



News From City Hall

Major changes are taking place in City Hall. These include a more effective structure, enhanced procedures, and the recruitment of a professional administrator. The objective is still to provide the optimal return on tax collections and utility revenues.

An ordinance change was made in June to establish the position of City Administrator. This was the first step in delineating the policy-making role of elected officials and the implementation role of hired staff. We are looking for a balance of flexibility in public policy (elected officials with 2 year terms) versus stability in continuity of operations (hired staff with no fixed term). A by-product of the ordinance was moving the Utility Commission to Utility Committee. This provides better coordination of Public Works/Utility projects and a single debt plan for the City.

We began interviewing candidates for City Administrator the week of August 20. Our leading candidate withdrew after accepting another offer. We are now resuming the recruiting process.

Lori Nyhus, Cumberland Utility Office Manager, is assuming the role of City Treasurer. Lori is working to define the role within the City Administrator organization.

Improved processes are providing results. Commitment to construction of a new Utility shed was the result of a 15 month analysis. A variety of options were considered. These included a joint project with a City garage replacement, building construction types, and rent vs. build. This effort led to a budgeted cost of \$1.45 million as opposed to an earlier \$2.6 million proposal. The extensive evaluation produced a facility of appropriate size, specifications

and price while meeting an aggressive timeline. Admittedly, this was not a perfect process – perfection is a difficult benchmark. However, it was much improved. Lessons learned from this project will lead to an even better process in the future.

The City procurement plan has been updated to include guidelines for assessing needs, alternatives and financing options.

Completion of the City Financial Plan remains a priority. This is more accurately described as a debt plan. It will analyze and plan for large capital expenses. Projects being considered include:

- *Highway 63 restoration & bridge construction (2025)
- *Street (Pavement Management) Plan
- *Large street projects (e.g. Hines Lakeview Drive)
- *Street department equipment
- *Utility upgrades
- *City garage restoration/replacement

The plan will allow informed decisions determining acceptable debt and capital expenditures.

Public Works and the Utility are the major contributors to high-dollar projects. The multi-million dollar costs necessitate careful planning. As a result, the primary goal of the reorganization is to administer the City as a single, coordinated entity. We have made significant progress, beyond the described procedural improvements and debt planning. This year we have designated a single law firm and single accounting firm for City business, resulting in efficiencies and cost savings.

Change is difficult. The progress made would not be possible without the support of the Council, Utility Committee and City/Utility staff members.

New Baiting And Feeding Bans For Washburn, Barron, Rusk And Sawyer Counties Effective October 5

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was recently notified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) that a farm-raised deer on a deer farm in Washburn County tested positive for chronic wasting disease (CWD). This positive result is within 10 miles of the Barron, Rusk and Sawyer county borders, so new baiting and feeding bans will go into effect in Washburn, Barron, Rusk and Sawyer counties on Oct. 5, 2023.

State law requires that the DNR enact a three-year baiting and feeding ban in counties where CWD has been detected and a two-year ban in adjoining counties within 10 miles of a CWD detec-

tion.

Washburn will begin a three-year baiting and feeding ban on Oct. 5, 2023.

Barron, Rusk and Sawyer counties will all begin a two-year baiting and feeding ban on Oct. 5, 2023.

It is illegal to hunt over an area previously used for legal baiting and feeding until that area is completely free of bait or feed for 10 consecutive days.

Baiting or feeding deer encourages them to congregate unnaturally around a shared food source where infected deer can spread CWD through direct contact with

Ardisam Inc: "Its Step-by-Step Growth Since 1960"

The March 24, 1960 Advocate, included a small article on a new business beginning in the city. The headline read, "Ardisam, New Local Corporation Formed." Little could one have imagined that 63 years later, the business that employed as few as 10 people in 1972, would be the success story it is today.

The idea for the new operation was that of three men, Richard Ruppel, Sam Ranallo, and Arnold Isham. They formed a Corporation and announced their plans to manufacture and sell hand, electric, and gas-engine powered ice augers and post-hole diggers. The name Ardisam came from combining the first names of the three men, while they announced their goal was to start production in a few weeks.

The men were successful in their current occupations, but were ready to take on this new venture with great vigor. Isham, named the first Company President, soon

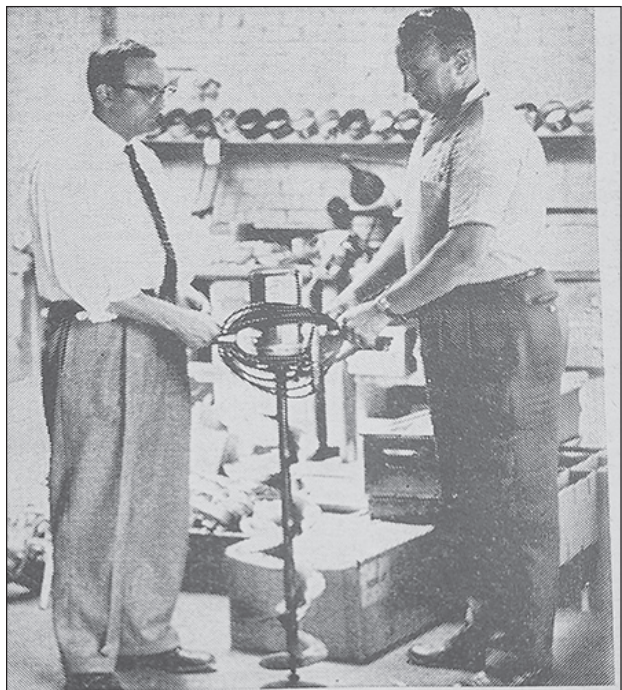
posted in the Advocate he was "Quitting his business, "Arnie's Repair Center," to devote full time to Ardisam, Inc." Ruppel, meanwhile, had initially practiced law with Dan D'Amico before establishing his own private practice in town.

The Company took a temporary home in the basement portion of Bill's Auto Repair Shop and soon put five hundred shares of stock on sale at \$10 each.

One of their first production models was an Electric Quick Digger, which the men gave as a gift to the city for their municipal workers. Presented to Mayor Skinner by Mr. Ruppel, the men announced that production was going well and a number of units had already been shipped to retailers and further orders were being received.

By the end of the first year, Albert and Bernard Sellent had been named to a Board of Directors, while the sales

volume had reached the \$50,000 mark. Products were being shipped to all of the original 48 states and parts of Canada. The word Cont'd on page 3

On Saturday September 30th, the Cumberland High School Marching Band traveled to Irondale High School in New Brighton, MN to participate in its second adjudicated competition of the fall season. There were 10 bands that performed throughout the evening and 4 competitive bands in Cumberland's class (class AA). For this show in the Minnesota circuit, Cumberland competed a class higher than they do in Wisconsin and was on the field with bands two to three times their size. Despite this, Cumberland put up a very respectable score and

gained over 4 points since their last competition. They took home 4th place honors in their class. If Cumberland had been competing in class A (schools of similar size to Cumberland), they would have earned 1st place in a class of 7 bands.

Class AA breakdown was as follows (total points are on a 100 point scale):

4th place - Cumberland High School - 73.25

3rd place - Waseca High School - 75.55

2nd place - Farmington High School - 78.725

1st place - Lakeville South High School - 82.025

The Cumberland Marching Band will continue its season this weekend and will travel to Hudson High School to take part in that school's marching invitational on Saturday October 7th before finishing its season at the Wisconsin School Music Association State Championships at UW-Whitewater on Saturday October 14th, 2023. of the company was getting out as the men were attending trade shows across the Midwest.

Purchasing new hardware to help increase production, a milling machine, drill press, and turret lathe were acquired in 1961. With limited room, subcontracting of the auger assembly was given to Ray Foss, while certain proponent parts were given to Lombard's Machine Shop. By 1962, Ardisam launched their first gas powered earth auger, the Ardis Quick Digger.

Over time, ownership of the company began to change. First, Al Sellent bought out Sam Ranallo's third share of the corporation and in 1968 Dick Ruppel became the sole proprietor of the entity by buying out Isham and Sellent.

Looking for a new and bigger location for the company, Ruppel eventually announced construction of a new office and a 60 by 120-foot manufacturing plant north of the city. Located at the junction of Hwy 63 and H, the new building allowed for additional employees as the operation continued to expand.

The growth of the company was impressive. In 1983, Eskimo power augers were enhanced with quantum blade technology and the first and only ball bearing transmission on the market. In 1987, Ardisam entered into lawn and garden space with a gear driven rear-tine roto-tiller featuring a 5hp Briggs and Stratton engine. This created the need for an addition to the manufacturing facility on HWY 63 to accommodate new equipment and bolster manufacturing capabilities.

Richard Ruppel stayed as the solitary owner of the company until 1991, when sons Mark and Ron purchased the business from their father.

Continued diversification by the pair created the need for more room and two-years later the company purchased the old Stella Cheese building. This allowed Ardisam to install a state-of-the-art paint line. Meanwhile, their product line was creating interest and recognition nationally as well as in the state. First, Popular Mechanics recognized Ardisam's new battery powered electric riding lawn mower in 1994 with their Turf Star Award, while in 1996, Barron Electric named the company their Wisconsin Manufacturer of the Year.

Expansion has stayed a common theme into the 2020s, as the Ardisam name has become known throughout the United States and into Asia. It started with the purchase of the former American Tool Building in 2003 and continued in 2009 by acquiring the former Northern Pines facility. Finally, the Early Learning Center created additional office space in 2011, while in 2018 a location was added in Mendota Heights, Minnesota. Perhaps the biggest expansion, however, was the establishment of a Shanghai, China, Office in 2006.

New innovations have created three main Business Units, Lawn and Garden, Camping, Hunting and ATV, and Ice Fishing today. Cutting edge variations have continued from their Earthquake Mowers, to River Edge Tree Stands, to the ION ice auger,

which revolutionized the ice fishing industry.

Modernization was accompanied by a structural ownership change in 2015, when Claire and Marge Johnson became major stockholders, and again in 2020 when the Employee Stock Ownership Plan went into effect. Finally in 2022, Ardisams continued growth led to completion of a multi-million-state-of-the-art Headquarter and Technology Center in Cumberland's Industrial Park, allowing the consolidation of all their facilities.

Currently, Michael Furse works as the company's Chief Executive Officer & President with some 130 employees, who are responsible for the entire lifecycle of products, from concept, to designing, sourcing, manufacturing, quality control and customer service. The employees, as owners, take an extreme sense of pride in their daily work.

The dream of Dick Ruppel and that first Quick Digger, has grown into Eskimo and Ion brands, Barronett Blinds, Castle Pellet Stoves, Earthquake Groundbreaking Power Equipment, Gazelle Tents, Rivers Edge Tree Stands, Yardbird and an ever-changing line of products. Ardisam has developed into an International manufacturer of seasonal outdoor products sold throughout North America.

It all started in 1960 in a small metal fabricating shop in Cumberland, Wisconsin. There, a culture of hard work and innovation began and through the years, those that followed have stayed true to those values.

Northwoods Notebook: Who needs big-city nightlife? By Larry Werner

It was Sunday morning, and we were having breakfast at Louie's on the Lake with good friends who had come to visit for the weekend. In past years, Bob and his wife, Debbie, have come in summer, when we could spend time on the lake, perhaps attend an Island City Music concert and, if they came during one of the festival weeks, attend Fourth of July activities or roam the Rutabaga Festival grounds.

But their summer and ours were too busy for them to come in summer. So they came to Cumberland on a rainy fall weekend. At breakfast, before they returned to their home in the Cities, Bob said: "We sure did a lot this weekend."

In the big city, of course, there's always a lot to do – concerts, theater, sports events. But in a little lake town after the docks have been pulled ashore and the pontoons put back in storage, what do you do to entertain guests? That wasn't a problem in Cumberland, where you can attend a play or a concert any month of the year – and don't have to pay an arm and a leg for your fun.

Admittedly, we don't have the Vikings or Packers here. But that isn't necessarily a bad thing, given the way those teams have been stinking up the field lately.

Our friends arrived on Friday, when we started out with dinner at the Five O'Clock Club. We finished just in time to get to the Cumberland Arts Center for one of the wackiest plays ETC has ever presented – "The Fox

on the Fairway." The acting in this adult-humor farce was excellent, ranging from Emilie Springsteen's portrayal of a lovable philosophy-spouting "fox," to Tommy Yousten's eminently-dislikable Dickie, manager of the Crouching Squirrel country club.

I had cleaned up my boat in hopes of cruising Beaver Dam on Saturday, but the day started out windy and rainy. So we headed downtown for a latte at Peter & Annie's, where we got to hear the Hay River Sisters harmonizing on the coffee shop's stage. Bob is a lover of music and got a chance to tell one of the sisters during a break that they harmonize so well they should try some Everly Brothers tunes.

After the music, which Peter & Annie's has every Saturday from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., Bob and I headed back to the house for naps, but our wives hung out downtown for some shopping at several of our terrific shops – Vintage Galbery, Sugar Wear, Twice as Nice on the Island, Tiny Friends, White Willow Market, Tevin, Years Ago Antiques and the Dancing Bird. They made it home just in time for dinner at Louie's on the Lake, before we headed to a concert at a new music venue, Brickyard Pottery in Barronett.

On the grounds of the pottery and gallery, we got to hear J. Streitz and the Long Odds. That would be the band of Jason Streitz, a singer and guitarist who bought Brickyard a few years ago with his wife, Virginia Streitz, who is a

potter and painter. They moved from inner-city Minneapolis with their two daughters and, in addition to making and selling things, have begun to hold live-music events.

The other concerts they've held have been inside the gallery, where they roll the display tables aside and create a "listening room" in the old schoolhouse. On Saturday, Jason's band set up on a flatbed trailer they borrowed from a neighbor with a tarp roof borrowed from ETC.

I was taken back to my youth in the 1960s, when we'd attend concerts in fields. It was a lovely evening, with folks sitting on lawn chairs and kids and dogs running about. At intermission, all those in attendance were asked to join the band at the stage for a group photo – kind of like they do the last night of Baga Fest.

We got back to our place tired, but happy, and were able to get in a game of cards before retiring early.

When I bought my place here, I remember Bob asking me if I wouldn't be bored living in a town of 2,000. There's always a lot to do in big cities, where he and I had spent our working lives. I thought about that question at the time he asked it. 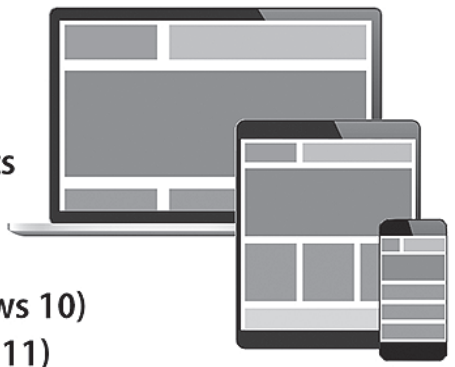

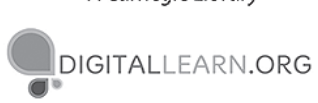

Inside Wisconsin

“Even in tough climate, young companies can raise money they need”

MADISON, Wis. – There’s rarely a time when it’s easy for early stage companies to raise money from investors, and today’s conditions fall on the opposite end of the scale.

And yet, for those companies with technologies or business ideas favored by the market, finding angel or venture capital is not only possible but perhaps well-timed from the perspective of investors searching for well-priced deals.

That was a major take-away from a Sept. 26 panel discussion in Madison, where three investors representing different parts of Wisconsin’s early stage capital structure discussed trends and prospects. The event revolved around a summary of Wisconsin’s investment data so far in 2023 and previewed the Nov. 8-9 Wisconsin Early Stage Symposium, where invited young companies may pitch to investors.

Wisconsin saw nearly \$870 million in early stage capital raised in 2021 and more than \$640 million in 2022, when a decline began mid-year, but the total thus far in 2023 is about \$200 million. While there’s another quarter to go in 2023, the annual dollar total is

more likely to resemble what Wisconsin recorded in 2015 to 2020 than the last two record years. The number of deals is down so far, as well, compared to 2021 and 2022.

If there’s any comfort in that news, it’s that U.S. investment figures have declined at an almost identical percentage pace. Factors ranging from inflation to interest rates, and from money supply to frothy company valuations are among the causes.

The good news, panelists agreed, is that it’s nearing a point where investors can realize strong profits if they invest in appropriately valued deals in the right sectors.

Greg Williamson, the senior investment director for the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp., said those sectors nationally include artificial intelligence, robotics, energy and climate-related technologies, 3D printing, space technologies, digital gaming and entertainment technology, and certain parts of health care.

Williamson is leading development of The Wisconsin Fund, which was seeded with \$50 million in federal dollars and which

will eventually involve private co-investors. It will focus on angel, seed and pre-seed funding and “Series A” deals, mostly in the \$100,000 to \$3 million range, with an eye toward investments in people or geographic regions that are sometimes overlooked.

Other panelists noted some of the same sector opportunities. Todd Sobotka of the Bright-Star Wisconsin Foundation said the Milwaukee-based fund has invested more than \$10 million in 70-plus companies in 15 counties since its creation in 2013. He agreed activity has been down but noted conditions may bounce back for some types of companies.

Lorrie Heinemann of the Madison Development Corp., which has been making “venture debt” loans since the late 1970s, said the MDC is expanding its operations outside Dane County. She identified similar sectors of interest.

For young companies looking to get in front of investors, the Early Stage Symposium in Madison typically draws investors from Wisconsin and beyond. Applications are being accepted through

Oct. 6 from young companies that want to tell their stories to investors during the in-person conference at Madison’s Monona Terrace Convention Center.

Companies that apply for the conference will have up to three chances to meet with angel and venture capitalists, corporate funds, family funds and other investors on hand. The 2023 format includes two pitch opportunities: the Tech Council Investor Networks track (five-minute presentations) and the Elevator Pitch Olympics. All registered companies are eligible for “Investor Intros,” which allow pre-selected companies brief, one-on-one meetings with targeted angel and venture investors.

Instructions for how to apply for all or a mix of the investor presentation opportunities can be found at wisearlystage.com on the “ESS Application” tab.

It hasn’t been the strongest early stage investment year thus far, but for the right companies, it can end on a much higher note.

The deputy reports he established a timeline for Peterson's activities on September 22, 2023, based on the information provided by Peterson's relatives and another female, who the deputy learned picked up Peterson from the residence on the morning of September 22, 2023.

The deputy reports on September 22, 2023, at approximately 8:00 am, Peterson used one of his relative's phone to call for a ride to Barron because he was sick and wanted to go to the hospital to get checked out. The deputy reports that the female picked up Peterson from the residence and took him to a hospital in Barron. The female stated that, when she dropped of Peterson at the hospital, he told her to leave and not wait for him. The female stated she did not hear or see Peterson again after she dropped him off.

The deputy reports Peterson was confirmed to be in the location of the hospital in the morning. When Peterson left the location of the hospital, he went to the location of the bank in Barron. Peterson went to the location of the bank, the location on his ankle monitor stopped working and stopped updating as of approximately 9:00 am on September 22, 2023. The monitoring system provided information that the last location ping of the ankle monitor was in the city of Barron near the bank. Shortly before that, the location pinged near the hospital.

The deputy reports he spoke with hospital staff, who stated Peterson was not seen in person on September 22, 2023 for treatment. The deputy reports he contacted Cumberland Hospital, Amery Hospital, Barron Hospital, and Marshfield Clinic in Rice Lake, and confirmed Peterson was

not a patient of any of those hospitals. Peterson did not inform the monitor system, nor the jail, that he was going to the hospital for treatment.

The deputy reports he reviewed the Barron County Jail Huber Employment Verification and Information form that Peterson signed on July 12, 2023. The form Peterson signed indicates he agrees to abide by all Barron County Jail Electronic Monitor Rules, and the Huber Rules and Regulations set forth by the jail. The rules and regulations included notifying the monitoring system before an inmate goes anywhere that is not approved for release while on the electronic monitor. Peterson's application allowed for release on the electronic monitor for employment and no other reason as of July 5, 2023.

The deputy reports that neither Peterson's whereabouts, nor the location of the ankle monitor, were known after the last location of the ping that was transmitted on September 22, 2023 at approximately 9:00 am. The ankle monitor was no longer transmitting and Peterson's whereabouts had been unknown for approximately 12 hours when the deputy received the call to respond to Peterson's residence.

If convicted for Escape, Peterson may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than six years or both.

Car vs. Motorcycle Crash on Highway 8 Results in Fatality

On Saturday, September 2, 2023, at approximately 1:03 pm, a fatal traffic accident occurred at the intersection of U.S. Highway 8 and 18th Street in Barron. A vehicle traveling northbound on 18th Street was stopped at the stop sign, at the intersection of 18th Street and U.S. Highway 8, waiting for traffic on U.S. Highway 8 to clear before making a left turn and did not see a motorcycle traveling eastbound on U.S. Highway 8, behind a vehicle that was turning to travel southbound on 18th Street.

The driver of the vehicle that pulled into the intersection immediately slammed on her brakes when she observed the motorcycle behind the vehicle that was turning to travel southbound on 18th Street. The driver of the motorcycle, who was identified as S.G.R., ditched the motorcycle in an attempt to avoid colliding with the vehicle. However, the motorcycle struck the front driver side of the vehicle before coming to rest in the westbound lane of U.S. Highway 8.

S.G.R. ended up under the front bumper of the vehicle. Other motorists and the driver of the vehicle that pulled into the intersection immediately began tending to S.G.R. until first responders arrived. First responders carried out life-saving efforts. S.G.R. was transported to Barron Mayo Hospital, where he died as a result of his injuries from the accident.

The Barron County Sher-

iff's Department and Wisconsin State Patrol undertook a crash investigation and reconstruction of the crash scene. The investigation included interviews and statements from eyewitnesses to the accident. The driver of the vehicle that pulled into the intersection fully cooperated with the investigation, including providing a consensual sample of her blood for analysis by the Wisconsin State Lab of Hygiene.

The driver of the vehicle that pulled into the intersection showed no signs of being under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance, or otherwise of being impaired. If the results of the test on the driver's blood sample, when they are received, show that she was under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance, criminal charges at a later date may be filed.

Upon a thorough review of the investigation that was completed by the Barron County Sheriff's Department, no criminal charges will be filed by the District Attorney's Office, unless the test results on the driver's blood sample, when they are received show the driver was under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance. I have determined that the fatal crash involved no criminal wrongdoing by the driver pending confirmation that was not under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance.

On September 8, 2023, at 5:38 PM, the Polk County Sheriff's Office responded to a motorcycle crash on County Road D, near the intersection of 30th Street in rural Clayton, WI. The Motorcyclist was operating a 2005 Big Dog Custom Chopper north on County Road D and went off the curve at the intersection of 30th Street. The operator was not wearing a helmet and was transported by Air Ambulance to Regions Hospital with severe injuries.

On September 23, 2023,

the operator of that motorcycle succumbed to his injuries at Regions Hospital. The operator was 68-year-old Gregory Schnell from Rural Clayton, Wisconsin.

Assisting the Polk County Sheriff's Office with this crash was Clayton Police Department, Clayton Fire Department, Apple River Fire Department, Clear Lake Ambulance, Life Link Air Ambulance, and the Polk County Medical Examiner.

This is the 12th traffic fatality in 2023.

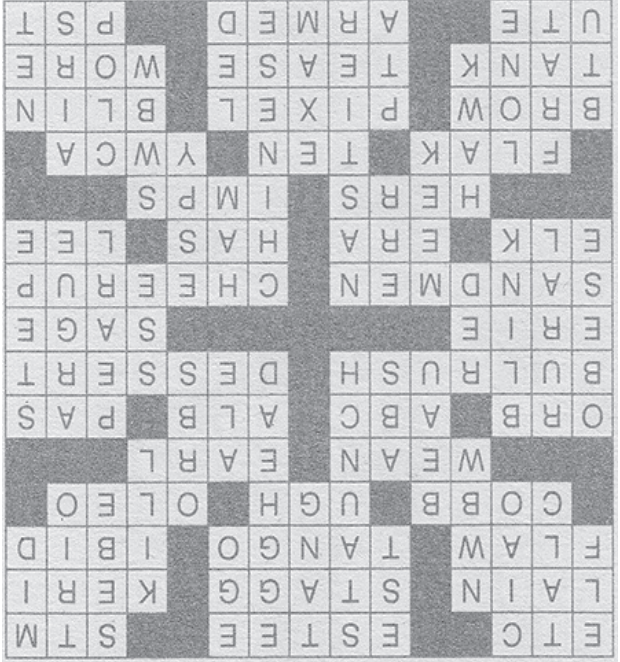
Numerous Construction Site Related Thefts in Polk County

Over the past 1-2 months, the Polk County Sheriff's Office has responded to numerous construction site-related thefts. In addition to construction trailers, several thousand dollars of tools and construction-related equipment have been taken. All of the thefts have occurred during the late night and/or early-morning hours. The majority of the thefts have occurred in central, southeast and southwest Polk County.

This release is intended encourage those currently working on new build sites who commonly keep their equipment on the job site during the overnight hours (trailers, tools, vehicles, etc.), to take extra care securing your belongings. Consider removing trailers/equipment from the site when not working there, using gates or barriers when away from the site to prevent access to the property, utilizing surveillance equipment to monitor your location (s) in addition to trail cameras, and position those devices

where distinguishing characteristics of the suspect/suspect vehicle can be captured and/or documented (license plate of vehicle). In addition, business signs commonly used to advertise building sites should be taken down when you are away from the property. Below are images that have been captured recently from two separate construction-related thefts/burglaries. The trailer was stolen from Central Polk County and to date, has not been recovered. The suspect vehicle used in that incident is also included. The image of the second vehicle is the suspect vehicle that was used recently during a construction-related theft that occurred in southern Polk County.

Cumberland Drops Contest at Northwestern; Host St. Croix Falls This Friday

The Cumberland Football Team found the Northwestern Tigers to be bad hosts last Friday night, as their trip to Maple left them with a 54-0 loss to the Tigers, dropping their overall record to 4 and 3 on the year. The Beavers are still tied for first in the HON, however, as Northwestern, Cameron and Cumberland all have 4 and 1 records with two weeks left in the regular season.

The Tigers wasted little time in taking control of the game, scoring 24 points in the game's first twelve minutes of play. Two more Northwestern scores in quarter two gave them a 38-0 lead at intermission, as running clock was part of the entire second half of play.

The Beavers have put together a very good season to date, but could not get anything going offensively on Friday. Quarterback Cooper Schramski was under a heavy pass rush, but did complete seven of 16 passing attempts for 31 yards. Chayden Berghammer and Jack Owens caught three balls each, while Roman Ranallo caught one ball for three yards.

A big physical Tigers line limited the Beavers to negative yards on the ground. Ranallo, who has been outstanding in the four Cumberland victories, was held to 13 yards rushing in 10 attempts. Northwestern's offense was in high gear with 304 yards rushing and another 195 yards through the air. They raised their overall mark to 6 and 1, with the only blemish on their record a 32-14 loss to Cameron, a contest they played with several key players limited by injury.

Next up for the Beavers is a home game against St. Croix Falls this Friday night. The Saints are 3 and 4 on the season, but did give Cameron their only Conference loss with a 45-36 victory over the Comets three weeks ago. They have won their last three contests after starting the season 0 and 4.

Hopefully a good crowd will turn out at Endeavor Stadium this Friday to root on the Beavers in their final home game of the year. Tied for first in the HON, Cumberland can still take home a share of the Conference Championship with wins in their last two regular season games.

Bloomer's Hartman triplets continued their outstanding season by sweeping the first three places in the girl's competition. Only a freshmen, Ciara Hartman led the trio by running a 18:34 to take Medalist honors.

Cumberland's top finish

came from Senior Andie Otto, who finished 17th with a time of 23:17. Carly McCreary was 22nd in 23:55 and Freshman Greta Weaver 41st, with a run of 25:58.

The Boy's Medalist was Bloomer Senior Anders Michaelson, who ran a 17:06. Cumberland's Josh Swint finished a strong eighth with a run of 18:34, while teammate Tommy Dettinger finished 10th with a 18:49.

The Beavers ran at Amery on Tuesday and then prepare for the Conference Meet in Cameron on Tuesday, October 10. Things get underway at 4:30 as Bloomer comes into the meet as the heavy favorite in both races.

An Outdoorsman's Journal

Turtle Flambeau/The Longest Day!

Hello friends,
For several years I have been enjoying myself immensely while hunting ducks for the northern Wisconsin opener on the backwaters of the Flambeau Flowage and living out of my boat and my canoe. This year's companions would be my golden retrievers Ruby and her pup Red.

Friday, September 22nd
High 66, low 53
This trip started out in a very stressful way 48 hours ago when my pup Red, who has never left the property without her mother Ruby (and that has not happened in a long time), kind of vanished. Wednesday night I was working on my pond, which in reality is the logistical moving of a lot of sand and this project that started in May has now sucked up over 300 hours of hard but inspiring work.

My home is surrounded by forest and Red is always exploring, but back within seconds when I call her name. Wednesday afternoon she did not come back, or that evening, and the next morning she still was not home. I was worried and bummed about her missing an excellent opportunity for some duck hunting training.

I put the word out and looked and called her name a lot. Thursday evening I was throwing sand with a shovel when I thought I heard a whimper in the forest. I looked as hard as I could and found my pup, she had dug a hole underneath a 22-foot Gruman canoe that I plan on rebuilding someday, and the hole had collapsed and she was stuck, but I got her out.

So anyways, this was kind of a trip of doom as the forecast was for solid rain the entire adventure. I did not care as I knew I would whack ducks, train dogs, and spend time in an area that I first explored when I was 9 years old.

I had just enough daylight to trail my canoe behind my boat to paradise, check out my duck hunting spot,

and then do the crazy thing of setting up to sleep in my boat. In this case that meant putting up a cot, a sleeping bag on top and a tarp over my body. For some odd reason Ruby was not feeling well and kept eating grass like a steer and with her head close to mine as well as Reds, she was belching almost constantly. There was steady rain and a flock of 10,589 mosquitoes liked it underneath my tarp as well.

Saturday, September 23rd
High 65, low 58
I was out of my cot at 3:30 and off to duck paradise which in this case means slogging through the mud to a marsh and watching the world and in this case, it was dark, raining and it was neat to watch as other hunters slowly but steadily arrived, but everyone had plenty of space.

My goals on this trip were to train the pup as last year when she was 6 months old, she received very little training, my girlfriend Michelle Chiaro had just passed away and I was not a hunting dog trainer after that.

So, night becomes day, some hunters are getting lots of shooting, some not so much. I am foolishly passing on everything but drake wood ducks and greenheads. Long after daylight I changed my mind, and dropped a hen wood duck. Ruby was sound asleep and did not see the duck fall, some instinct in her told her where it was, she swam a good 50-yards from my canoe, grabbed the duck and came back to me.

I put in many hours in the rain, paddled back to my boat at dark with 2 drakes and a hen wood duck and remade the same setup that I had the night before for sleeping. The rain and mosquitoes were steady and that was when I came to the conclusion that this adventure was a never-ending day.

The next morning, I was well adjusted to my world, it rained and then it would stop and though my pups

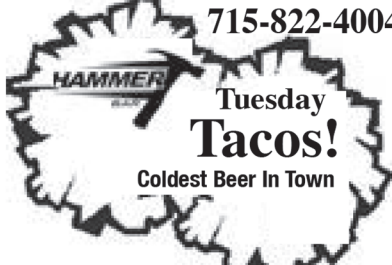

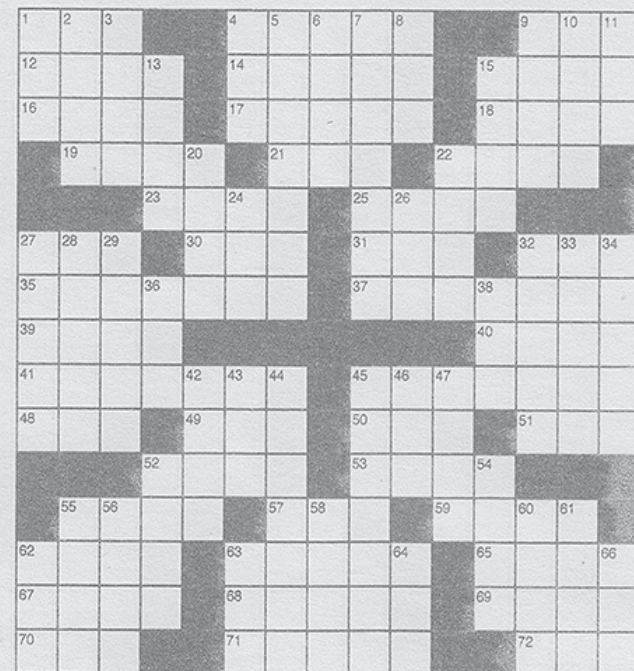

healthy deer or by leaving behind infectious prions in their saliva, blood, feces and urine.
The DNR asks deer hunters in Washburn, Barron, Rusk and Sawyer counties to help with efforts to identify where CWD occurs on the landscape by having their deer tested for the disease. The collection of CWD samples

is essential for assessing the presence of CWD in the deer population across the state.
In addition to submitting samples for CWD testing, hunters are also encouraged to properly dispose of deer carcass waste by locating a designated dumpster, transfer station or landfill location near you on the DNR website. Proper carcass disposal helps slow the spread of CWD by removing potentially infected deer carcasses from the landscape.
A map of CWD sampling and carcass disposal locations is available on the DNR website.
CWD is a fatal, infectious nervous system disease of deer, moose, elk and reindeer/caribou. It belongs to

the family of diseases known as transmissible spongiform encephalopathies (TSEs) or prion diseases. The Wisconsin DNR began monitoring the state's wild white-tailed deer population for CWD in 1999. The first positives were found in 2002.
