



## Car and Foot Chase in Polk County Leads to Arrest

On Tuesday, April 19th, 2022, at about 6:00 PM, a Polk County Sheriff's Deputy attempted to stop a speeding motorist on US Highway 8. The speeding motorist was eastbound on Highway 8 and passed the deputy at a high rate of speed. The motorist failed to stop for the deputy and a pursuit was initiated.

The fleeing motorist turned southbound on Highway 46 and rapidly accelerated. The deputy lost sight of the vehicle and notified an Amery Police Officer. Upon passing the Amery Officer, the fleeing motorist eventually turned down a side street until it eventually began going northbound again on Highway 46. The deputy was able to deploy tire deflation spikes, but the fleeing motorist avoided them by driving through a yard. The fleeing motorist continued northbound on Highway 46. Another deputy observed the vehicle, the fleeing motorist, northbound on Highway 46 at Main Crossing Avenue still at a high rate of speed.

The fleeing motorist en-

tered the roundabout at Highway 46 and US Highway 8. The fleeing vehicle lost control and struck a van in the roundabout, causing the van to roll over. The fleeing motorist then exited his vehicle and began fleeing on foot.

The fleeing motorist was taken into custody after a short foot pursuit.

The van that was struck contained multiple passengers. None of the passengers received serious injuries. The passengers were transported to area hospitals by ambulance and later released. The Polk County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the following agencies for their assistance: Apple River Fire and First Responders, the Amery Ambulance Service, the Amery Police Department, and the St. Croix County Sheriff's Office.

The incident remains under investigation by the St. Croix County Sheriff's Office.

The fleeing motorist was identified as Anthony Wren, 45 years old, from St. Paul, MN.

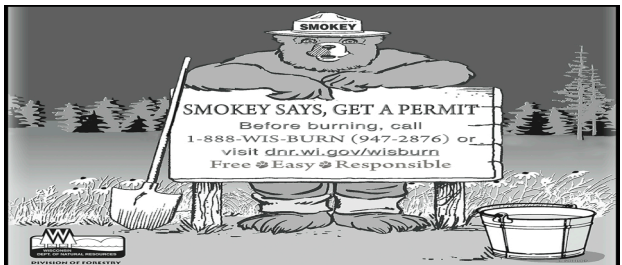

# A View from the Lake: Beaver Dam Lake Management District Update

As I am typing this article, I can see the lake from the office and it finally appears that the ice is going to be off the lake soon. After last year's early ice out in March, I was hoping for a repeat this spring.

The BDLMD commissioners continued to be busy during the winter months. This year's Eurasian Water Milfoil -EWM treatment plan was developed with input from the WDNR. The treatment permit application has been submitted, and treatment will take place approximately 3 to four weeks after ice out. This will depend on the growth rate of the EWM at the various treatment locations. The permit application and treatment plan are on the website at beaverdamlake.org.

A team of Lake District residents continued work on providing input for updating the Library Lake Management Plan. With the successful award of a grant to cover 75% of the cost of updating both the Library Lake Management plan and the City's Storm Water Management plan, Emmons & Oliver Resources, Inc. - EOR has been working on producing a final draft. This work is expected to be completed by mid May, 2022. After the Lake District team reviews the draft, a public comment meeting will be scheduled during the second quarter of 2022.

As covered in the Dec. 2021, A View from the Lake article, it is hard not to notice the SE Storm water pond work associated with Phase 1. This past week, Dave DeSantis finished up the final part of this phase when baffles were installed in three catch basins located along the City Parking lot. The baffles should allow sediment to drop out before the water heads to the SE storm water pond. Once the weather warms the small stage used for the pepper eating contest during Rutabaga and other events will be repositioned to its preconstruction location.

In my Dec. 2021 article, I reported that because the WDNR required that the Library Lake - Lake Management Plan needed to be updated by Sept. 1, 2021 rather than by the Nov. 1 2021 grant submittal date, a Lake Protection grant application was cancelled. However, on Nov. 1, 2021, three different grant applications not requiring an updated Library Lake Management Plan were submitted to help fund various Lake District projects. The Lake District was successful in being awarded all three grants totaling \$85,000. These grants will offset the cost to complete the previously mentioned Library Lake Management plan and the City's Storm Water Management plan, the planning costs for the SE pond Phase 2 and restoration costs for the area associated with the SE storm Water pond. All three grants were ranked by the WDNR scoring process as number one in their respective categories.

Over the winter the BDLMD, along with EOR, worked persistently to obtain a dredging permit to help in the continued restoration of Library Lake. I am ecstatic to report that the Lake Dis-

trict received a WDNR permit to remove the cattails and sediment along the south side. With the permit now in hand, plans are underway to create a bid package for the project. A "Fund the Library Lake Restoration" effort will soon be announced to raise the funds necessary to cover the restoration costs.

WDOT engineers continue engineering the design for the replacement of the Highway 63 box culvert going between the east and west sections of the lake. The current design envisions a "bridge-like" structure. The design will allow for continuous traffic flow during the construction. The current schedule is for a public information meeting to be held during the 3rd quarter of 2022. The construction of the replacement structure is currently scheduled for 2025.

I have had many inquiries as to why various names are used when referencing areas of Beaver Dam Lake. For years the lake had a few specific areas that were referred to by names such as Tiger Bay on the far NW end of the lake, Norwegian Bay on the far north end of the east part of Beaver Dam Lake, Library Lake, and Cemetery Bay known previously by a not so pleasant name when the waste water treatment plant was located where City Hall currently is located.

When it became necessary for the BDLMD to apply for permits to control EWM with herbicides, the WDNR pre-

ferred treating big areas or a whole lakes rather than spot treating small areas. Because Beaver Dam Lake has such a diverse topography with various bays and water depths, just referencing Beaver Dam Lake in the application wasn't acceptable. The BDLMD commissioners decided to assign names to specific areas of the lake, so when applying for a treatment permit for a given year, the various area names were used as applicable. Besides the previously mentioned areas, the bay north of Grove Street was named Rabbit Bay. From the narrow shallow sand dam like area on the north end of Rabbit Bay, the water extending north to the shallow area known as the Rice Beds is Williams Bay. The Rice Bed area is located between the Eagle Point boat launch and the point directly west (referred to as Jerome's point) but does not hold any wild rice but rather bulrushes. Williams Bay is like a big deep bowl with the deepest part around 93 feet deep. The lake area north of the Highway 48 Bridge is City Bay. City Bay is shallow and is where the saw mill was located. East Bay lies to the east of where the channel that comes from the Highway 63 box culvert intersects with north boundary of City Bay. East Lake is also like a big deep bowl reaching 80 feet plus. Transitioning from the East Lake area to

# Northwoods Notebook: A summer of art, drama and music in Cumberland

It wasn't so long ago — about two years — that this arts-crazy town took a break from plays, concerts and our annual festival that celebrates art, crafts and music at the City Beach. The pandemic descended upon The Island. City and the rest of the world, stifling much of life, including the arts.

They say the virus is still out there, but making fewer people sick, and life in Cumberland pretty much returned to normal last summer, and, again in the summer of 2022, you art lovers will have a number of events to put on your calendars, thanks to Enrichment Through Culture (ETC), the community arts council that operates out of the old former church that is the Cumberland Arts Center.

So, get out those smartphone calendars and make note of the ETC events for the summer, which, with any luck, will happen this year.

One of the first events is a funny musical written and directed by the creative retired DNR guy, board member of ETC and president of the library board, Dave Evenson. Dave is in rehearsal now for "Gilligan's Island City," a musical comedy about a tour bus getting stranded in our town. The performances will be at the

arts center June 9-12. Curtain is at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Friday and Saturday and 2 p.m. on Sunday, the 12th.

As a bonus for those of you who like musical comedies, the ETC players will also perform "Island City the Musical," also written by Evenson, after intermission on those play days.

During the day on Saturday, June 11, you'll want to visit the booths at the 30th annual Isle City Celebration of Arts and Crafts at Tourist Park. ETC's Lisa Barrows and Evenson are busily planning the day of visual art, crafts, musical performances and food from the folks at Cumberland United Methodist Church. If you don't like arts, crafts or music, you should come for the pie.

The first ETC event of summer is a June 7 concert on Library Lake, the downtown bay of Beaver Dam Lake. On the small Rutabaga Festival stage, Rice Lake country western singer Dawn Marie will kick off the summer series of performances sponsored by local businesses and organizations.

The concerts, known as Island City Music, are on Tuesdays from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. And they're free. The Barronett Civic Club brings

its food wagon to Cumberland so concert goers can get a bite to eat with their music. And the school district hauls its kayaks to the lake for those who want to paddle the lake during the performances.

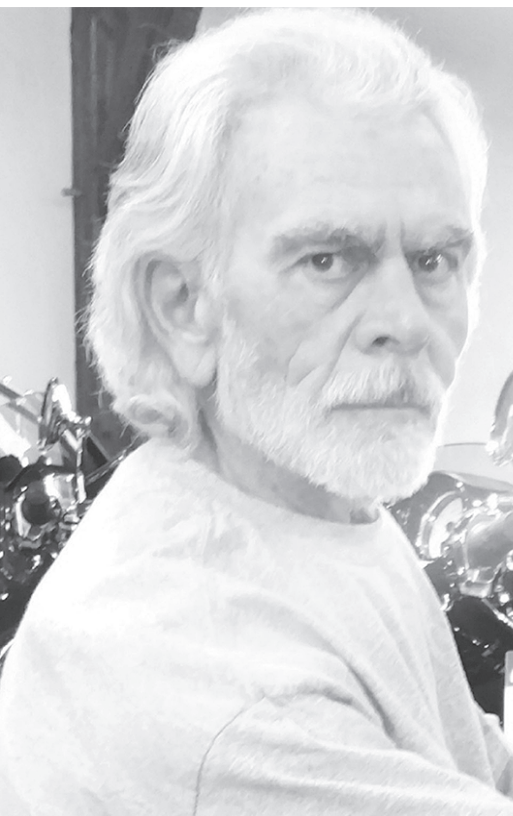

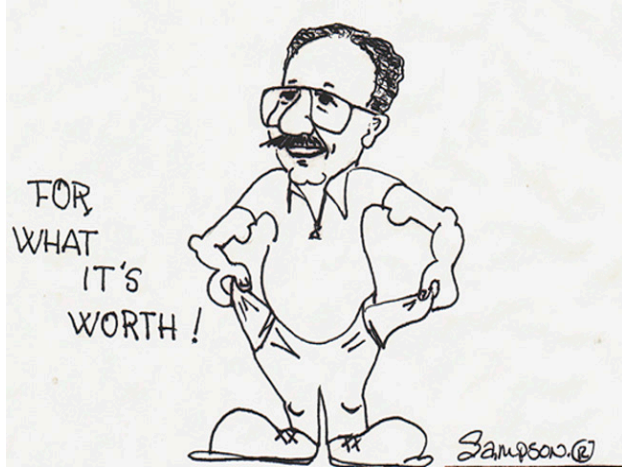

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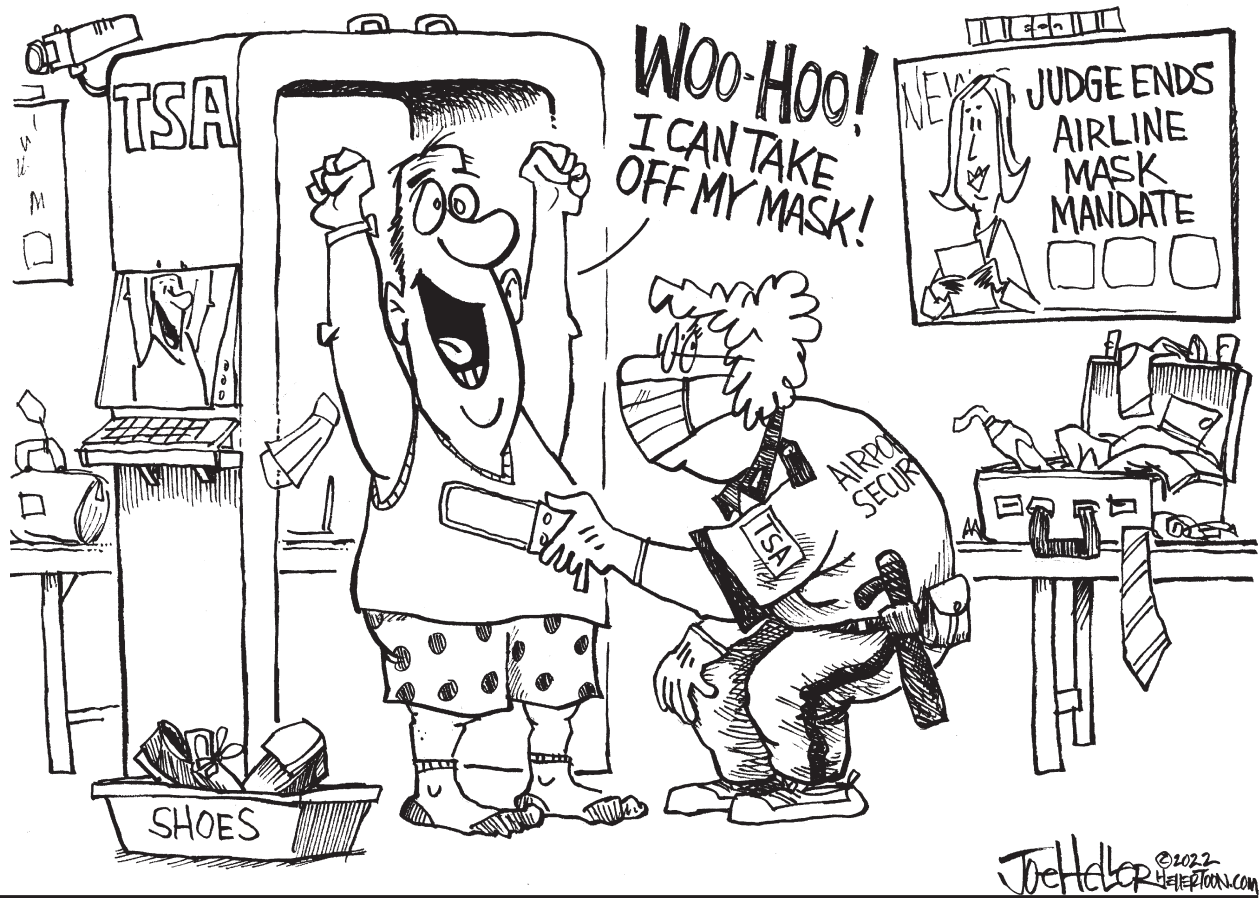

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## Inside Wisconsin

### “Reconciling federal R&D bills won’t be easy; can Wisconsin members help?”

MADISON, Wis. – Two years ago, when the bill was called “The Endless Frontier Act,” Wisconsin’s Mike Gallagher was among four bipartisan members of Congress who took the lead in pushing for deeper federal investment in science and technology to re-energize economic growth.

Today, the Green Bay Republican is not among the 90 or so members of the House of Representatives who will meet as a “conference committee” to iron out differences between successor bills, one from each chamber.

Instead, Wisconsin will be represented in coming weeks and months by Sen. Tammy Baldwin, a Democrat, and Reps. Tom Tiffany and Scott Fitzgerald, both Republicans.

What happened? It’s less about Gallagher losing interest in the notion of rejuvenated federal research and development investment, but more about conflicting Capitol Hill priorities brought on by war in Ukraine, chronic shortages of semiconductors, growing unease over China’s ambitions in the world, and the revival of disputes over trade, climate change and immigration.

Bills passed by the Senate and House still share enough common ground to be rolled into one, but it won’t be as

easy. The legislative clutter now surrounding what The Endless Frontier Act originally envisioned may make it difficult to clear a path to compromise.

Named for a post-World War II report that sparked an American surge in science, engineering and technology investment, The Endless Frontier Act called for boosting specific tech and manufacturing sectors – semiconductor chips included – over the course of 10 years.

The bill was inspired by a 2019 Brookings Institution report that concluded the nation’s economy would be stronger and more diversified if R&D spending was less concentrated on the East and West Coasts and more dispersed in emerging centers with domestic manufacturing potential.

That’s still the basic goal, but there are important differences. How (and if) those differences are resolved is vital to Wisconsin:

- The Senate bill would boost spending by \$250 billion over 10 years; the House \$400 billion.
- The Senate version would invest \$29 billion over five years in a new National Science Foundation directorate focused on artificial intelligence, semiconductors and

advanced computing, robotics, biotechnology, advanced materials and more. The House bill sets side \$13.3 billion over five years for a new NSF directorate, but lists climate change, environmental sustainability, and social and economic equality among its more general targets.

- Both bills would establish regional technology hubs (the Senate with \$10 billion; the House with \$7 billion) with the Senate calling for 10 such hubs and the House seven.

Easing the semiconductor shortage, made worse by the war in Ukraine and overall reliance on foreign sources, may be the glue that holds the package together. Such chips are used in everything from cars to telecommunications, from computers to healthcare, and from defense systems to clean energy production. The market is dominated by China and Taiwan.

Rifts between the Senate and House versions are most likely to emerge over items such as: retraining workers who lose jobs due to imports; trade tariffs; creating immigration visa paths for highly skilled workers; and the House emphasis on climate change, environmental resiliency and social goals versus the engineering-focused Senate approach.

If the negotiations fail and little more than semiconductor reinvestment is approved, that’s not a win for Wisconsin because there isn’t much of a chip industry here.

If the broader goal of shifting more R&D research and manufacturing to the Heartland is realized, Wisconsin and its neighbors win because of a strong foundation in most of the science, tech and manufacturing disciplines on the table.

The 2019 Brookings Institute report and its follow-ups listed two Wisconsin cities – Madison and Milwaukee – among its top 36 potential growth areas. Other Midwest cities were on the list, as well. That’s a big reason why Gallagher and his bipartisan colleagues sponsored The Endless Frontier Act a few months later.

Wisconsin’s three members of the conference committee can help steer the process in the right direction with some old-fashioned give-and-take. That’s not a specialty in Washington these days, but it’s well worth a try.

## Shots Fired over Dog Altercation

Larry W. Brown, 77, of Cumberland has been charged with disorderly conduct and Daniel A. Robb, 59, of Comstock, has been charged with substantial battery.

A deputy with the Barron County Sheriff's Department, reports on April 19, 2022, at approximately 3:00 pm, he received a dispatch from the Barron County Communications Center that Robb had called to report an altercation with his neighbor. Robb stated his neighbor had flagged him down about what Robb assumed was Robb's dogs getting loose. Robb advised the neighbor had kicked and hit him, and also that the neighbor may have fired a shot at him with a firearm. The deputy reports he responded to Robb's address, arriving at approximately 3:24 pm.

Upon arrival, the deputy reports he made contact with Robb, who stated his dogs got loose and disappeared from his property that morning at approximately 9:30 am to 10:00 am. Robb stated he looked for the dogs, but had pretty much given up on finding them. Robb stated he was driving past the neighboring property, located approximately one mile north of Robb's residence, when he heard Brown yelling at him as he waved him down to get Robb to stop.

Robb stated he stopped at the end of Brown's driveway and waited for him to walk down the driveway to where Robb had stopped his truck. Robb stated he got out of his truck when Brown got to his truck. Robb stated that Brown told him he had shot at Robb's dogs eight times, and threatened to shoot Robb and Robb's dogs. Robb stated this was the third time that he and Brown had words about Robb's dogs getting loose. Robb stated he had found one of the dogs, however the other dog was still missing.

In contrast, to what Robb reported when he called 911, Robb informed the deputy that Brown attempted to hit him after Robb got out of his truck, but did not hit or kick him. Robb stated that he responded by hitting Brown, and that "he's hurting pretty good I would guess," referring to Brown. Robb stated Brown got up after getting hit and came at Robb again, so Robb hit him a couple more times. Robb stated that Brown was bleeding pretty good when Robb left. Robb told the deputy that officers would find a pretty good pool of blood in the roadway in front of Brown's property. Robb stated that, as he was leaving, he heard a gunshot, which he believed was Brown shooting at him. Robb stated he decided to call 911 after he heard the gunshot.

The deputy reports that, after speaking with Robb, he went to 535 19 1/2 Avenue in an attempt to make contact with Brown. The deputy observed drops of blood at the front door of the residence and inside the screen door portion of the residence. The deputy followed a blood trail all the way back out to the front of the driveway where he located a larger pool of blood at the end of the driveway.

The deputy reports that, when he was unable to locate Brown, he contacted Cumberland Hospital and was advised by hospital staff that Brown was at the Cumberland emergency room. The deputy drove to Cumberland Hospital, where he made contact with Brown in the emergency room. The deputy observed traumatic injuries to Brown's face. The deputy reports that hospital staff had been suturing up Brown's lip, which was visibly red, swollen and bleeding. The deputy observed a bruise forming around Brown's left eye.

The deputy asked Brown

what happened. Brown stated that Robb's dogs were in his yard again, and admitted that he shot at the dogs eight times. Brown stated he fired rounds from his 40 caliber handgun, and that if he had his "ranger and his 223," both of the dogs would have been dead. The deputy asked Brown if he would have killed Robb's dogs had he had a different firearm with him. Brown stated, "yes, I would have killed them." Brown denied shooting at Robb as Robb was driving away.

Brown stated that Robb got out of his truck swinging. Brown stated Robb swung at him first. Brown stated he swung at Robb during the fight. Brown stated that Robb kicked him in the face three times during the fight. Brown stated that Robb also kicked him in the ribs. Brown stated he drove himself to the hospital when he began spurt-ing blood from his mouth. Brown did not consent to Robb hitting and kicking him in the face and ribs.

The deputy reports medical staff informed him that Brown had a broken tooth. X-rays and CT scans of Brown revealed he suffered a compound fracture to his left cheek bone as well as a compound fracture to the bones in his left orbital socket. Brown was scheduled for surgery the following morning, April 20, 2022.

If convicted for disorderly conduct, Brown may be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than 90 days or both.

If convicted for substantial battery, Robb may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than three years and six months or both.

and first responders provided lifesaving measures, however, the single operator/occupant of the motorcycle passed away.

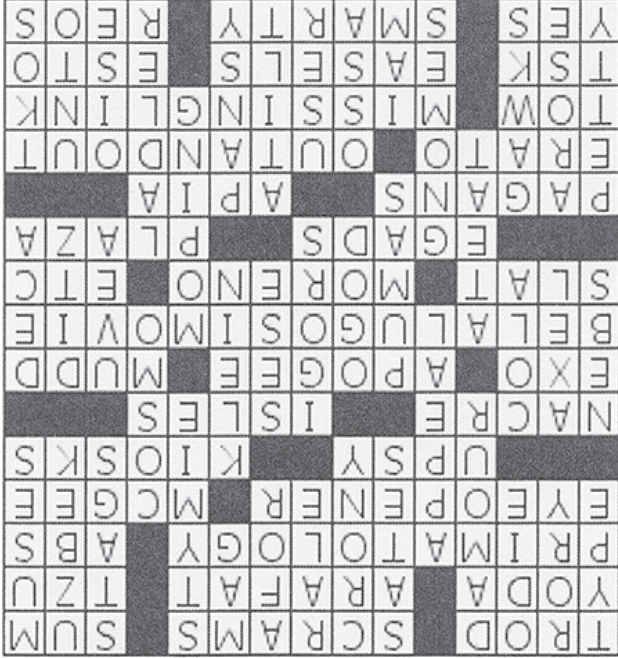

## Cumberland Golfers Get Match In At Barron

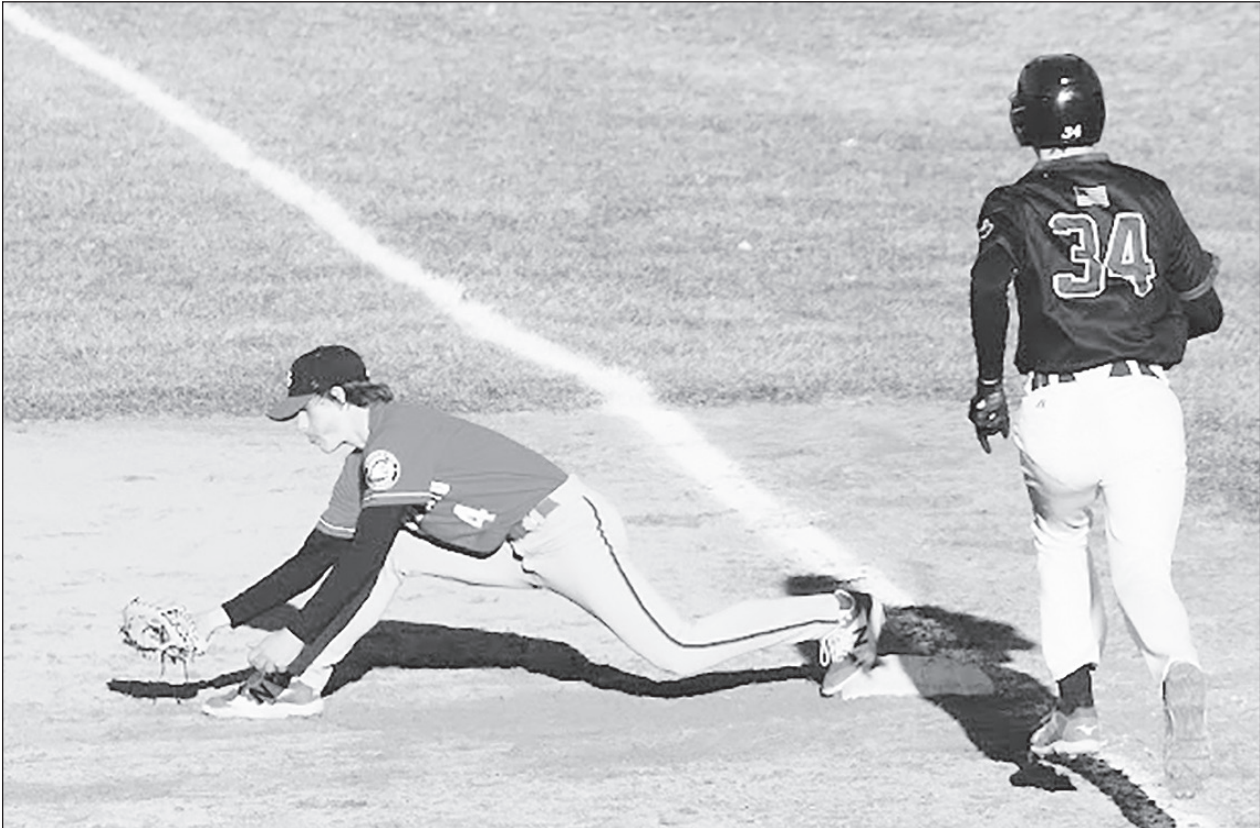

## Dodge County Youth Turkey Hunt

**Hello friends,**  
This week, I took part in Wisconsin's Youth Turkey Hunt! I spent about 48-hours with some very fun kids in Dodge County near Burnett on my good friends Rod Bensley and Wendy Vicks 212-acres of pure paradise.

**Friday, April 15th**  
**High 39, low 26**  
There would be three kids hunting the connected properties and all three of them were very into it. Today I met Conner Thiede who is 10 and would be taking part in his second turkey hunt and I would be his mentor. Eleven-year-old Carysn Thiede would be hunting with her dad Tyler and both Carysn and Conner attend Mayville Elementary School.

You may remember that I have written a couple of stories about Rod having terminal rectal cancer and in reality, Rod has outlived his diagnosis by about six months. Nothing slows this guy down and before he passes, he has made the decision with Wendy to build a new house on their property and Tyler is the ramrod running the show on the project.

Our other hunter would be 11-year-old Hunter Mass who is in 5th grade at Waupun Intermediate School. Hunter would be teamed up with his father Nick and this would be his second hunting season.

All three of these kids had the day off from school as it was Good Friday, and it was pretty obvious to see that they were into the hunt as we set out blinds and explored the property.

**Saturday, April 16th**  
**High 40, low 23**  
Tyler and Carysn would be on an adjacent property owned by Darwin Berndt who along with another neighbor Randy Henkyn had opened up their land as long as it was just for kids. This morning Conner and I were making the hike at 5:00 a.m. and it was cold as it seems to be every year in April these days.

As soon as we were in the blind, we could hear five toms gobbling from their roosts and it was game on. Reality struck when the toms flew down, we could not see them and headed in the opposite direction.

Tyler and Carysn had a bit of a crazy show from the get-go as a flock of turkey came from behind and a large tom got in range but blind/turkey positioning

did not allow a shot.  
Nick and Hunter did not see any birds but had some gobbling close by.  
My goal in these situations is to teach and to be fun. We had a pond close by and our world was non-stop duck, goose and deer action. One experience that Conner witnessed was a pair of wood duck that were peacefully swimming in the pond. A stray, drake wood duck flew into the pond, beat the bajeezs out of the drake that was with the hen and the hen kept hiding on him by going underwater.

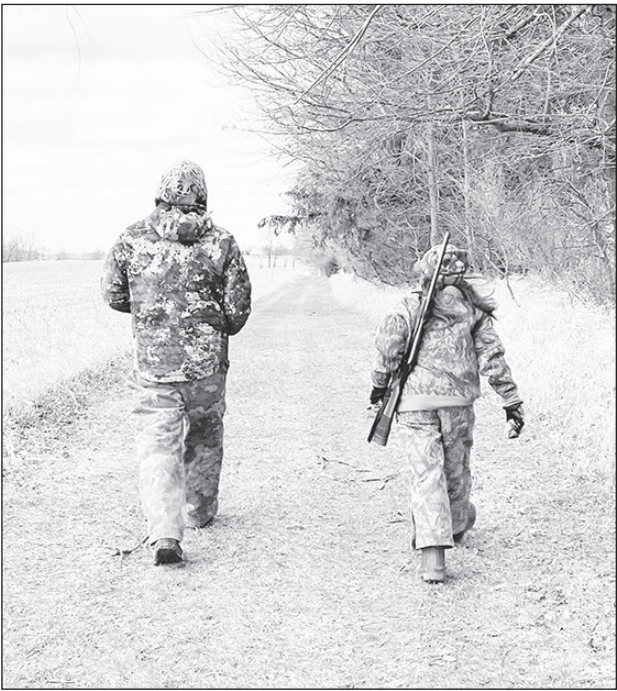
I had told Conner that when the toms we had heard from the roosts got bored with their hens we may be able get a visit. I had a blast with these kids and was really impressed with Hunter and Nick as they quietly sat in their blind for 9-hours without a heater.  
For myself there was lots to think about, several friends were hunting with kids, and we did some texting. It seems the 410 is becoming very popular and some birds were harvested with it.

One friend paid \$73.00 for 5 shells. With Conner we occupied ourselves with a deer, turkey and coyote spotting contest and watching the nonstop show called nature and of course I pretended I was a crazy man, and it seems I was rather convincing!

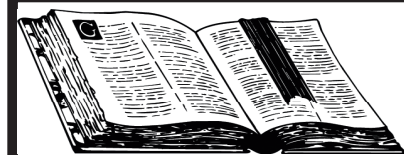

#### St. Paul Lutheran Church

There are many religions with different founders, prophets, and teachers going back thousands of years. But only one of them, Christianity, has a founder who professed to be the Messiah—the son of God—who provided irrefutable proof of who he was by conquering death through resurrection. Easter is the celebration of Christ’s resurrection. Christ is also the only person in history who was pre-announced starting a thousand years before he was born, with 18 different prophets from the Old Testament between the tenth and the fourth centuries BC predicting his coming birth, life, and death. Hundreds of years later, the details of Christ’s birth, life, betrayal, and manner of death validated those prophecies in surprisingly accurate and minute detail. One thousand years BC, David prophetically wrote about the crucifixion of Christ at a time crucifixion was unknown as a means of execution.

Christ came into the world as God’s son in order to die and pay the price for man’s sin. His sacrifice was the ultimate climax of his life, done for the benefit of all mankind—opening the way to eternal life in heaven for all who believe. Christ was unique in that he gave up his life as a sacrifice to fulfill why he came into the world. Christ set the highest standard of love possible, both in his teachings and in making the ultimate sacrifice—giving his life to rescue and save mankind. Then, to provide “seeing is believing” evidence, God brought Jesus back from being dead in a tomb to being alive—resurrected—so people would have living proof of who he was.

The New Testament provides accounts from multiple sources who witnessed Jesus firsthand after the resurrection. In fact, Jesus made ten separate appearances to his disciples between the resurrection and his ascension into Heaven, over a period of 40 days. Some of those appearances were to individual disciples, some were to several disciples at the same time, and once even to 500 at one time. Particularly noteworthy is that there were no accounts of witnesses who came forth and disputed these appearances or called it a “hoax.” Not a single one. Nor do we find any historical record of any witness accounts that were contradictory. About 1,000 times more manuscripts preserve the deeds and teaching of Jesus in the New Testament (about 25,000 total) than there are preserving other classical ancient works of historic figures who lived at approximately the same time, with the exception of Homer, whose “Iliad” is backed by 1,800 manuscripts. But that is still less than one-tenth the number of ancient manuscripts that back the authenticity of the New Testament.

Because of their experience with the resurrected Jesus, the apostles were in a unique position, knowing with certainty that Jesus was truly the Son of God. They had been present for the life, ministry, miracles, and death of Jesus. If the claims about Jesus were a lie, the apostles would have known it. That’s why their commitment to their testimony was so powerful and compelling. Additionally, the apostles’ willingness to die for their claims has tremendous evidential value, also confirming the truth of the resurrection. No one will die for something he invented or believes to be false.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. # Filled With Record Breakers; The 1969 Track Team

As the 2022 Track Team continues their fine season, it reminds you of some of strong teams of the past. Filled with outstanding individuals, a group that would fall into that category would be the 1969 Beavers.

The W.I.A.A. added Boys Track as an official sport in 1953, while Cumberland joined the rest of the HON in the spring of 1962. Rice Lake became the dominate force in early Conference competition, winning the title seven straight years from 1963 through 1969.

Cumberland would finish third in the Conference in 1969, but captured five individual titles. Senior Rich Capuzzi won both the 220 and 100-yard dash, Jerry Ritchie took the high jump, while both the 880 and mile relay teams took home HON titles.

Capuzzi was a multi-talented track performer who would set school records in the shot put with a throw of 47-8, the 100-yard dash with an outstanding time of 10.25, and as a member of the 880-yard relay team with a time of 1:34.9.

That relay team would go undefeated throughout the regular season with a foursome of Steve Ruppel, Steve Anderson, Pete Antonetti, and Capuzzi.

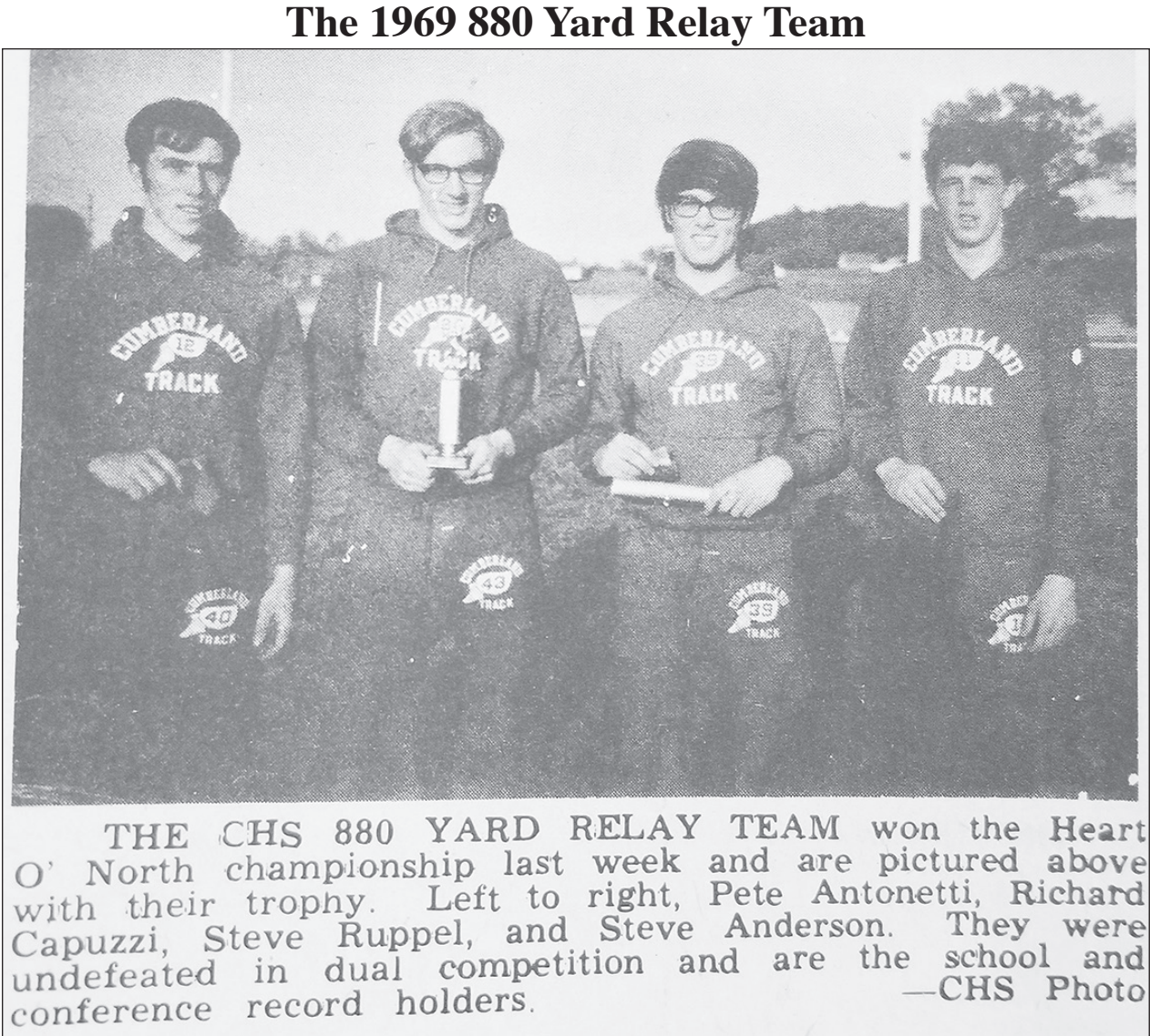
They would take second to Hudson at the River Falls Sectional and qualify for the State Meet in Monona Grove.

Ruppel and Anderson would also run on the mile relay team with Mark Erickson and Ritchie. They would set a new Conference record with a time of 3:34.6 and also qualify for the State Meet by finishing second at the Sectional.

Other School Records set that spring came from Mike Allen with a pole vault of 11 feet, as well as freshmen records by Ron Ruppel in the mile with a time of 2:10.6 and Ruppel, Robert Anderson, Mike Shaw and Bill Prell in the mile relay with a time of 4:34.

At the end of the season, Coach Jack Walsh named Steve Ruppel and Capuzzi Team Captains, while Capuzzi also gathered MVP honors. It had truly been an exciting spring for Cumberland track.

Anderson and Ritchie would return the following spring and helped lead another successful team, combining for over 60 career individual track medals before graduation. Anderson also had an extremely successful career in cross country, where he won numerous meets.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is ending Spring Thaw and Class II road restrictions for Zones 3, 4 and 5 on Monday, April 25, 2022 at 12:01 a.m. The restrictions remain in place for northern Wisconsin (Zones 1 and 2) until melt-water drains sufficiently.

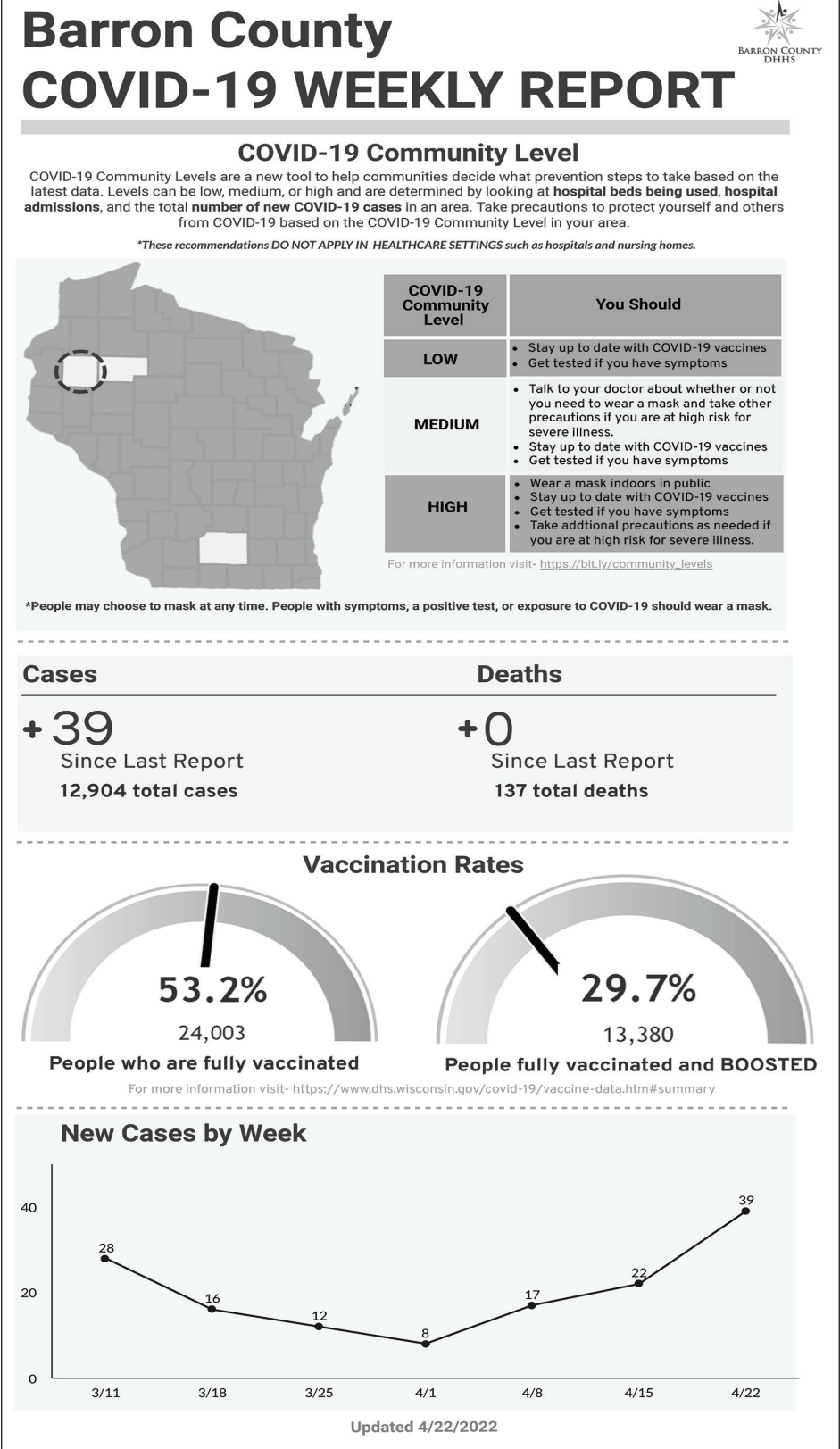
Class II roads include about 1,400 miles of state highways susceptible to damage from heavy trucks during the spring thaw period as frost leaves the

ground. More information regarding frozen road declarations, Class II roadways, and roadway postings can be found on WisDOT's website. Further information also can be found online for divisible load permits and non-divisible load permits.

County highways, town roads, city and village streets may also be posted or limited to legal load limits or less. Decisions to place or lift weight restrictions on those roads are up to local

units of government.

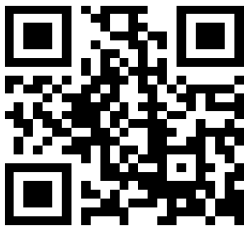


Attention Barron Electric Cooperative Members in Crystal Lake and Cumberland Townships
