City Close to Closure on Some Projects

The monthly Cumberland City Council Meeting took place on Tuesday, August 2, with Mayor Dan Shoemaker calling the group to order at 7:00 pm. With the approval of the agenda, the payment of monthly expenses for July, the approval of the minutes from the July meeting and with no public comments, the business of the city commenced.

The first portion of the meeting consisted of a series of payments on the Hospital Utility Extension, Robinson Street and 12th Avenue Water Main extension, and Carlone Street West projects and some change orders.

The first payment of \$123,190.13 went to DeSantis Excavating and Underground Construction for work completed and for stored materials located on site at the Hospital Utility Extension project plus retainage. The payment was for work completed through July 12 with assurances the project was making great strides and was ahead of schedule.

The Council then authorized a payment totaling \$5903.17 with a change order to A-1 Excavating of Bloomer for work on the Robinson Street and 12th Avenue Water Main initiative, one for change order #2 and the other a final pay-

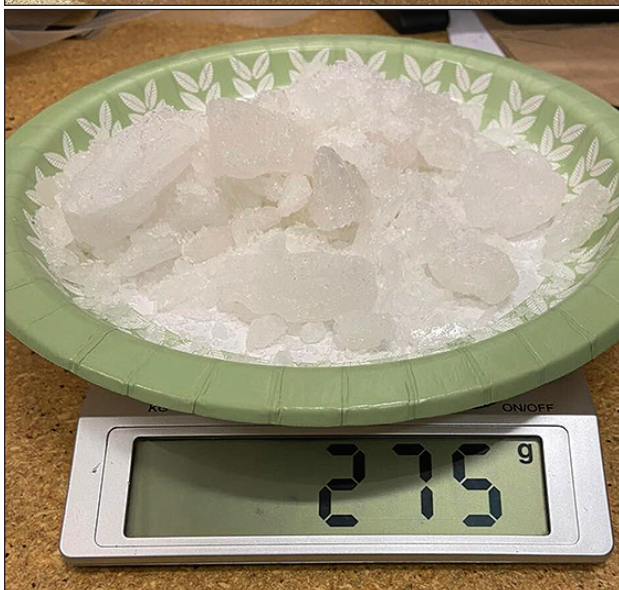
ment for the work done on the project.

The final authorization for payment by the Council went to DeSantis Excavating and Underground Utilities for work at the Carlone Street West project, noting the undertaking is close to an end. The \$216,960.32 payment included change order #5 as well as payment on their work for the enterprise completed from December 15, 2021 to June 13, 2022.

The Council then discussed a negotiated combined project with the Cumberland School District for Curb/Gutter and Sidewalk work in front of the Elementary School. This will be necessary as part of the Highway 63 overlay project scheduled for 2025. The costs for the necessary work will be split 75/25 with the school paying 75 percent of the work. The Council unanimously approved the agreement with the understanding the city will work to secure this work with the winning contractor, following bids.

Discussion then moved to a proposed Budget Preparation Guide (Resolution NO. 22-10), which would set guidelines, responsibilities and policies to help establish the yearly budget and establish policies involv-

News from City Hall

I presented the City Council's agenda for 2022 in early May. Most of the tasks centered on long-term development projects or fiscal controls. After 90 days, I am providing an update to the agenda items.

The largest, and most complicated, project continues to be TID (Tax Incremental District) 9. We are able to report substantial progress:

- The first two twin homes (four units) are under construction. Framing is well under way. The first purchase agreement is nearing completion.

- DNR Wetland permitting for additional twin homes on Carlone is close to resolution. This has been a long, difficult process. Obtaining the permits in early September will allow construction on the remaining Carlone sites.

- Construction of a 14 unit apartment on Carlone (east of 14th Street) is expected to begin in early Fall. The plan is for this to be the first of three units built over the next few years.

- The City anticipates a series of meetings with the DNR to revise the plan for the next phase of the development area. This collaboration allows the City to proceed more efficiently with further development of infrastructure, housing and commercial development.

- Promotion of commercial property along Highway 63.

Multiple Agencies Involved In High Speed Chase/ Search

On August 6, 2022, at approximately 12:08 am, Polk County notified Barron County of a vehicle pursuit traveling into Barron County on US 63. A Turtle Lake Officer attempted to use a

Cumberland and Turtle Lake officers, along with Deputies from the Barron County Sheriff's Department, attempted to locate the male suspect who fled on foot. However, the male was not located that evening.

Cumberland Police Department and Clear Lake Police Department searched the vehicle and located approximately 10 ounces of Methamphetamine, along with other drug paraphernalia.

The vehicle was towed and the female passenger was arrested for Possession with Intent to Deliver Methamphetamine (Party to a crime) and an outstanding felony warrant out of Minnesota. A person of interest was identified as the registered owner of the vehicle, Stephen H Desrosiers from Ashland, Wisconsin. Desrosiers was located the following day in Ashland and taken into custody for an active warrant and questioned regarding this incident. Clear Lake Police Department is actively investigating Desrosiers' involvement in the incident.

Clear Lake Police Department seized the Methamphetamine and the offender(s) will be referred for charges in Polk County.

Hunt Hill to Host Cakes at the Lake

Hunt Hill Audubon Sanctuary will be hosting Cakes at the Lake on Saturday, August 13, 2022. Breakfast is served from 8:00 am to 9:45 am and is followed by a free environmental program at 10:00 am. The topic of this Cakes at the Lake program is Spider Webs with Larry Weber.

Cakes at the Lake is an all-you-care-to-eat pancake breakfast which features buttermilk and specialty pancakes, sausage, fresh fruit, and beverages. Breakfast is \$7 for adults, \$3 for children ages 5 to 12, and free for children four and under. The environmental program is free. Registration is not required.

Following the breakfast, guests are encouraged to stay for the free environmental program sponsored by the Long Lake Preservation Association (www.longlakellpa.org). At this Cakes at the Lake, learn from naturalist and author, Larry Weber, about what he discovered about spiders and the webs that they make while writing his book, *Spiders of the Northwoods*. Chetek Man Arrested for a Warrant and Destroying Trailer Home

On Wednesday, August 3, at 8:31 am, the Barron County Sheriff's Department was dispatched to a residence north of New Auburn for a subject with a knife causing a disturbance and destroying a trailer home on the property.

Deputies arrived and made contact with the subject, Justin Curtis, 41, of Chetek. Justin was in possession of the knife and refused to drop the knife while speaking with deputies. Justin was advised to drop the knife and that he was under arrest for a warrant and possibly other charges for damage to the trailer. Justin continued to refuse to drop the knife and a less lethal bean bag was used and struck Chris in the leg. He continued to refuse to drop the knife and went back in the house.

The Barron/Rusk Emergency Response Team was paged to respond to the

scene to assist in taking Curtis into custody.

A short time later, Justin exited the trailer without the knife and was taken into custody without further incident. He was transported to Barron Hospital for treatment. Following the medical release, Justin was transported to the Barron County Jail and is being held on the probation warrant and awaiting possible charges by the DA. The Barron/Rusk Emergency Response Team was canceled prior to arrival at the scene.

Northwoods Notebook: Spanish music and Mexican food Aug. 16

Every summer, the diversity of our community increases with the arrival of Hispanic folks who come from Texas and other southern places to work at the Seneca Foods plant. We see people who look a little different from those of us who descended from Italian, Scandinavian and German parents, and they might speak Spanish, as well as English.

It's what you might call a cultural enrichment, says Dave Evenson, a board member of ETC, which is short for Enrichment Through Culture, Cumberland's arts council, which presents the outdoor concert series called Island City Music. One day last summer, Evenson heard some "mighty fine" guitar sounds under the street lights in front of his home.

It was coming from two young Hispanic fellows, one named Alex and the other named Alexis, who were here with their parents from Texas and Florida to work at the bean plant. Evenson emailed his fellow board members with a suggestion that we invite the two guys to do a concert on the Library Lake stage.

If you attended, you no doubt found your spirits

lifted by the Latin sounds coming from the 12-string guitars and rich voices of Alex Guillen and Alexis Camacho, both 17. We invited them to play and sing for us again this summer, at 6 p.m. Aug. 16 on the Library Lake stage in the final concert of our summer music series.

We also invited another singer of Spanish music — Salvadore Kruizinga, a Baldwin resident who sang a few songs at the arts center last winter before a concert by Ron Helstern's Generations group. Helstern, of Barronett, makes and repairs guitars, and had met Kruizinga when the Baldwin singer and siding installer came in for a guitar repair.

Helstern learned from his customer that he's the nephew of Carlos Santana, the famous guitarist whose band became popular in the sixties and seventies for its fusion of rock and roll and Latin jazz.

So we booked Salavadore, Alex and Alexis to play on Aug. 16 and asked Estaban Beltran, chef and owner of the Country Skillet Café with his wife, Lynette LeVeau, to serve some food that would be appropriate for the occasion. The couple bought the Our Place

Café and opened Country Skillet this summer with a menu that includes several Mexican dishes.

Beltran is from Mexico and promises some tasty south-of-the-border food at the Latin-flavored music event.

When the officers of the Cumberland Woman's Club heard about next Tuesday's cultural event, they decided to sponsor what will be a mini ethnic festival that celebrates the Hispanic culture that enriches Cumberland every year about this time.

Evenson says the night of Spanish music and Mexican food is in keeping with the spirit of ETC's mission.

"I like music, all kinds of music, and we're lucky to be able to hear so many different genres on Tuesday nights here in The Island City," Evenson said. "These talented young men are bringing us a taste of another culture. Our moniker, Enrichment Through Culture, says just that — we are enriched by enjoying another culture. Come on down, you'll enjoy the music whether or not you can understand the words."

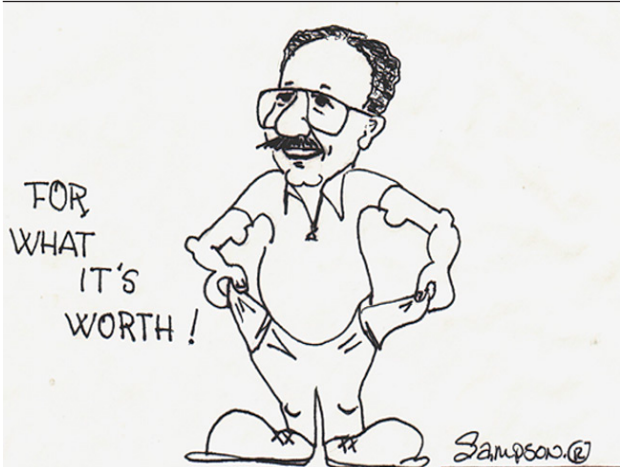

Inside Wisconsin

“Passage of ‘CHIPS and Science Act’ will help U.S., Wisconsin over time”

MADISON, Wis. – In an age of deep partisan divides, it was perhaps surprising that Congress passed the “CHIPS and Science Act” by wide margins – roughly two-to-one in the Senate and by more than 50 votes in the House of Representatives. It is less surprising, however, given the even deeper bipartisan concern over economic and strategic competition from China. The bill President Biden is expected to sign into law authorizes investing up to \$280 billion over five years – assuming Congress follows up with annual appropriations bills, which is the normal two-part process. Even if there are changes around the edges, the core direction is set: The federal government will invest a ton of money into reviving the semiconductor chip industry in the United States. The bill contains about \$54 billion in subsidies and tax credits for any global chip-maker that expands or sets up new operations in the United States, so long as they refrain from advanced tech investments in “countries of concern” such as China for at least a decade. It is a move aimed at countering the long slide in American development and produc-

tion of computer chips. The U.S. share of such chips, used in everything from cars to fighter planes to artificial intelligence, was 37% in 1990. It is about 12% today and could fall, given China’s ongoing investment, and barring a dramatic reversal. Bringing computer chip production back onshore is big part of what the CHIPS and Science Act aims to accomplish. What has gotten less attention so far is the massive reinvestment in other science and technology research and development. The combination makes the full bill the most significant investment in U.S. industrial policy in decades. The roots of the bill lie in the “Endless Frontier Act,” which was introduced in 2020 by bipartisan sponsors that included Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., Sen. Todd Young, R-Ind., Rep. Ro Khanna, D-Calif., and Rep. Mike Gallagher, R-Wis. That bill went through several name changes and versions along the way, maintaining the support of all original sponsors except for Gallagher. He voted against the CHIPS and Science Act in late July, saying it was not “laser-focused on the challenge we face from the Chinese Communist Party.”

That may be true from a national security perspective, and no one should want the CHIPS and Science Act to turn into a boondoggle. Carefully managed, however, the bill could represent one of the biggest revivals in national R&D since the dawn of the space age. The bill proposes to double spending on the National Science Foundation over time, to support regional technology “hubs” through a competitive process involving researchers and industry, to increase spending on the National Institute of Standards and Technology and its manufacturing-based programs, and to increase R&D through the Department of Energy. Like the original Endless Frontier Act, the spending in this portion of the bill would focus on advanced energy and industrial efficiency technologies; artificial intelligence and machine learning; advanced manufacturing; cybersecurity; biotechnology; high-performance computing; advanced materials; and quantum information science. Regional technology “hub” proposals are already being written in Wisconsin, with topic areas that touch on food, water, energy resiliency, manufacturing and generally

making better use of resources. In short, the topic areas envisioned by the CHIPS and Science Act are a pretty good match with Wisconsin’s traditional economic sectors. The hub proposals are being submitted through NSF, which has made it clear that proposals that fail to involve industry or to broadly address job creation may not make the cut. The process set into motion by the CHIPS and Science Act will take years to unfold, although the competition for semiconductor production will begin sooner than later. Major chip makers such as Intel, GlobalFoundries, Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing and Samsung have signaled they may apply. If so, Wisconsin could again find itself on a short list for landing a chipmaking facility. Over time, it will also be worth watching to see how the rest of the bill compels Wisconsin researchers, industry and others to work together.

The sergeant asked Frion if he had consumed any alcohol. Frion stated he drank some vodka. Frion stated he had a firearm, which he described as a .22 pistol, and that he had shot it outside. Frion stated he placed the firearm in his drawer in his bedroom.

The deputy reports he transported Frion to the Barron County Jail. At the jail, the deputy administered an Intoximeter test of Frion's breath alcohol concentration. The test result on the Intoximeter was .12.

The deputy reports he remained at the residence after Frion was arrested and transported to the jail. The deputy reports he spoke with the female in more detail about what happened when she returned to the residence. The female consented to a search of the residence. While walking up to the residence with the female, the deputy reports he observed a brown box that was labeled Heritage. The contents in the box were two different boxes of .22 long rifle ammunition. One box was CCI standard velocity .22 long rifle ammunition, and the other box was Subsonic HP .22 long rifle ammunition. Next to the box lying on the ground was a broken cell phone. The female stated the cell phone was hers. The deputy reports there were 44 shells in the CCI box with approximately six shells missing. There were 15 shells in the Subsonic HP box, with approximately 35 shells missing.

The female stated that she and Frion have been married for approximately 36 years. The female stated that Frion was upset throughout the day because she forgot to take out the garbage from the residence and put it at the side of the road. The female stated Frion drank a fair amount of alcohol that

evening and his behavior became worse as the night went on. The female stated Frion sent her a text message while he was outside. The female was sleeping and did not hear the text message go off. The female stated this upset Frion.

The female stated Frion walked from outside to where the bedroom window is located and knocked on the window. The female stated she peered out side the window and observed Frion standing in front of the window. The female stated Frion said something to the effect of "Now you can watch me kill myself." The female stated she closed the shades and, after doing so, heard two separate gun shots come from the location where Frion was standing outside.

The female stated that Frion then came inside the residence, pointed the gun at her and pulled the trigger. The female heard an audible click when Frion pulled the trigger. After pulling the trigger on the gun, the female stated Frion struck her in the face with an open fist and pushed her out of the residence causing her to fall. The female stated she was able to grab the keys to their vehicle prior to Frion pushing her out of the residence. The female stated she got into their vehicle and drove away at a high rate of speed until the deputy pulled her over.

The deputy reports that, when he entered the residence, he observed several liquor bottles that were on the counter top in the kitchen. The deputy located a Heritage Rough Rider .22 Caliber pistol revolver in a dresser drawer. The deputy reports there were three unfired .22 long rifle rounds and three spent .22 long rifle rounds still inside the cylinder of the firearm.

The deputy reports he reviewed the mandatory 72 Hour No Contact Victim Notification Prohibition with the female.

If convicted for first degree recklessly endangering safety, Frion may be fined not more than \$25,000 or imprisoned not more than 12 years and six months or both. For possession of a firearm while intoxicated, he may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than nine months or both. For pointing a firearm at another, he may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than nine months or both. For misdemeanor battery he may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than nine months or both. For criminal damage to property, he may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than nine months or both. For disorderly conduct and domestic abuse, he may be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than 90 days or both. His adjourned initial appearance was scheduled for August 5, 2022.

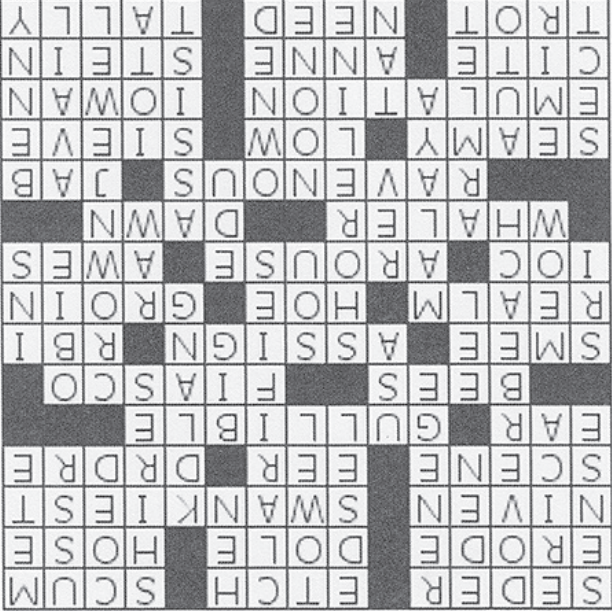
ing the transfer of funds between departments. A good discussion took place on the proposal and following slight alterations and a date change involving the timeline of the process, the Resolution was passed.

Sam Donatelle; 2022 Cumberland Athletic Hall of Fame Inductee

Joining the Cumberland Athletic Hall of Fame at the September 17 Banquet is 1972 graduate, Sam David Donatelle.

Donatelle was a successful three-sport athlete for the Beavers earning 11 letters during his high school career. This included four as a member of the basketball team, three in football and two each in golf and baseball. Additionally, he was an honor roll student, a class officer, and achieved the rank of Eagle Scout in 1970, as a member of the Cumberland Scouting program.

As a three-year member of the football team, he was a wide receiver and defensive back and part of a 6-1-1 team his senior season where Cumberland finished second in the HON. The Beavers only loss that fall was a disappointing 34-33 defeat at the hands of the Barron Bears, while among their biggest victories was a 18-9 win over the Rice Lake Warriors, a contest where Donatelle contributed five tackles. The Beavers featured a strong defense during the season, giving up only 12 points a game in Conference play.

In the spring, Donatelle played two years of golf and two of baseball. He would add, "In hindsight, I probably should have played baseball all four years." As a Senior, Donatelle led the team in RBI's and was the Beavers leading hitter with a .420 average on a team that finished 7-8-1.

It was in basketball, however, where he would leave his greatest mark. He was a three-year starter at the guard position, playing on two Conference Championship teams and three Sectional qualifiers. His junior season, the Beavers would take home the Sectional Championship with a 58-48 victory over Clear Lake and head to the State Tournament in Madison as the Associated Press 10th ranked team. A trip to State had also been accomplished by his father, Sam Donatelle Sr, In 1941.

Although the Beavers would drop contests to Wausau East and Appleton West in Madison, Donatelle played well averaging 9.5 points in the two games. Largely a team of underclassmen, this set up a big senior season for the Beavers.

Cumberland did not disappoint, sharing the HON Championship with Chetek, as both teams finished with identical 13 and 1 marks.

The team would go on to a final 18-2 overall record, dropping a 60-49 decision to Eau Claire Memorial in the Sectional Championship game, leaving the Beavers just short of a return trip to the State Tournament.

Donatelle averaged 13.2 points per game his final season and was named First Team All-Conference and Second Team All-Northwest. During the two-game Sectional run, Donatelle made 11 of 17 shots, while scoring 12 points per game. He was named the team's MVP both his junior and senior seasons, an award he won by leading the team in free throw percentage. He was also named the "Kiwanis Good Sportsmanship Winner" as a senior.

"I had the pleasure of playing basketball with a great group of players that included Mark Nelson, Steve King, Jerry Elmberg and Brad Curtis among others. Having teammates willing to make the same commitment was pivotal to our accomplishments. Our coaches Elmer Beran and Bob Davis were with us through our entire basketball career, which was also a key to our successful run" said Donatelle.

Donatelle added, "It was a tremendous experience to have played high school sports in Cumberland during the late 60s and early 70s. It was an era of great athletes, coaches and school spirit. The Cumberland community and student body came out in force to support our teams. The football bleachers and gym were filled to capacity and standing room only was not uncommon."

After graduating from the University of Eau Claire, Donatelle returned to his hometown where he married Julie Roemhild in 1979. They have three daughters and Sam worked first at the family Grocery Store and later at Ardisam before retiring in 2016. He played city league basketball for several years and coached a number of winters in the Cumberland basketball youth leagues. He stayed busy in several civic groups including the Jaycees and Kiwanis.

"Playing sports helped show me that hardwork and teamwork develop success," concluded Donatelle. On September 17, we will add that hardwork and teamwork can also put you into the Cumberland Athletic Hall of Fame.

An Outdoorsman's Journal

The Lure of the Bear

Hello friends,
This week's column is dedicated to Michelle Chiaro. Michelle was my bear hunting, winter camping, bow hunting, all forms of fishing, gardening and "Date Night" partner. Michelle was 50 and on June 15th, she passed away unexpectedly from Sepsis.

April thru August 3rd
This was going to be the biggest outdoor adventures year of my life. I received Montana tags to hunt deer and elk and have plans to do that hunt alone in late October. I also received a tag to hunt black bear in Zone C, which I have ran baits in since 2010 and this would be my first year where instead of taking a "new bear hunter" I would be the only tag holder and therefore would be the most active bait that I have-hunted when the season opens on September 7th.

Michelle and I were a complete team when it came to running baits either together or separate, depending on our schedules, and let me tell you Michelle loved running bear baits. I started the task in mid-April and in reality Michelle and I started last February when we could walk on the frozen marshes of the Meadow Valley Forest in northern Juneau County which is public land in Juneau, Wood, Jackson, and Juneau Counties.

Last fall I was on a duck hunt and camping trip when I had a unique experience. I had hiked from camp about a mile, shot a limit of woodies and kept hearing mallards and geese behind me. I went exploring and found duck/goose paradise and became very lost in knee to chest deep water. More importantly, I found lots of bear scat and trails, that is why we went exploring in February.

The standard procedure for our operation generally was to be at least a half mile hike from the gravel roads by foot and we use a hollow stump with a cover for the top and bottom which is just a 3-inch thick piece of a large log, and to keep everything out of that stump but black bear, I put logs that are anywhere from 5-8 feet in length tepee style over the top.

At first I ran three baits with total truck miles being 52 and foot miles about 3. On Memorial Day weekend Michelle and I camped and on the last morning, I ran the baits and she broke camp and cooked lunch.

At that point we had been running the baits about 40 days and one of the baits had never been hit. The new one was sporadic, but I had some very cool wolf and bobcat photos and bear were hitting it about once a week.

Bait and what is it? So far this year, I am getting all of my bait from BBD out of Abbotsford "Big Bear Down" and I am using cookies and granola that I purchase in 55-gallon drums.

June and early July is crazy time for black bear and baiters. The bear are in estrus and the sows hang around a good bait and the boars hang around a hot sow. I have one bait that is exceptional, and my gang has harvested several from it. This year I probably had four different boars working it and at least two very hot sows. The pairs would literally make a bedroom in trail camera range and my pics included lovers sleeping, eating, and loving.

On June 15th, just like that, my woman was taken from me with zero warning and I have to tell you I have about 20 bad episodes each and every day. On the bright side when Michelle first passed, every moment of every day was a horror story for me. What am I getting at? Running the baits and staying ultra-busy, never placing blame or having anger are what is keeping me from requiring a strait jacket.

Every day that I have been home, except one since June 15th, I stay outside way past dark and I work, putz and think.

Today was about day 105 on the baits. I have three out, all were hit. Zone C on the southern end has a problem and that is that the bear are almost always nocturnal once the season starts.

We shall see and I am betting that when the time comes, Michelle will be in that tree with me!

Antlerless Deer Harvest Authorizations Available August 15

On Monday, August 15, bonus antlerless harvest authorizations will be available online for purchase, starting at 10:00 am. Go through the "Go Wild License Portal" and at license sales locations.

Antlerless harvest opportunities vary by management zone as deer population levels vary throughout the state. This allows for greater harvest opportunities where deer are abundant and a more conservative harvest where deer are fewer in number.

Bonus antlerless harvest authorizations, formerly known as tags, are available for purchase in all deer management units for the 2022 season.

Bonus authorizations are sold at a rate of one person per day until sold out or until the 2022 deer hunting season ends. Bonus authorizations are \$12 each for Wisconsin residents, \$20 each for non-residents, and \$5 each for youth ages 11 and under.

You can go to the DNR website, www.dnr.wisconsin.gov, and see a list of units with bonus antlerless harvest authorizations available for purchase.

Each day, at 9:45 am, an online queuing system will be put in place to manage volume. At 10:00 am, all online users waiting on the Go Wild System will be randomly assigned a number and staged into a virtual queue.

Please not that there is no advantage for customers who enter the site before 9:45 am. Customers who enter the site after the ran-

domization at 10:00 am will be added to the end of the virtual queue in the order in which they arrive.

When accessing Go Wild, follow the prompts until you reach your personalized dashboard. To purchase a bonus antlerless harvest authorization, click the "Buy Licenses" button from the dashboard to open the sales catalog. From there, you will find "Bonus Antlerless Harvest Authorization" at the very top of the list. If you have not had the change to get your license in advance, you can purchase one after you select the bonus antlerless harvest authorization in Go Wild.

Hunters will need to know the deer management zone and unit in which they intend to hunt. They will also need to determine whether they will hunt on public or private land to make their purchase.

The first three days of bonus sales are management zone-specific, and the fourth day is open to all zones:

- Aug. 15th, 10 am-Forest Zones (Northern and Central).
- Aug. 16th, 10 am- Central Farmland Zone.
- Aug. 17th, 10 am- Southern Farmland Zone.
- Aug. 18th, 10 am- All zones available.

As a reminder, a minimum of one Farmland (Zone 2) antlerless harvest authorization is included with each deer hunting license purchase in units that offer them. Some units will offer more than one antlerless deer harvest authorization with each deer license.

way 63 is now proceeding.

- The City has initiated the process of revising TID 9 plan boundaries. The revision increases the funding available to expand required infrastructure (utilities, streets, sidewalks, curbs, gutters, etc.)
- The City continues to pursue grants for the improvement of Berdan Street. Improvement of Berdan is required for complete residential development of the TID area while providing better truck access to the industrial area. Three grants have been considered. Two grant applications have been submitted. The City is awaiting notification of the single grant still in play.

TID 9 remains a priority for two reasons . 1) Cumberland has a well documented need for additional housing. The path we are on leads to a mix of housing types – twin homes, single family and apartments, accommodating a range of needs and different price points.

2) Expand the tax base of the City - the single best method to influence property taxes.

Public Works is working with WisDOT on the 2025 Highway 63 restoration and bridge construction. This project is a challenge for the City. We are working to keep access to businesses open, likely increasing traffic through residential areas. Solutions for these two issues are mutually ex-

clusive, but we continue to communicate with WisDOT to determine the least disruptive plan.

A new issue has appeared on the agenda. Ardisam’s business growth led to exercising a purchase option with the Municipal Utility. Ardisam has offered flexibility in timing, but the Utility will need to relocate next year. The City plans to replace the outdated City Garage as a joint project with the the Utility. A joint project will provide the most cost effective solution for both facilities. The financial guidance we have received indicates this can be financed while keeping the debt level at the same level as the 2022 budget. Although it is a short time-frame, this project is being planned for completion in the Fall of 2023.

Other accomplishments:

- The Police Department hired three new officers, getting back to the targeted headcount.
- The City has established a budget calendar and process to provide improved consideration of the 2023 City budget.
- The City has created a large acquisition analysis model. This provides needed financial alternatives assessment. We appreciate the assistance provided by Ardisam and Erickson Excavating to improve the City’s analysis capabilities.

Cumberland Area Pioneers: Gust Risberg of McKinley

The February Advocate of 1940 described the death of Gust Risberg saying, “We have lost one of our finest pioneers, a man who worked always with the untiring spirit to help make this country a fine place for us to live.”

Gust Risberg was born in Piteo, Sweden in 1859 and at the age of 16 became a sailor. His work on schooners, which would take him on voyages through the North Sea and to the Mediterranean. He traveled many times to Italy and made it to the West Indies. It would take a month just to travel to England.

In 1885, he made his first trip to America. Liking what he saw, he returned to

Chicago in 1886 with only two cents to his name and some carpenter tools. Unable to speak English at the time, he found a Norwegian friend with whom he stayed upon his arrival.

He knew of another friend, Samuel Grenquist, who lived in McKinley, Wisconsin. Asking him for help, Grenquist borrowed \$12 from the Bank of Cumberland and sent it to Risberg. It cost him \$11 by train to make the trip as he soon joined his friend in this small town in Northern Wisconsin.

Risberg worked for room and board at the Grenquist home, first on a dam at the head of Sand Lake and then in the logging camps. He

saved money, sending it back to Sweden and eventually he was joined in the area by his brothers and a sister. They built a 22x28 log shanty for their first home.

His brothers, Jack, Israel, and Emil soon joined him in the logging business. Together they logged four 40’s the first year and continued their business for almost 30 years.

In November of 1886, Risberg married Anna Karlson Lansin. They would eventually have seven children and 14 grandchildren. One of their sons, George, would fall in love with baseball, playing and managing the McKinley team for 40 years. His wife, Anna

Eleanor Weaver Risberg would say of her husband, “He reads everything he can get his hands on about baseball. There isn’t anyone who lives for ball-playing like he does.”

Gust Risberg passed away on January 31, 1940. A true pioneer, during his 54 years in the McKinley area, he had cleared land, built roads, and helped construct the McKinley Piteo Church, where his funeral was held. The article upon his death said of the man, “He helped make a community that we are proud of today.” Gust Risberg was a true Cumberland pioneer.
