, especially on week days. The shallow water and ever-changing layout to the channel can wreak havoc on man and machine and that really keeps the general population out.

So it is night time, we fished from shore, had a fire, another stepson of mine, Travis Dushek came with his girlfriend Liv Dahlke for a visit and Michelle caught 3 walleye to my zero. Travis runs a mud mo-

tor, and is 1000 percent addicted to the outdoors. It was very late when we quit looking at the stars and campfire.
Wednesday, August 5th
High 75, low 53
Here is a little side note on my buddy Murph. We do not want him getting eaten by a big fish or an eagle and thus we have to be very careful because he can run and swim extremely fast. This perhaps 1/3 grown duckling has both Fire and Ruby in love with it and at home and here at camp one of the two is always guarding him.

This morning Michelle and I were very lazy which is what trips like this are all about. We fished from shore, ate a great meal, and at noon decided it was happy hour which meant it was ok to have a very tasty malt beverage.

This afternoon and until dark we explored by boat and fished the entire time. Michelle had a smile from ear to ear as she has now caught 7 walleyes to my zero. I had two big fish cut my line and I must admit that this section of the Wisconsin is simply amazing. The views, the wildlife, and freedom to camp on the numerous sandbars is my kind of getaway.

We had to head to camp before dark because we ran out of bait and our buddy Murph was talking like he does when he is tired or hungry. I took an ear of homegrown sweet corn and cut the kernels off. Murph has to dunk each kernel in the water before he eats it and life on the river is great.

Almost everything we ate on this trip came from this way of life, homegrown taters, green beans, sweet corn, eggs, and beef, and we started out the adventure with venison steak.

Naturally when after another big night we were headed up river the next morning back to the landing, I hit something with my prop and it now has a new shape. This brings me back to my earlier point of why this area is quite desolate even though it is very close to civilization.

High School Fall Sports Undergo Changes

The WIAA and HON continue to look for a safe way to hold High School sports this fall amid current health concerns. The WIAA Board of Control will be meeting this Friday, August 14, to discuss the need for further changes as they react to new information and State and Federal mandates. Their decision will come following the news on Monday, that the Big Ten will be moving their football sea-

son to the spring, something that some State High School Conferences have already done. This would cause the need to adjust current spring sports schedules, affecting sports who missed their full seasons this past spring. As of now, Cumberland Boys and Girls Cross Country and Girls Golf are set to start next Monday, while Football, Boys Soccer and Volleyball are slated to start Monday, September 7. Ac-

cording to Athletic Director Lorne Majewski, the first games for Volleyball and Boys Soccer may take place on September 15 and Football on September 23, but most HON schools aren’t scheduling games until September 25. “Last week the HON Athletic Directors made the decision that our schools will only be competing against HON opponents in all sports. The Middle

Border is doing the same thing. Schedules are being adjusted and/or created this week so we can get those out to the teams. We are trying to be flexible in adjusting to the Virus impact on our area. We’ll continue to move forward in our decision making until the WIAA or State tells us otherwise,” Majewski added.

Small schools admire multiple sport athletes. It is how their athletic programs exist as numbers play an important part of their success. Jeb Burke, from the Class of 1991, certainly falls into that multiple sport role. In the fall, he could be found on the football field, where he was a starting running back and outside linebacker. On offense, his quickness and pass catching ability made him a dual threat as a runner and pass receiver. He would twice be named as a First Team All-Conference linebacker, as a solid tackler and tough pass defender as well as First Team All-Conference punter. He was named team MVP as a senior. Winter sent him to the basketball court, where he would also gain First Team All-Conference status and team MVP honors. His Coach, Bert Skinner, would say about Jeb, “He had a dynamic personality and great athletic ability. On many occasions he would out rebound much taller opponents with his outstanding vertical jump. He had a contagious laugh and was a joy to coach.” His versatility on the court was evident in the 1990-1991 HON final statistics, which found Burke 5th in Conference scoring, 4th in rebounding, and 7th in assists. Playing at 5’!! to 6’0 tall, his tremendous leaping ability made him a threat inside and out as well as one of the leagues best defenders. In the spring, Burke was a four-year letter winner in track and would go on to set the School Record in the 400-meter run with a time of 51.7. Still standing today, he would be a Conference Champion and team MVP

in a third high school sport. During the summer, Burke would join the baseball team and play some Legion baseball, where his speed was also very present. He was talented enough in the sport to participate in a Minnesota Twins tryout at the Metrodome and be asked to come back for a second day to participate in a game in front of scouts. Five of his summers also involved working for the City’s Summer Recreation program, where he helped pass on his abilities and love of sport to the participating youth. Burke said, “I really enjoyed my involvement in the program and having the opportunity to positively impact kids. It guided me into working with kids ever since. My last year the parents presented me with a “Best T-ball Coach Plaque” which I still cherish today. Of his time in Cumberland, Burke said, “The community involvement always left me feeling very supported in sports and school. I’m very proud of calling Cumberland my home and telling people about it.” He added, “I appreciated my teammates and coaches and maintain many of those friendships to this day.” Today, Burke lives in Edina, Minnesota with his wife Laura and three children, where he has worked for TCF Bank the past twenty-five years. He adds, “I enjoy participating in my kids various sport activities and coaching any chance I get.” They certainly have a good teacher. Congratulations to Jeb Burke, a very deserving upcoming inductee into the Cumberland Athletic Hall of Fame.

“The Word”

“The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart... Rom. 10: 8

In the beginning was the ‘word’, the word was with God, ‘the Word was God!!’ ‘The Word’ is a powerful thing in the world and in our lives. I have always loved the way John identifies Jesus as the ‘living Word of God’. In Romans 10, Paul reminds the believers in Rome of these words from the ancient Torah. Rom. 10: 6-8 are from Deuteronomy 30: 12-14. Paul was in anguish that his Jewish brothers and sisters were rejecting the reality of Jesus, the ‘living word’. There was dissention between the Jews and the Gentiles, and Paul wanted them to know that God’s salvation was not just a promise to the Jews, but that salvation through Christ was for both. In just these ten verses Paul references the OT seven times. He knew these ancient words by heart, and he was eloquent in using them so his Jewish readers would come to believe the truth of Jesus Christ.

He uses the words of Is. 28:16 to tell them *“Anyone who believes in him will never be put to shame.”* And, *“Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved,”* are the prophetic words from Joel 2:32. Jesus wasn’t just some ‘new phenomenon’ that came on to the scene to do away with the covenantal promises of Abraham. Jesus was with God in the beginning, and was the cornerstone of God’s plan of salvation for the world. The Gentiles didn’t have to become Jews in order to receive God’s blessing, and Jesus was always part of God’s plan of salvation, a part of the covenantal promise to the Jews. *“If you declare with your mouth, ‘Jesus is Lord,’ and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.”* (Rom. 10:9) Only by the Holy Spirit can we declare the truth of Christ with our mouths, and by the same power we are able to believe the reality of Jesus’ resurrection and his identity as the incarnate Son of God. Only by holding on to this promise through faith will we find hope and peace in spite of our present reality. God’s Peace

Ordinance 747

An Ordinance Amending Municipal Code 12.03 Intoxicating Liquor and Fermented Malt Beverages

The Common Council of the City of Cumberland does or-dain as follows:

12.03 INTOXICATING LIQUOR AND FERMENTED MALT BEVERAGES

(1) STATE STATUTES ADOPTED. (Am. #562) The provisions of Wis. Stats. Ch. 125 relating to alcohol beverages, inclusive of any provisions thereof relating to the penalty to be imposed or the punishment for violation of such statutes are hereby adopted and made a part of this chapter by reference. A violation of any such provision shall constitute a violation of this chapter.

(2) LICENSE FEES.

- Fermented Malt Beverages. See § 12.02(8).
- Intoxicating Liquor. See § 12.02(11).

(3) ELECTION TO PERMIT VOLUME LIQUOR SALES. The City elects to come under the provisions of Wis. Stats. § 125.51(3)(b).

(4) FINANCIAL CLAIMS TO BE PAID. No license shall be granted hereunder to any applicant who is delinquent in the payment of taxes or assessments or other claims of the City or for premises upon which taxes, assessments or other financial claims are delinquent.

(5) CONDITIONS OF LICENSE

(a) CONSENT TO INSPECTION. An applicant for a license hereunder thereby consents to the entry of police or other authorized representatives of the City at all reasonable hours for the purpose of inspection and search, and consents to the removal from the premises and the introduction into evidence in prosecutions for violation of this section, all things found therein in violation of this section or State law.

(b) PREMISE REQUIREMENTS. Class "A" beer and Class "A" liquor licenses shall only be issued for premises that have fermented malt beverages and/or alcohol contained in a separate lockable area. Such area will have the ability to complete the purchase from that area and exit the premise with out going thru any other retail area.

(6) CLOSING HOURS.

(a) No premise for which a Class "A" Fermented Malt Beverage license has been issued shall remain open for the sale of those beverages from 9:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m..

(b) If a retail Class B license, between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. on weekdays and between 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. On January 1, premises operating under a Class B license are not required to close. No package, container or bottle sales may be made after midnight.

(c) Hotels and restaurants, the principal business of which is the furnishing of food and lodging to patrons, bowling alleys, indoor horseshoe pitching facilities, curling clubs, golf courses and golf clubhouses may remain open for the conduct of their regular business, but no intoxicating liquors or fermented malt beverages shall be sold during prohibited hours. (Am. MSC '90)

Section Two. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage by the Common Council and publication as provided by law.

Ordinance 748

An Ordinance Amending Municipal Code 11.08 Garbage Collection and Disposal

The Common Council of the City of Cumberland does or-dain as follows:

Section One: 11.08 - GARBAGE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL is amended to read as follows:

(1) COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL RESTRICTED. No person, other than the City, its agents, employees or contractors, shall collect refuse and rubble, or interfere in any manner with any receptacle, except as hereinafter provided. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the owners from transporting their own refuse or rubble within the City limits to an improved dump or landfill, provided that no person who transports another's refuse or rubble, except one with whom the City has a contract for that purpose, shall be compensated therefor. Commercial or institutional establishments may transport their refuse or rubble by their employees incidental to such employment and without additional compensation for that purpose.

(2) DEFINITIONS.

(a) Refuse - Garbage, rubbish or both.

(b) Garbage - Refuse accumulations of animal, fruit or vegetable matter that attend the use and preparation of meat, fish, fowl, fruits or vegetables, and tin cans originally used for foodstuffs.

(c) Rubbish - All other refuse, crockery, bottles, tin cans, metal vessels, trimmings from lawns, trees, gardens, paste-board boxes and similar materials.

(d) Rubble - Wax, concrete, bricks and similar solid material, plaster or dirt.

(3) CONTAINERS REQUIRED. Any person in possession, charge of or control of any boarding house, restaurant, cafe, hotel, apartment, eating house, dwelling house, multi-family dwelling, court, commercial establishment, flat or owning or occupying any premises whatsoever, or having refuse within the City, shall provide or cause to be provided and at all times keep or cause to be kept suitable and sufficient standard containers for a deposit of refuse and rubble for said premises. The number of containers provided and the amount of regular service retained by occupants or owners of premises shall be sufficient to take care of the refuse and rubble normally produced or originating from or upon the premises during intervals between collections, without spillage, escapable odors, or otherwise creating a nuisance. All containers shall have the lid tightly closed. Containers shall be kept in a sanitary condition by owners or persons in possession thereof. Covers shall not be removed except for the purpose of placing refuse therein or removing refuse therefrom, or cleaning. Except at commercial or institutional premises and special haul service, no refuse shall be placed for collection unless in standard containers or in securely tied bundles. Rubbish placed outside of standard containers at commercial or institutional premises shall be placed in a standard bin or box approved by the City, and must meet the specifications of the health and fire ordinances of the City. Any such bin or box shall be easily opened for rubbish removal.

(4) GARBAGE TO BE ACCESSIBLE FOR REMOVAL. No refuse or rubble, container or bundle shall be placed or kept on or in any public street, alley, sidewalk, foot path, or any public place whatsoever, but shall be placed and kept on the premises in such manner as to be readily accessible for removal of contents therefrom. Refuse or rubble placed in standard containers shall not exceed a weight of 80 pounds, including the weight of the container.

(5) ROLL OFF CONTAINERS: Roll off containers for building projects and one-time cleaning will not be included in any contract. Any provider will be allowed to deliver and pickup roll off containers in the City provided the waste is disposed of at the incinerator or a landfill.

(6) CERTAIN ACTS PROHIBITED.

(a) No person shall deposit or use refuse for lot filling or leveling purposes.

(b) No person shall bury refuse at any place within the City, or keep, place or deposit refuse on any public or private grounds or premises whatsoever, except in containers or receptacles for collection upon premises owned, occupied or under the possession and control of such person, provided, however, that lawn and garden trimmings may be composted.

(c) No person shall create, cause, or add to any refuse accumulation not placed for regular or special haul, or allow any unwholesome odors or the attraction of insects or rodents to occur.

(d) No person shall burn any garbage, leather, rubber, plastic, green or wet vegetation or organic material, or burn any other substance producing smoke or odor problems within the City.

Section Two. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage by the Common Council and publication as provided by law.

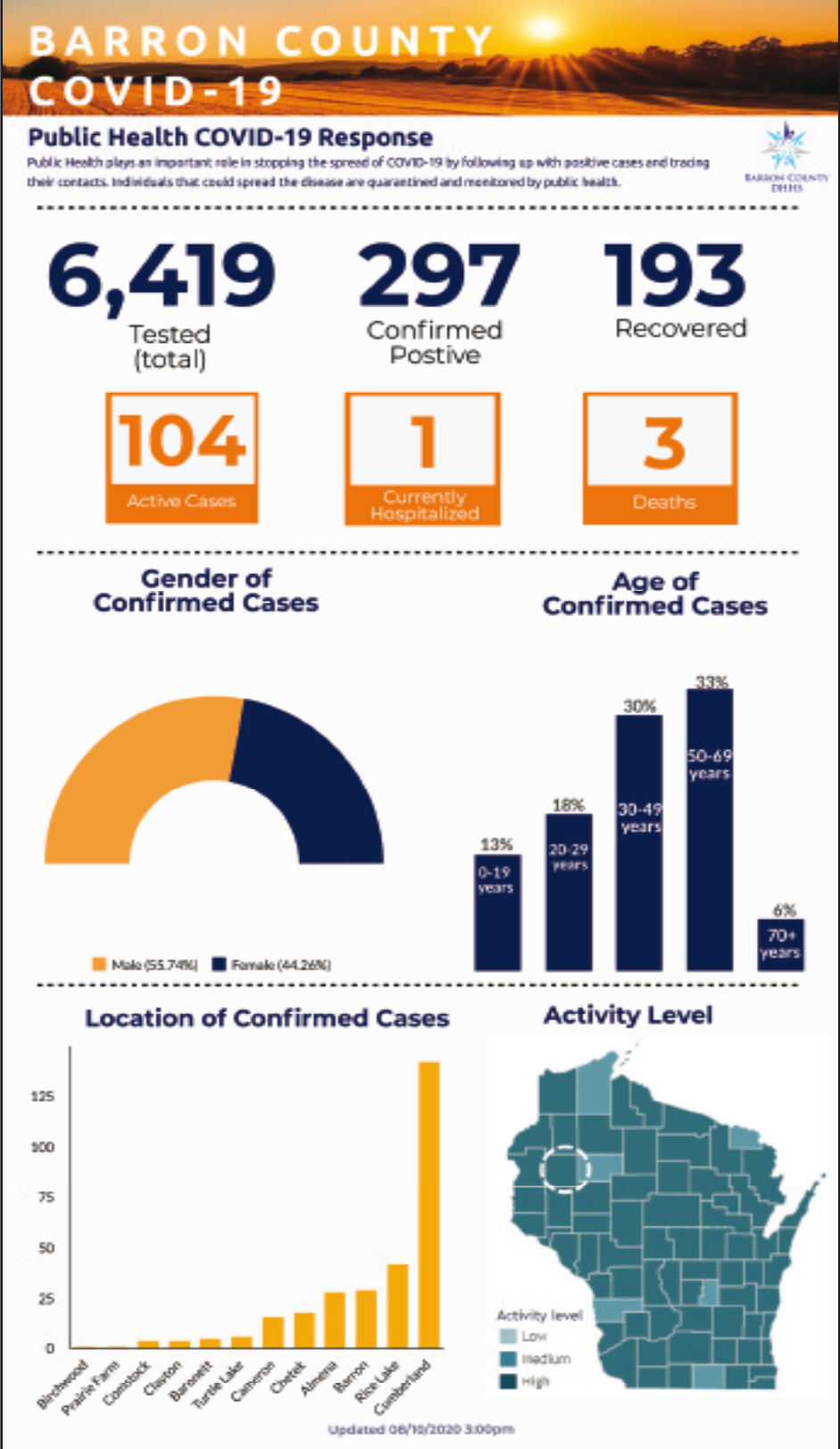
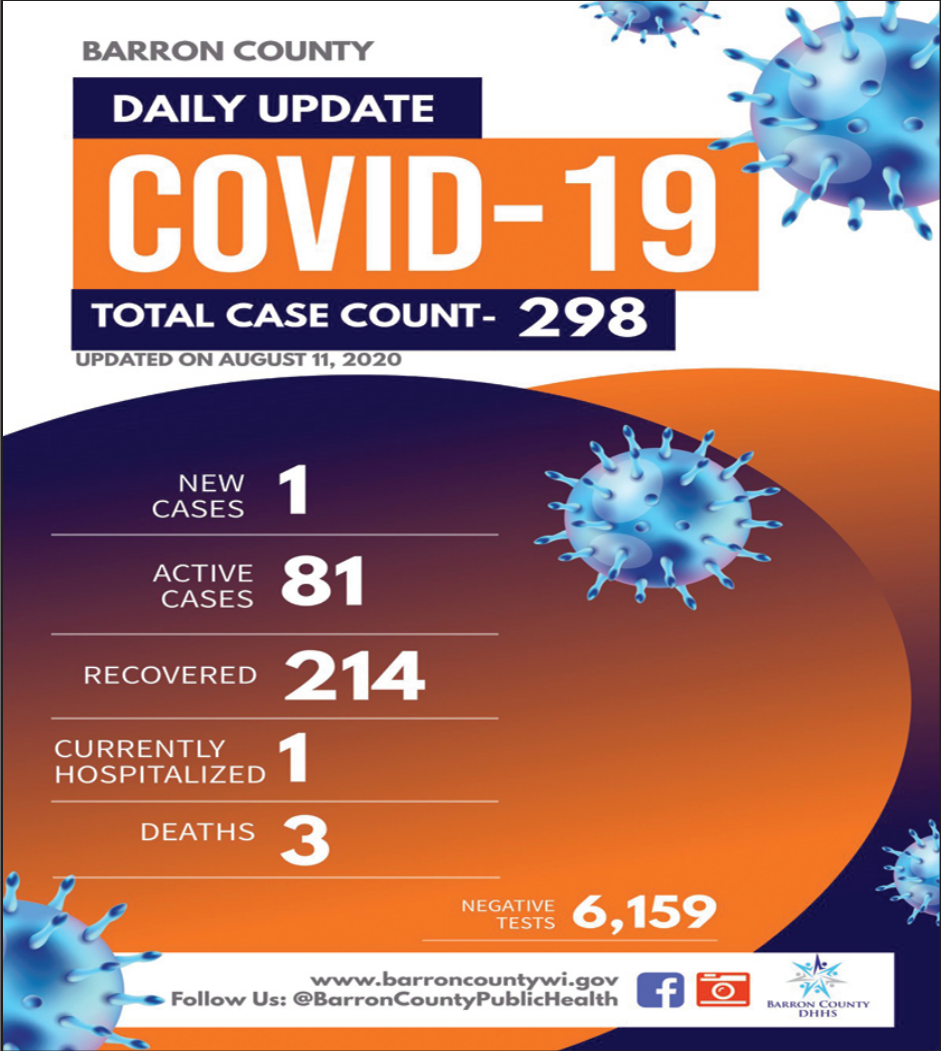
