expenditures.” Following the election of Dr. Eric Stone as meeting chairperson, those in attendance heard reports from current bookkeeper Makena Rademacher and past bookkeeper Steve Mann on the status of the district’s financial status, which indicated a strong Fund 10 or general fund balance. This is used to account for the district’s financial activity and is a measure of the district’s financial reserves. The amount projected for 2024-2025 is \$6,286,668.

Following a Treasurer’s report from Jonelle Gideo, the Board and those in attendance authorized a school levy tax to include General Fund Operations of \$7,020,602, Referendum Approved Debt of \$2,163,000 and a Community Service Fund of \$250,000. This will create a total mill rate of \$7.59, which is slightly higher than the past two years, but lower than the \$8.24 rate of the 2021-2022 school year. Charts showed the rate to be very comparable to surrounding communities.

Further routine authorizations were granted to the Board, such as the right to provide school breakfast and lunch and furnish academic textbooks. The total length of the meeting was 15 minutes with no questions from those in attendance. Following the authorizations needed by law, the meeting was adjourned.

Following a short break, the regular monthly meeting began.

Director of Special Education Tami Bowman set in motion the District reports by discussing with the Board the upcoming Child Development Day at the Elementary School on November 21. Open to children up to four years old who are not in 4K, anyone interested in bring a child to the event should contact the Elementary School personnel. She additionally discussed ongoing Professional Development with staff.

Director of Learning Isaac Lundquist came next as he informed the Board on his current work on District literacy programs and individualized plans with staff for students needing additional support. He was followed by Athletic Director Lorne Majewski, who updated those in attendance on the final events of fall sports and the passage of a HON vote, where Chetek-Weyerhaeuser will be leaving the Conference and replaced by Unity.

The Board then moved into Action Items, where they passed the 2024-2025 Budget and School Levy, which they were authorized to do at the Annual Meeting. This was followed by discussion and approval of five high school students to move into an Early College Credit Program for Second Semester and 31 students to enter the Start College Now Program during the same time frame.

The Board then addressed staffing issues, where they approved the resignation of JaKoda Hendren as a Special Education Aide, while approving the hiring of Heather Schell as Special Education Teacher and Lorne Majewski as Middle School Basketball Coach.

Additionally, the Board approved William Rosenow and Holly Waterman as Co-Art Club Advisors, Graham Severson as Pep Club Advisor, and Tirzah Zipperer as Ski Club Advisor.

The final Action Item was approval by the Board for the demolishing and site prep at location 1160 8th Avenue in preparation for a new Maintenance Building that will be used as classrooms during the new building process. Bids for the two projects had been acquired with the Board listening to each estimate given to Superintendent Dr. Barry Rose.

Following a lengthy discussion, the bid for the demolition of the old hospital site was given to Erickson Excavating and the building of the Maintenance shed was given to Northwest Builders.

Superintendent Dr. Barry Rose indicated the maintenance shed will provide cheaper housing for student classrooms during construction, than would be the purchasing of temporary classrooms and additionally showed diagrams on how the building will be used for much needed storage and maintenance purposes once the new school has been completed.

With the approval from the Board, the proper permits will be acquired with the new shed looking at a spring completion date.

The evening concluded with a Referendum Pre-Construction update from Dr. Rose and the Principal reports.

Dr. Rose showed slides to those in attendance of the current schematic design which he indicated was developed at 60 percent. Dr. Rose indicated that, “Things are coming together” and talked about an important Core Planning Meeting that was coming up. The final construction drawing will be done by January, leading to the seeking of bids for the project.

Elementary Principal Abe Ferguson began the Administrative reports by giving an update on events at the school as the first quarter comes to an end. He discussed Halloween activities, Red Ribbon Drug Prevention Week, and the many exciting field trips taken by his students.

Middle School Principal Colin Green also discussed his students field trips and the activities students are enjoying in the physical education classes. He gave the Board an update on the many, “Great things” he’s seen in his building’s classrooms.

High School Principal Dan Hopkins concluded the night by congratulating the band on their excellent season and those who attended the National FFA Convention. He joined Athletic Director Majewski in honoring Junior Tommy Dettinger, who qualified for the State Cross Country Meet and the Soccer Team which won the Regional Title. He caught the Board up on recent Student Council activities and the upcoming Fall Formal on November 9.

With this the Board concluded their evening and set the next meeting date for 6:00 pm on November 19.
